NOTICE OF SEIZURE UNDER THE CUSTOMS AND EXCISE ACT 1952

To: HUBERT JEAN GYSEMANS, Bishappenhoflaan 199, Deurne, 2100 Antwerp, Belgium.

Pursuant to section 275 (5) of the Customs and Excise Act 1952 and paragraph 1 of the 7th Schedule thereto, the Commissioners of Customs and Excise hereby give you notice that by virtue of the powers contained in the customs and excise Acts and enactments amending those Acts, certain goods, namely

One 18 carat white gold three tier peg-set cluster ring comprising twenty-five round brilliant cut diamonds have been seized as liable to forfeiture upon the grounds that:

- 1. the said goods being imported goods chargeable with a duty of customs were without payment of that duty unshipped in the port of Dover otherwise than as provided by or under the Customs and Excise Act 1952.
- 2. the said Hubert Jean Gysemans was a person entering the United Kingdom and the said goods were not declared by him as required by section 6 (1) of the Finance Act 1968.

Whereby and by force of section 44 (a) of the Customs and Excise Act 1952 and section 6 (3) of the Finance Act 1968.

the said goods are liable to forfeiture.

If you claim that the said goods are not liable to forfeiture you must within one month from the date of this notice of seizure give notice of your claim in accordance with the said Schedule to the said Act specifying the name and address of a solicitor in England or Wales who is authorised to accept service of process and to act on your behalf. In default of such notice the said goods will be deemed to have been duly condemned as forfeited and will be liable to be disposed of in such manner as the Commissioners of Customs and Excise may direct. If you make such claim within the time aforesaid, legal proceedings will be taken for the condemnation thereof.
