A PROCLAMATION,
 For a **PUBLICK THANKSGIVING**.

ANNE R.

WHereas it hath pleased Almighty God, of his great Goodness and Mercy, to continue to us his Protection and Assistance in the just and necessary War, in which we are engaged, for the Safety of our Realms, and of the Liberties of Europe, by giving to our Arms, in Conjunction with those of our Allies, a wonderful Course of Success this Campaign, and more particularly, a Signal and Glorious Victory in Spain: We therefore duly considering, That such great and publick Blessings do call for a Solemn and Publick Acknowledgment, have thought fit, by the Advice of our Privy-Council, to Issue forth this our Royal Proclamation, hereby Appointing and Commanding, That a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for these his Mercies, be observed throughout England, Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, upon Tuesday the Seventh Day of November next. And for the more devout, and orderly Solemnizing the same, we have given Directions to our Archbishops and Bishops, to Compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches and Chapels, and other Places of Publick Worship, within their respective Dioceses, and to take Care of the timely dispersing thereof. And we do likewise Direct and Command, That the said Publick Day of Thanksgiving be Religiously Observed by all our Loving Subjects, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and upon Pain of Suffering such Punishment, as we may justly inflict on all such as shall Contemn or Neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty.

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manding, That a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for these his Mercies, be Observed throughout that Part of our Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, upon Tuesday the Seventh Day of November next. And we do hereby Direct and Command, That the said Day of Publick Thanksgiving be Religiously observed by all our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and upon Pain of Suffering such Punishment as we may justly inflict on all such as shall Contemn or Neglect the Performance of so Religious and Necessary a Duty. Our Will is therefore, and we Charge that incontinent, this our Proclamation seen, ye pass to the Market-Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance. And our Will and Pleasure is, That our Solicitor do cause Printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewarts, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom we Ordain to see the same Published, and we Appoint them to send Doubles hereof to the several Paroch-Kirks within their Bounds, That upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the same may be Published and Read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

Turin, September 17. N. S. Great Remittances have been lately made here for the Service of the Confederate Army. The Troops continue in their former Posts near Oulx, and on the Frontiers of Savoy; but the Snow having begun to fall in great Quantities on the Mountains, it is thought they will soon be obliged to decamp. We do not hear that the Duke of Berwick has as yet made any Detachments towards Roussillon. They write from Rome, that they are in great Hopes there of seeing the Differences between the Pope and the Emperor brought to a speedy Accommodation. They say the Pope is to grant his Imperial Majesty a Brief for the raising 200000 Crowns upon the Revenues of the inferior Clergy in the Milanese; and that the Emperor in return engageth that no Troops shall be quartered in the Territories of Ferrara this Winter; and the Pope is not without Hopes of prevailing with his Imperial Majesty at length to restore Comachio to the Holy See.

Copenhagen, September 27. N. S. The Damage the Danish Fleet suffered in the late Storm, which happened on the 14th Instant, proves more considerable than was at first reported. Six Capital Ships are intirely disabled, and five others are still missing, as are likewise several of the Transports. Upon this Accident the King has resolved to defer sending for the Muscovites till the next Spring. Monsieur Waldersee is set out from hence for Ratisbon, and is to execute a Commission at the Court of the Elector Palatin, relating to an old Debt due to this Crown, on Account of the late Electress, who was Sister to the late King of Denmark.

Falmouth, September 25. Yesterday came in the Concord Privateer of Guernsey from Newfoundland, who hath taken in her Cruizing several Sail of Prizes, laden with Fish; the Master reports, that our Men of War and Gallies, have taken a great many Prizes on that Coast. The Portland and Valeur have taken two Ships from Canada, one of which is worth sixty Thousand Pound. Put in also the Higgens Dogger of and from London to load Fish. Sailed also the Mermaid Privateer, Capt. Vanerscot Commander, to Cruize. This Day sailed the King William Pacquet Boat Capt. Hooper Commander, and the Godolphin Capt. Jones Commander, both for Lisbon, having several Officers on Board; as also the Dolphin Galley of this Place, Thomas Allen Master, for the Canaries.

Whitehall, September 29. Her Majesty has been pleased to Appoint his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, Lord Privy-Seal, to be Warden and Chief Justice in Eyre of all Her Majesty's Forests, Parks, Chaces, and Warrens beyond Trent.

Her Majesty has likewise been pleased to Constitute the Right Honourable Arthur Earl of Anglesey and Henry Lord Hyde jointly to execute the Office of Vice-Treasurer and Receiver-General and Paymaster of Her Majesty's Revenues in Ireland.

The Queen has been pleased to constitute John Manley, Esq; Her Majesty's Surveyor-General.

Her Majesty has been pleased to Appoint George Granville, Esq; Secretary at War.

WHEREAS two Printed Papers, one intituled, *A Test offered to the Consideration of the Electors of Great Britain;* and the other intituled, *A List of the Honourable House of Commons that voted for and against the Clause for the Hanover Succession in the Year 1702,* are lately dispersed Abroad; wherein are mentioned Amendments made by the Lords to the Bill, intituled, *An Act for enlarging the Time for taking the Oath of Abjuration, and also for recapacitating and indemnifying such Persons as have not taken the same by the Time, and shall take the same by the time Appointed:* And that the House of Commons, the 13th of February 1702, took these Amendments into Consideration.

And whereas, after setting forth *verbatim* the Cause following, *viz.*

And for the further Security of Her Majesty's Person, and the Succession of the Crown in the Protestant Line, and for extinguishing the Hopes of the Pretended Prince of Wales, and all other Pretenders, and their Open and Secret Adherers; Be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That if any Person or Persons, at any Time after the first Day of March 1702, shall endeavour to deprive or hinder any Person, who shall be the next in Succession to the Crown, for the Time being, according to the Limitations in an Act, intituled, An Act declaring the Rights and Liberties of the Subject, and Settling the Succession of the Crown; and according to one other Act, intituled, An Act for the further Limitation of the Crown, and better securing the Rights and Liberties of the Subject, from succeeding aiter the Decease of Her Majesty, (whom God long preserve) to the Imperial Crown of this Realm, and the Dominions and Territories thereto belonging, according to the Limitations in the before-mentioned Acts; that is no say, such Issue of Her Majesty's Body, as shall from time to time be next in Succession to the Crown, if it shall please God Almighty to bless Her Majesty with Issue; and during the time Her Majesty shall have no Issue, the Princess Sophia, Electress and Duchess-Dowager of Hanover; And after the Decease of the said Princess Sophia, the next in Succession to the Crown for the Time being, according to the Limitations of the said Acts; and the same maliciously, advicedly and directly, shall attempt by any Overt Act or Deed, every such Offence shall be adjudged High Treason, and the Offenders or Offender therein, their Adherers, Procurers and Conspicors, knowing the said Offence to be done, being thereof convicted or Attainted, according to the Laws and Statutes of this Realm, shall be deemed and adjudged Traitors, and shall suffer Pains of Death, and all Losses and Forfeitures, as in Cases of High Treason.

And also, after setting forth the Substance of other Clauses (other of the said Amendments) it is said in the said Printed Papers thus: *After Debate the Question being put for agreeing with the Lords in these Amendments, the House divided.*

And at the end of the said Printed Papers it is said: *To this happy Majority, tho' but of One Vote, We Give so Excellent a Law, so great a Strengthening to the Protestant Succession in the Illustrious House of Hanover, upon the Supporting of which our Religion and Liberties, and all that's dear to any true British Protestant, does entirely depend.*

Now I (being required to certify the Truth of the Fact, as it appears by the Journal of the House of Commons) do humbly certify as followeth, *viz.*

That it does appear by the Journal of the House of Commons, of the Session of Parliament begun in October, 1702. as also by the Original Minute Books thereof, That the said Clause set forth at large as aforesaid, (and which was insert'd B.) was

Agreed to by the House of Commons, without any Division thereupon; And that the Division that was in the House upon the 13th Day of February, (upon which the Numbers of Yeas were 118, and No's 117,) was upon a precedent Amendment, *viz.* upon a Clause mark'd A. which is as followeth:

Provided always, That no Person or Persons, who by reason of any such Disgrace, Neglect or Omission, hath or have Left or Forfeited any Office, Benefice, Place, Dignity or Employment whatsoever, to which any other Person or Persons hath or have been Preferred or Promoted, shall be Restored to such Office, Benefice, Place, Dignity or Employment: Any thing herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding.

And the other Amendments made by the Lords to the said Bill were Agreed to by the House of Commons, without any Division.
