Falmouth, June 6.

Warfaw, May 27. We have now great hopes of a reconcilizion of all differences, and that the diffatisfy'd Nobility will find it their intereft to return to their obedience. His Majefty impatient y expects the iflue and fuccefs of the leffer Diets, a d will not i th ut a manifeft neceffity fummon the Arrieretan, or Convention of the Nobility armed in the field, left they thould too highly refent the confpiracy formed against the prefent Government, and proceed with too much violence and feverity upon thole who are more then fulpefted to be the authors and fomenters of our troubles.

The Caftellan of Podlachia, a differet Senators lately employed by his Majelly to General Sobiesky, is returned, by whom the faid General has given his Majelty affurance of his obedience and readinels for his fervice; and that whatloever opinions might have been conceived of him, he had never any delign but what he underftood to be for the advantage of the Crown.

A Courier lately arrived from Loopold tells us, that the Polish Commiffioners were there in readinels to Treat with the Coffacks, whole Deputies were expected. That people are it feems divided among it themfelves, thole among it them who have Effates and now enjoy them, defring nothing with more zeal then a fetted peace, but many Officers and others, who by the late diffurbances have polieft themfelves rich by the fpoil of others, and have polieft themfelves of the Effates of the Nobility, fear reflitution, and endeavor to promote a war.

Milan, May 28. The Duke d'Offuna. our Governour having made his Entry into this place fome days fince with extraordinary pomp and Magnificency, and taken poll flion of his Governmen', has been pleafed to confirm all the Orders formerly made by the Governours his predeceflors, and the Officeis preferred by them He has though fit for the avoiding of all diffurbances to forbid the cartying of Fire-Arms in any City under his command and juridiction, permitting them to be born only by travellers upon the high-ways, and thole of a fixed fize and bigaels, which are to be left at the Gates of the respective Cities.

This last week the Dake was informed of the death of the Prince de Bozzuelo.

The Queen Regent of spain has conferred the Office of Great Chancellor of this State upon Don Raphael Zapora, a member of the Council of Arragon. Legorn, June 2. The 26 inftant arrived here his Excel-

lency the Lord Viscount Falconbridge from Genoua upon one of that States Gallies, where he was prefently vifited on board by Sir John Finch, his Majeffies Refident at the Great Dukes Court, Sir The. Clutterbuck, the English Conful, the Captains of the English men of war then in Port, and most of the Merchants, and faluted by the Guns from their ships, where also passed mutual falures between the Gally and the Town ; which ending, the Governour of the Yown came on board to welcome His Excellency in the name of the prefent Great Duke; upon his landing, his Excellency was attended by Segnior CAnonico, a Gentleman from the Great Duke, to inform his Excellency of the death of the late Great Duke his Fa-ther, and to know his refolution touching his coming to Florence; for which place his Excellency intends to fer forwards on Mun lay next to make his Entry on Wednefday, to visit the Great Duke incognite, and to depart from thence the Saturday following on his way for Venice:

The 31th paft arived here the Neptune Pink in 10 days from Tunis, informing, that 17 French men of war continue to block up that Port, fuffring a veffels to pols in or out; at the departure of this veffel they had a defign of failing to Parto Farina to en leavor-the burning of r<sup>2</sup> Tu ks thips that are in that 1 ort, and to attempt the faking of the Fort there, having it feems little hopes of concluding a peace, the Turks ftanding high on their demands of 110 pieces of 8 for every French Captive, and 40000 for damages received by the French fince their continuance before their Port.

. By the fame Pink we are told, that 25 Christian flaves lately eleaped from *Bizerta* in a Bregantine, that 6 Turkhin Bregantines are gone out from *Porto Farina* and *Guletta* to cruize, and many others fitting out at *Biferta* for the fame employment.

Yesterday arrived here three French ships in 22 days from Alexandria,

The Deputies of *Upper Hunga*'y are still pressing the Emperor that they may not be obliged to Quarter his forces or re eive German Garisons, but as yet the Empéror has not ecla et his resolution, but his forces still contation there may have hitherto evaded the importainings

the Emperor to intercede for his prefervation. Here is lately returned by Post from Poland the Count de Schaffenberg, giving his Imperial Majesty an account of the state of affairs in that kingdom, where, by the great prudence and excellent conduct of that king, many of the discontented great ones have been prevailed with to lay afide their animofities, and reconcile themfelves to the Court, fo that tis hoped that kingdom may in little time be fetled again in peace, and their Enemies frustrated of their hopes.

Brussels, Faue 13. On Sunday last Don Estevan de Gamarra the Spanish Ambassador to the States of the United Provinces, but at present in this Court, entertained the Dukes of Lunenbourgs Envoye to the fame States, lately returned from Dunkirk (where he had complimented his most Christian Majeity in the name of the Dukes his Masters ) the next day the said Envoye departed hence for the Hague.

On Monday, upou information given to the Guards of leversl Robberies committed upon the high-ways, two Horfemen belonging to the Garison of Louvain, were seited entring into this City, and carried to the Spanish Court of Guards, where proof being made against them, they were found guilty, and in the afternoon hanged upon two trees on the lide of the highway where they ad committed the robbery ; which leverity tis hoped may be a terror to the . reft of them, and fecure the ways for travellers.

On Tuesday last arrived here the Duke de Villa Hermofa our General of the Cavalry, and was here as well as in all other places of this Province honourably received; at his alighting he was complimented by the general Officers of the Army, and divers of the Nobility ; the fame day the Duke went to the Palace to a tend the Conftable of Cafille, and was the next day honourably Treated by him, with feveral of the principal perfons of the Court ; he . intends to take a view of all the Horfe which as yet continue in their Quarters between this City, Louvain and Malines, but will be fuddenly drawn our to a place appointed for the Rendezvous for the reception of their new General.

Letters from Spain bring with them the pleasing tidings of his Catholick Majefties recovery from his Ague, afturing us that he is now past all danger.

His Excellency the Constable of Castille expects with fome impatiency the news of the nomination of his fucceffor for the Goverment of thele Provinces, till whole arrival tis not believed convenient for him to return for Spain although a Fregat lies ready equipped for him at Oftend for his transportation.

The Prince de Ligne was the 28th paft at Sleynach between Inspruck and, Trent, where the Princels being indisposed, obliged him # stay one day, he intended to be at Genous the 1 2th inftant, there to embark himself for Sicily.

From Maeffricht we are told, that the Baron de Afperen has taken a view of the whole Garifon, and caufed the Commissaries to give in true Lifts of them, he intends a more exact review of them in few days, and then to difpole of many of the Horse and Foot to other places.

The Marquis de Westerlos, Baron of Peterschem, and Colonel of a Regiment of Dragoons for the leivice of his Catholick Majefty, has employed many men for the fortifying of Peterschem, luspecting that the Elector of Cologne had a defign to have feiled it, upon a dispute rifon between the faid Marqueffe and the Abbot of Hocht opon antient pretensions, but tis hoped the Rhinegrave Governour of Maeffricht will take care to fee this bufinefs composed .

Paris, June 18. To morrow his most Christian Majefty goes from \$\$ Germains to Verfailles, where he intends to continue about a formight, and at his return to divert himfelf at his Capp neer St Germains. This evening Madam is expected at st Germains.

The Countels of Norshumberland infinitely affilted for the loss of the Earl her Husband, arrived here on Munday laft in the evening, and this afternoon departs hefte on her way for England.

The 4th inftant, Cafimir King of Poland arrived at Meaux with the Princels Palatine, where they were honourably received by the Inhabitants, and the Regiment of Louvigny, and complimented at the Bifhops Palace by the Lieutenant General, with the Officers and Sheriffs, as alfo by the Clergy ; the next day the Princels Palatine went thence on her way for Germany, and the King of Poland returned to Raincy.

London, June 10. This day His Majefty was pleafed to order his Proclamation to be iflued our, Commanding all Officers or Soldiers ferving in any of the Armies of the late Ulurped Yosers, and have been disbanded, cafhiered, or turned out of the fame, who are not under imprilonment, or other legal reftraint, or have not their constant habitations and families within the Cities of London and Westminster, or the Suburbs, or Borcugh of Southwark, or who cannot procure or obtain a Licence from His Majefty or one of his Majefti:s Principal Secretaries of State, or any three or more of his Privy Council in that behalfy to. depart cut of the fsid Cities of London or Weilminfter, the Liberties and Suburbs thereot, and the Borough of Southwark, on of before the 16th day of this inftanc Fune, and not to return again, or come within 20 miles of the faid places until after the 16th day of December next, and that in the mean time they wear not, ule, carry, or ride with any Sword, Piftol, or other Arms or Weapons, upon psin of His Majefties high displeasare ; ordering all offenders herein to be felled by the Lieutenants, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Con-Aables, &c. Their Armestaken away, and themselves lent to the Goal of the City or County where they are apprehended, and a note of their Names and Offences fent to the Lords of His Majefties Privy Councel, that they may be proceeded against for their Contempt according to Juffice, as may more at large be read in the Proclamation now published.
