*Hampton-Court, October 19.*

**H**ER Majesty, in Council, was this Day pleased to Declare his Grace James Duke of Ormond Lord-Lieutenant of the Kingdom of Ireland.

Her Majesty was likewise pleased to deliver the Great Seal to Sir Simon Harcourt, Kt. who was thereupon Sworn one of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, and Lord-Keeper of the Great Seal of Great-Britain, and he accordingly took his Place at the Board.

At the same time the Right Honourable Arthur Earl of Anglesey, and Henry Lord Hyde, were, by Her Majesty's Command, Sworn of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, and took their Places at the Board accordingly.

*Milan, October 7. N. S.* The Death of Cardinal Grimani is universally lamented at Naples. His Corps lay in State three Days, during which the People crowded in great Multitudes to see him. On the 25th of September he was conveyed with much Pomp to the Church del Carmine, where he was deposited. During the Procession, which was very Solemn, all the Bells tolled, and the Cannon fired from the several Castles in the City. The Day following his Obsequies were performed in the Church before-mentioned, and Father Paterno pronounced his Funeral Oration. Immediately upon his Death the Regency took upon them the Administration of the Government until the Arrival of Count Charles Borromeo, who set out from hence the 4th Instant for Naples. The late Cardinal's Corps will be removed to Venice, to be Interred with his Ancestors in a Chappel belonging to the Church of St. Francis de la Vigne. They write from Mantua, that they had received Orders to provide Winter Quarters in that Dutchy, and the Modenese, for some Imperial Troops that were to March thither out of Piedmont. Letters from Florence of the 4th Instant advise, that the Count de Ger-

gi, Envoy of France, had made his Publick Entry the 30th of the last Month, and in the Evening had Audience of the Grand Duke, the Prince, and Princesses.

*Vienna, October 11. N. S.* The Campaign in Hungary is ended, and the Imperial Troops are already marched into the Winter Quarters that have been assigned them. All our Advices from Turkey confirm the Accounts we had before received of the Grand Signior's Resolution to observe the Treaty of Carlowitz. The Duchess of Modena, Sister to the Empress-Consort, being dead, the Imperial Court is going into Mourning on that Occasion. The Bishop of Osnabrug having been constituted Coadjutor of Treves, he hath received the Compliments of all the Foreign Ministers, and Persons of Distinction, upon his Promotion to that Dignity. They write from Saxony, that it was thought Count Fleming would be made Velt-Marschal General by the King of Poland, in the room of Count Ogilvi, who died the 8th Instant at Dantzick. The Forces of the Empire continue in their old Camp at Rhin-Zabern, as doth likewise the Enemy's Army behind their Lines at Lauterburg. The French had formed a Project of falling unexpectedly upon the Germans, who having timely Notice of their Design, prevented the Execution of it.

*Berlin, October 14. N. S.* His Prussian Majesty is at present with the Court at Potsdam, where it hath been resolved in Council, that the Fair, which was to have been opened according to the usual Custom in this City the first of the next Month, shall be deferred till the ensuing Year, on the account of the Plague which rages so violently in the Neighbouring Countries, and which a concourse of Foreign Merchants may communicate to this Place. All our Magistrates and Officers on the Frontiers have received express Orders not to grant their Passports to any Persons whatever, unless they first produce Certificates of their having resided for a Month before in Places exempted from the Infection. Our Letters from Dantzick tell us, that the King of Poland was come thither, and that it was thought his Majesty would reside there the greatest part of the approaching Winter.

*Falmouth, October 17.* His Excellency the Earl of Galloway having been obliged by contrary Winds to put into this Harbour, landed here this

Day, and intends to proceed from hence by Land to London. On the 14th at Night passed by to the Westward her Majesty's Ship the Medway, with several Ships under her Convoy for Ireland. The Hart Sloop of New-England is arrived here in ten Weeks from Barbadoes, bound for London.

*Plymouth, October 17.* Yesterday sailed the Plymouth for Lisbon, and the Essex to Cruize; at the same time sailed the Francis Galley of London for the Maderas, the Cicilia of Plymouth for Ireland, and the Hope of Rotterdam for France. Here is come in the White Phoenix Privateer of Flushing, who has brought in a Privateer of Bullogne, of four Guns, and the Diamond Brigantine of Amsterdam from Curasoe, which had been taken by the said Privateer. This Day came in the Torbay, Russell and Norfolk from the Downs, and a Guernsey Privateer from Cruising.

*Tarmouth, October 18.* This Day passed through our Road divers light Colliers and Coasters to the Northward. Here are her Majesty's Ships the Folkitone and Advice's Prize, with a Fleet under their Convoy bound for Holland.

*Hull, October 18.* On the 16th Instant arrived here in the Evening the Advice and Nightingale from Rotterdam. The Fox, Rochester's Prize and Diligence are waiting for a fair Wind to sail with our Trade for London.

*Perthmouth, October 18.* On Monday last the Turkey Fleet, with several other Merchant-men and Opasters, arrived at Spithead: Their Convoy put to Sea as soon as they saw them sail in Harbour. Commodore Cornwall is still on Board the Dreadnought at Spithead, with her Majesty's Ships the Antelope, Woolwich, August, Reserve, Burford, Romney, Dover, Sorlings, and Phoenix Fire-ship.

*Deal, October 18.* Sir Edward Whitaker in her Majesty's Ship the Monmouth, with the York, Dehance and Loo, sailed yesterday in the Afternoon towards the Coast of Dunkirk. Here remain her Majesty's Ships the Newark and Lancaster.

*Whitehall, October 20.* Her Majesty has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable James Earl of Berkeley to be Lord-Lieutenant of the County of Gloucester, and Warden of the Forest of Dean.

The Reverend Dr. Robinson, Dean of Windsor, is nominated by Her Majesty to the Bishoprick of Bristol; and the Reverend Dr. Byss to the Bishoprick of St. Davids.

Her Majesty has been pleased to appoint Sir Edward Northey, Kt. to be her Attorney-General; and to confer the Honour of Knighthood on Robert Raymond, Esq; her Majesty's Solicitor-General.
