From the Camp before Aire, November 10. N. S.

**O**N Friday Night last our Bridges to the Breaches in the Baition and Curtain on the side of Lambre were almost finished, and we should have been ready to begin those on the side of St. Quentin the next Night, but were prevented by Monsieur Godfriaud the Governor's beating the Chamade between five and six in the Evening, and desiring to Capitulate; the Hostages were exchanged about ten; the Belleged sent out a Brigadier, a Colonel, a Lieutenant-Colonel, and a Major, and we sent into the Town four Officers of the like Quality; the former came yesterday Morning to his Grace the Duke of Marlborough's Quarters, where the Capitulation was signed in the Evening, by which the Town and the Fort St. François are to be delivered to us; a Gate of each was put into our Possession last Night, and the Garrison is to March out to Morrow, to be conducted to St. Omer. We shall be obliged to continue here a few Days, to demolish our Approaches, and repair the Works of the Town, so as to leave it in a Posture of Defence, and then the Troops will be marching towards their Winter Quarters. Count Nassau-Woudebourg, a Major-General, and Son of the late Velt-Mareschal d' Auverquerque, is appointed Governor of Aire. The Substance of the Articles is contained in the following Particulars. The Gate of Arras is immediately upon Signing the Articles to be delivered up to the Allies. All Acts of Hostility are to cease, and Care shall be taken to prevent any Disorders from the Officers or Soldiers on the one side or the other. The Garrison shall March out the 11th Instant, with the usual Marks of Honour, and be conducted to St. Omer. And whereas so many as desire it, have three Months time allowed them to remain in the City, and dispose of their Effects; Such of the Inhabitants of Aire as have lodged any of their Effects at St. Omer, or elsewhere for their better Security, shall, if they think fit, have the same space of three Months allowed them to Claim and recover them. The Sick and Wounded are to remain in the Town till their Recovery. The Garrison is to be allowed six covered Waggons. Deserters are to be delivered up, and Prisoners exchanged. Hostages shall be left for the Payment of the Debts of the Garrison; a faithful Discovery shall be made of all the Mines, and the Keys of the Magazines shall be delivered up to the Allies.

*Hague, November 11. N. S.* On the 9th Instant we received by the way of Genoa Letters from Barcelona dated the 18th of October, and advising that after they had been three Weeks without receiving any Accounts there from his Catholick Majesty's Army, an Express at last arrived with Letters from Madrid, dated the 4th of the same Month, importing, that his Majesty was still encamped at Prado, a Place about a League distant from Madrid, which City had raised five hundred thousand Crowns towards the Payment of the Troops; that the Army was in a very good Condition, and had plenty of every thing; and that the Duke of Anjou continued in the Neighbourhood of Valladolid; which contradicts the Accounts we had from France, that pretend they had quitted that Camp a long

time since, and were at present at Placentia. These Letters add, that on the 3d of October Deputies from Toledo arrived in the Camp, where they did Homage to his Catholick Majesty in the Name of that City, the Possession of which will not only facilitate a Passage on the Tajo, but the Country about it being exceeding fertile, the Forces will be easily supplied from the Magazines which may be erected in that Place. General Wetzel having been detached from the Army towards Saragossa, with a Body of two hundred Horse, in order to make such Dispositions as might keep the Communication between Castile and Arragon open, was attacked in a narrow Passage by six hundred of the Enemy's Cavalry, through whom however he forced his way with the Loss of no more than ten of his Horses, and his Baggage; which happened to be somewhat behind. A Detachment of the Duke of Anjou's Troops having attempted to retake the City of Sequenza, the Inhabitants repulsed them in three several Assaults, and obliged them to quit their Enterprizes. We have a Report here, that there hath been another Action in Spain, in which the Duke of Anjou's Forces have been defeated. The French Accounts own, the Duke of Vendome narrowly escaped being taken by an Ambuscade of five hundred Germans, who however were defeated by two hundred and sixty of his Men. The Improbability of this, and their own acknowledging that they have broken down the Bridge of Almaraz, which looks as if they were under some Apprehensions, and the Accounts from several Places all agreeing in this Particular of their Defeat, incline us to believe some Action hath happened in Spain to their Disadvantage. The Muscovite Ambassador hath notified to the States, and Foreign Ministers, the Surrender of Revel, which was delivered by Capitulation to the Muscovites the 18th of the last Month. Count Zinzendorf arrived here from Vienna the 9th Instant. Our Letters from Frankfort advise, that the Great Master of the Teutonick Order has been elected Coadjutor of Mayence: That Prince was in Person at the Election, and was complimented thereupon by the Elector, the Chapter, and all the Persons of Quality in the City. The Cannon on the Ramparts of that Place made a tripple Discharge on this Occasion, and Expresses have been sent to notify the Election to his Imperial Majesty, and several other Princes of the Empire. They write from Swisserland, that the Sieur Mazzer, a Gentleman of Coire, whose Son had been seized some time since in the Territories of Geneva by the French King's Order, having been informed that the Grand Prior was to pass through the Neighbourhood of the Grisons, but in the Territories of the Empire, in his return from Rome to France, had prepared a sufficient Strength, and seized and carried him off as a Rerprizal for his Son.

*Kinsale, October 29.* This Day her Majesty's Ship the Medway, a fourth Rate, Captain Myles Commander, came in from Cruising, and brought in with her a French Privateer of thirty Guns, and one hundred and sixty Men, after a Fight of an Hour and a half. The Medway had two Men killed, and the Privateer twelve Men killed, and about thirty wounded.

*St. James's, November 6.* This Day her Majesty came hither from Hampton-court.
