A PROCLAMATION,
For Calling a New Parliament.

ANNE R.

WHereas by our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty first Day of this Instant September, We did Dissolve the last Parliament, and did thereby Declare, That in some short time after we did intend to give Directions for the Calling a New Parliament; we do by this our Royal Proclamation Publish and Declare, That, with the Advice of our Privy-Council, we have this Day given Order to our Lords Commissioners for the Custody of our Great Seal of Great Britain, to Issue out Writs in due Form, for the Summoning and Holding a New Parliament; which Writs are to bear Telle the Twenty seventh Day of this Instant September, and to be Returnable on Saturday the Twentieth fifth Day of November next ensuing the Date hereof.

Given at our Court at Kensington, the Twenty sixth Day of September, 1710. In the Ninth Year of our Reign.

In order to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland.

ANNE R.

Whereas by an Act passed in the Sixth Year of our Reign, it was amongst other things Enacted, That at all times thereafter when we, our Heirs or Successors, should declare our Pleasure for Summoning and Holding any Parliament of Great Britain, in order to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers who should have Right to sit in the House of Peers in the Parliament of Great Britain, on the Part of Scotland, a Proclamation should be Issued under the Great Seal of Great Britain, Commanding all the Peers of Scotland to Assemble and Meet at Edinburgh, or such other Place in Scotland, and at such Time as should be Appointed in the said Proclamation, to Elect, by open Election, the Sixteen Peers to Sit and Vote in the House of Peers, in the Parliament of Great Britain, in such manner as in and by one other Act therein recited, and by the herein before recited Act is appointed. And whereas we have in Council thought fit to Declare our Pleasure, for Summoning and Holding a Parliament of Great Britain, on Saturday the Twentieth fifth Day of November next ensuing the Date hereof; in order therefore to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to Sit in the House of Peers in the said Parliament, we do, by Advice of our Privy-Council, Issue forth this our Royal Proclamation, strictly Charging and Commanding all the Peers of Scotland to Assemble and Meet at our Royal Palace of Holy-Rood House in Edinburgh, on Friday

the Tenth Day of November next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to Nominate and Choose, by open Election, the Sixteen Peers to Sit and Vote in the House of Peers in the said ensuing Parliament, in such manner as in and by the herein before mentioned Acts is Appointed.

Kensington, September 27. This Evening the Sieur Kirchner, Resident from the King of Poland, had a private Audience of Leave of Her Majesty, being re-called by his Master. At the same time the Sieur de l'Orme, who succeeds him in the same Character, had his first Audience; to which they were Introduced by his Grace the Duke of Queensberry, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and Conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.

From the Camp at St. André, October 2. N. S. On Monday the 29th past, about six in the Evening, the Governor of St. Venant beat the Châmade, and desired to Capitulate; of which the Prince of Nassau-Frize having given immediate Notice to the Duke of Marlborough and the Prince of Savoy, they went thither the next Morning, and having signed the Capitulation, our Men took Possession of one of the Gates the same Evening, and the Garrison marches out to Day with the usual Marks of Honour, being to be Conducted to Arras. This Place, which the Enemy have been these two Years fortifying with so much Art and Expence, that they expected it would have employed our Army for a considerable time, has been taken by a small Detachment in fourteen Days after the opening the Trenches, and will be of great use to us in the Prosecution of the Siege of Aire, the Passage being thereby opened for our Ammunition and Provisions to come by Water up to our Camp. At the Attack on the side of Lambre the Lodgment on the outer Ditch is continued above two hundred Paces, and a Communication pushed to the Enemy's Place of Arms without the outer Ditch, to which we have likewise carried on the Communication on the Right, which is ready to be joined to the third Parallel. On the side of St. Quentin we have raised a new Battery of Cannon and Mortars against the Redoubt that covers the Causeway of Arras, and the Dyke that sustains the Inundation, which we shall endeavour

endeavour to draw off by a Canal to be cut from the Castle of Isbergue, to run from thence into the Lys below the Fort St. François, for which Work two thousand Men were commanded Yesterday Morning from the Grand Army. The Enemy have this Morning quitted the two Posts they had on the Causey, which will very much facilitate the draining the Inundations.

Brussels, October 4. N. S. Letters from France tell us, that since the arrival of an Express from Valladolid the 26th of the last Month, it is reported, the Duke of Anjou had been obliged to retire with his Court to Burgos. The Duke of Alva makes pressing Instances in behalf of that Prince, and solicits earnestly to have him supported with early and powerful Supplies, which the Court will not think safe to send 'till towards the end of the Campaign. The Duke of Medina-Celi has been removed to Fontarabia, where he is to be detained 'till farther Orders from the Duke of Anjou. Letters from Constantinople, by the way of Vienna, pretend, that the Grand Signior has declared to the King of Sweden, that he intends Religiously to observe the Treaty of Carlowitz, and that he can therefore allow him no more than a thousand Horse to conduct him into Hungary, from whence he may proceed under the Emperor's Protection into his own Dominions.

Hague, October 3. N. S. The French having stopped all our Letters from Spain, we have two Posts due from thence: Notwithstanding which, by some private Letters from Paris, we have received a Confirmation of his Catholick Majesty's Entry into Madrid. On the 26th of the last Month, an Express arrived at Versailles, from Valladolid, which Place he left the 18th. The Court are very silent as to what he has brought, only they give us a large Account of the great Appearance of the Grandees at Valladolid, who, they say, have unanimously declared they will stand by the Duke of Anjou to the last Extremity; and they pretend to be highly pleased with their Expressions of Zeal for his Service. This Express left the Dukes of Vendome and Noailles at Valladolid, where the Marquis de Bay, who lay encamped with about eight thousand Men at Aranda de Duero, was likewise expected, in order to concert such Measures as shall be judged most proper for the present Situation of their Affairs; and it is believed the Court will soon be obliged to remove from thence to Burgos. We hope to be Masters of Aire by the 16th or 17th of this Month; and if the Weather continues to be as favourable as it has hitherto been, it is said the Allies will lay Siege to St. Omer before they finish the Campaign.

Plymouth, September 24. Yesterday sailed the Cornwall, Essex, Pembroke and Litchfield to Cruize. At the same time the Seahorse and Delight came in with a Spaniard for Bilboa. In the Evening sailed the Anglesea and Fowey, with thirteen Merchant-ships for Portugal and Guiney, and the Union Packet-Boat for the West-Indies. This Day came in the Royal Anne Galley from Spithead; and this Evening the Pearl brought in, on Suspicion, a Spaniard bound to Bilboa.

Whitehall, September 26. Her Majesty has been pleased to constitute Sir William Gifford, Kt. Governor of the Royal Hospital at Greenwich.

Whitehall, September 25. Mr. Roger Grant having cured great Numbers in Her Majesty's Service, who have laboured under Distempers in the Eyes, is sworn Occulist and Operator in Extraordinary to Her Majesty.

London, September 27. My Lord Duke of Beaufort, Lord-Lieutenant of Hampshire, and Warden of New-Forest, arrived at Winchester on Wednesday the 12th Instant, into which Town his Grace was attended by a great number of Gentlemen and Freeholders, and received with great Demonstrations of joy. His Grace was Complimented with the Freedom of the Corporation. On Saturday the

16th his Grace went to the Isle of Wight, where he was received upon his Landing by Lieutenant-General Webb, Governor of the Island, and conducted by him to the Encampment, where he was received with great Marks of Honour; from thence he proceeded to Newport, where he was very splendidly Entertained by the Governor.
