E are no longer apprehensive of a Rup-ture between the Turks and Muscovites; nor doth the Port propose to Conduct the King of Sweden into his own Dominions, but under fuch a Guard, and in fuch a manner as shall be agreed upon by both Parties, that all Occasions of Offence may be avoided. The Sultan hith returned a very favourable Answer to his Czarih Majesty's Letter in that behalf, notwithstanding which both the Poles and Muscovites are upon their Guard, and diligently observe the Motions of the Turks on the Frontiers. It is said, the Sultan at full pretended he would affish his Swedish Majesty with an Army of fifty thousand Turks and Tartars, who were to Conduct him through Hungary into Poland, but that this was done with no other Deign than to obtain some Conditions the Port demanded from the Czar. The King of Sweden is much offended at the Behaviour of the French in this Conjuncture; and the Palatin of Kiovia has harply remonstrated to the French Ambassador at Constantinople the Infincerity of his Master's Pro-ceedings, who had given his Swedish Majesty positeenings, who had given his Swedin Majery poli-tive Affurances that he would procure from the Port an advantagious Alliance for him and King Saniflaus. The King of Denmark hath at length been pleafed to recall Count Vehlo, his Majesty's Envoy to this Court, but we do not hear who is appointed to succeed him. The Imperial Ministers have had the State of the War for the enfuing Yarunder their Consideration, which they have fitled, and are now preparing the necessary Funds to defray the Expences of it. Yesterday in the Evening the Count de Geull arrived with Letters from the King of Spain to the Emperor, in Con-firmation of the Victory obtained by his Catholick Majesty over the Duke of Anjou's Forces near Sara-30 It appears by these Letters that the Enemy had seven thousand Men killed in the Action, besides great Numbers that were wounded, and several thousands taken Prisoners, among whom were to hundred Officers. The Count de Geull saith the Walloon Troops made an obstinate Defence, and if the Spaniards had behaved themselves with emal Bravery, they might probably have turned the Fortune of the Day. The Emperor has appointed Count Wratislaw to set out immediately for Spain, upon Affairs of the greatest Importance, and Orders are sent for the Embarking six thousand Men at Final and Vado. General Heister has fent an Express hither, with an Account that the Garrison of Neuhausel surrendered to the Imperialifts the 23d Instant. The Count de Gronsfelt, who Commands the Army of the Empire on the Upper Rhine, has in most earnest Terms pressed the Diet at Ratisbon to supply him with Mony, and enable him to attempt something on that side. The French have a Body of three or four thou-land Men at Otmarsheim, to observe the Motions of the Germans, and cover the higher Alsace from

their Incursions. They write from Venice, that Signior Angelo Emo being appointed Proveditor-Extraordinary of the Terra firma, fet out from thence the 12th for Verona; and that on the 14th a violent Storm had done much Damage to the Shipping there. A Missionary from China, charged with Letters for his Holiness from Cardinal Tournon, is arrived in the Lazaretto, where he will be obliged to continue for a Fortnight, as are like-wife all Strangers, and the Merchants of Venice that are returned from the Fair of Bolfano, the Government being follicitous to secure that City from the Contagion, that reigns with so much Ter-

ror in Foreign Parts.

From the Camp at St. André, October 9. N. S. Since our being Masters of the Redoubt near the Causey of Bethune, on the side of St. Quentin we have carried our Approaches to within thirty Paces of the first Ditch before the Bastion of Arras, and raises a Basterius of our Research of Cause of and raised a Battery of eight Pieces of Cannon, which began Yesterday to batter the said Bastion. On the side of Lambre our Approaches have been On the side of Lambre our Approaches have been somewhat retarded by the lightness of the Nights, and the nearness to the Enemy's Fire; but the Lodgments along the sirst Ditch from the Right and Left want but a few Paces of being joined, and we have begun to make several Openings, in order to sill it up. We have likewise opened three Drains to draw off the Water, which runs away very considerably, and we have raised a New Battery on the Right, of nine Pieces of Cannon, which fires into the Counterscarp, and batters the Bassion de Thiene. stion de Thiene.

Hague, October 8. N. S. They write from the Army, that upon advice that the Enemy were preparing a Convoy at Dunkirk to be fent from thence to St. Omer, which Place they are apprehensive we shall Besiege after the Reduction of Aire, and that they had detached a strong Body of Troops from their main Army towards Petersbroeck, which was to be joined by part of the Garrison of St. Omer, for the Security of that Convoy; twenty Squadrons under the Command of the Prince of Homdrons under the Command of the Prince of Hom-bourg have been fent to the Abby of Watten, and are to be speedily Reinforced by fix Battalions and two thousand Horse, under Lieutenant-General Fagel, who will endeavour to Intercept or Destroy the Convoy. The Prince de Kourakin, Minister to his Czarish Majesty, arrived here yesterday in his Way to Great Britain. The Ministers of the Allies are frequently in Conference with the Grand Pensionary Heinsius. Our Letters from the North bring us dismal Accounts of the Misery of the Inhabitants in Upper Poland, where the Sword, Famine and Pestilence have equally contributed to their Destruction, and the Country lyes Desolate for fixty or feventy Leagues together, without Commerce, or Sustenance for the Inhabitants. This is in a great measure attributed to the Violence of the Nobility, who instead of Protecting their Country from the Depredations of Foreigners, have been themselves its greatest Oppressors. There continues to be a Misunderstanding between the

Officers of the Crown Army; some of them threatning to enter into a new Confederacy, and to make Choice of the Sieur Potocky for their Mar-Monfigur Matueof has received Advice, that the Muscovites have made themselves Masters of Pernau, and that his Czarish Majesty proposeth to lay Siege to Revel before the Conclusion of the Campaign. The Plague has destroyed almost all the Inhabitants of Riga, and the stat Country in Lithuania; and most of the Swiss Families that had soled themselves in Prussa, are likewise Dead of the fetled themselves in Prussia, are likewise Dead of the Contagion. They write from Paris, that Monsieur Cronstrom, Envoy-Extraordinary from the King of Sweden, had a private Audience of his Majesty the 30th of the last Month at Versailles; that the State of the War for the enfuing Year had been fetled, and amounted to one hundred Millions of Livres; but that it was thought they would find it almost impossible to provide Funds sufficient for so extraordinary an Expence, the Kingdom being al-

ready exhausted through the excessive Taxes, and a general Interruption of Trade.

Plimouth, Odober 6. Yesterday came in the Isabella Prize, with Sugar from Martinico, taken by a Dutch Privateer; also the Betty Frigat of and for London, John Hunt Master, with Sugar, &c. from Antegoa: Sie parted the 3d Instant; twenty Leagues Weil of Scilly, from her Majesty's Ships the Diamond and Arundel, and about thirty Merchant Ships from the Weil-Indies. Last Night came in the Kent, Monk and Affurance from Cruifing, and brought in with them as Prize a French Ship from St. Maloes, bound to Guiney, of about four hundred Tuns, one hundred and fifty Men, and thirty two Guns, laden with Bale Goods, &c. This Day failed the Yarmouth to the Eastward, as also the Delight and Seahorse, and about ten Sail of Merchant Ships and Coasters under their Convoy; and this Evening arrived the Prosperous Galley of and for London, Richard Hinton, Commander, from Virginia; she came from thence the 20th of August, in Company with twenty seven Merchant Ships, under Convoy of the Kingfton and Meiditon, and parted from them five or fix Days after she came out in bad Weather.
