

At the Court at Windsor Castle the 25th day of April 1978:

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Whereas a Representation duly made to Her Majesty in Council by the Secretary of State for the Environment that burials should be discontinued as hereinafter directed in St. John the Evangelist Village Cemetery, Brandon, in the City of Durham, shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto, has in pursuance of an Order in Council made the 9th day of February 1978, and duly published, been taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred on Her by section 1 of the Burial Act 1853 (1853 c. 134), and of all other powers Her enabling, is pleased,

by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Burials shall be discontinued forthwith in St. John the Evangelist Village Cemetery, Brandon, in the City of Durham, shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto.

Provided that the burial may be allowed in the said Cemetery at their decease of the bodies of Ethel Anne Huntley, Margaret Jane Jackson, George William Abson, Mary Ramsey, Evelyn Susan Ethel Graham, Mary Elizabeth Porter, Jonathan Hopper, Alfred Firth, Annie Madgin and Violet May Wilkinson, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (St. John the Evangelist Village Cemetery, Brandon, Durham Order 1978.
