Etters from Naples of the 14th advise, that the Prince of Darm'lad fet out that Mornthe Prince of Darm and let out that Morning from thence with a numerous Retinue, in order to meet the Count de Borromeo, who left Rome the 12th Inliant, without demanding Audience of the Pope, or Sacred College, who he knew would not receive him with the Diffinctions due to his new Quality of Viceroy of Naples. The Court of Rome cannot conceal the Satisfaction that have received from the Death of the late Carthey have received from the Death of the late Cardinal Grimani, whom they considered as too much a Venetian to be incerely affected to the Interests of the Holy See. The Maltese Gallies have lately taken a Corlair of Barbary, who lost one hundred Men in the Fight; and the rest of the Crew, two hundred and ten in number, are made Slaves. The Hereditary Prince of Tuscany hard lain days county ill for some time and they begin to day gerously ill for some time, and they begin to de-spair of his Recovery. This gives great uneafiness to the Family of the Medici, and to the Italian Princes in general, who are apprehensive that the Death of this Prince will be attended with new Claims and Pretentions, that may prove fatal in the Consequence. They write from Leghorn, that Sir John Norris was returned with his Squadron into Port Mahon; that the Algerines had put their Dey to Death, and substituted another in his Place; that the French Convoy from Provence, confifting of forty Sail, and bound to the Levant to load with Corn, had been seen in the Archipelago; and that the Concordia, a Zealand Privateer, had brought into that Port a French Ship called the Fortune, carrying twenty two Guns, which he took near the Height of Monaco after a warm Difpute, wherein the French Captain and a Sailor were killed, and several wounded.

the Bridge towards the Curtain is confiderably advanced; and last Night the Overture was made in order to lay a Bridge to the Breach in the Batton of Thiene. We have now four Pieces of Gannon on the Counterfearp, which play on the Breach in the Currain, to favour the finishing the Bridge; two that play on the Communication to the Ravelin, and two more that were mounted this Morning to play on the Wing of the Hornwork which might incommode us in the making the Bridge to the Bassion. The Bridge before the Ravelin being finished, our Miners began yester-day Morning to work at the foot of the Breach and this Morning got into the Enemy's Gallery, which rangeth along the Rampart of the same. On the fide of St. Quentin the Enemy have quitted the Saliant Angle of the Counterscarp before the Ravelin of the Port d'Arras; and our other Saps are so far advanced, that it is hoped by to Morrow Night we shall oblige the Enemy to quit all that part of the Counterscarp that we want at present. We are making a new Battery in the Counterscarp, to finish the Breach in the Ravelin. The Convoy of Ammunition and Provisions being arm-ved at the Places for which they were defigned, Lieutenant-General Collyer is returned with his Forces to Pont-Rouge, at which Place it is thought fit to Continue them for the conveniency of Forage. On Monday last the Troops of the Prince of Savoy's Army made a very good Forage in the Bou-lonnois. The Foragers were covered with a Guard of two thousand Foot and two hundred Horse, but met with no Opposition from the Enemy.

Hague, November 7. N. S. Our Letters from France tell us, the Troops under the Duke of Berwick's Command in Dauphine, that were deligned for Spain, began their March towards that Country the 24th of the last Month. It is thought the Duke de Noailles is by this time at the Head of the Forces in Roussillon, where the Intendants of the Provinces have received Orders to supply them with every thing necessary for their Subsistance. The French give out that they are not to attempt any Siege, but to penetrate directly into Catalonia and Arragon. We have as yet received no Letters' immediately from Spain, fince those of the 26th and 28th of September from Barcelona. The French continue to magnify the fituation of the Duke of Anjou's Affairs, and to represent ours as under unpromising Circumstances. The Fleet designed for the Mediterranean is sitting out with all possible Expedition, and they still say it will be ready to Sail by the latter end of this Month. The States of Holland are to reassemble on Wednesday. nesday next, at which time the state of the War for the ensuing Year will be ready to be laid before them. Several Difficulties relating to the Re-partition of Winter Quarters having been adjusted, an Express hath been sent from hence to the Army, with the Resolution of the States-General in that particular. My Lord Rivers arrived here the 5th in the Morning, and set out yesterday at Noon for Helvoetsluys, in his Return to England. The Count de Zinzendorf is expected here to Day or to Morrow, from Vienna.

Whitehall, November 1. This Afternoon Major Leigh, Aid-de-Camp to his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, arrived Express from Flanders, and brought the following Particulars of the Surrender of Aire. The Beliegers having finished Bridges, and made every thing ready for Storming the Place, the Governor beat the Chamade on the 8th Inflant, N. S. in the Evening, and defired to Capitulate. Hostages were immediately exchanged, and the Articles given in on Sunday Morning; but the Governor resulting at first to surrender Fort St. Francis with the Town Hostilians render Fort St. Francis with the Town, Holilities were ordered to be renewed; whereupon the Governor was obliged to comply, and the Capitulation was accordingly Signed on Sunday in the Afternoon for the Town and Fort together. The Besegers took Possession of one of the Gates the fame Night, and the Garrison was to March out on Tuesday with the usual Marks of Honour, and to be conducted to St. Omer. The Army will continue there a few Days 'till the Works are levelled, after which they are to March towards the Plains of Lisle, in order to separate and go into Winter Quarters.
