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Falmouth, June 6.

THe third Instant arrived here the *London-Arms* of *London* from *Genoua*, laden with Marble and Rice, she came from *Cadis* in company with a Fleet of English Merchant ships under Convoy of the *Falcon* and *Speedwel*, which are most of them ere this arrived at their respective Ports.

The *Garden of Holland* which was employd from *Brest* to lade the Masts remaining of a wreck upon these coasts, put to sea this day with three or four small Bretons which brought Salt hither to a Market, and are bound homewards.

Warsaw, May 27. We have now great hopes of a reconciliation of all differences, and that the dissatisfy'd Nobility will find it their interest to return to their obedience. The *Castellan* of *P Sna* is said to be dead of the wounds he received in the Diet assembled at *Scroda*, which has had no small influence upon the rest of that faction, who apprehend the like or more exemplary punishment, the people beginning to own their true interest in the defence of their King and his Government, and to discover the Arts and Subtilties of the great pretenders to liberty.

His Majesty impatiently expects the issue and success of the lesser Diets, and will not without a manifest necessity summon the *Arrereban*, or Convention of the Nobility armed in the field, lest they should too highly resent the conspiracy formed against the present Government, and proceed with too much violence and severity upon those who are more then suspected to be the authors and fomenters of our troubles.

The *Castellan* of *Podlachia*, a discreet Senator lately employd by his Majesty to General *Sobiesky*, is returned, by whom the said General has given his Majesty assurance of his obedience and readines for his service; and that whatsoever opinions might have been conceived of him, he had never any design but what he understood to be for the advantage of the Crown.

A Courier lately arrived from *Loopold* tells us, that the Polish Commissioners were there in readines to Treat with the *Cossacks*, whose Deputies were expected. That people are it seems divided amongst themselves, those amongst them who have Estates and now enjoy them, desiring nothing with more zeal then a settled peace, but many Officers and others, who by the late disturbances have made themselves rich by the spoil of others, and have possess'd themselves of the Estates of the Nobility, fear restitution, and endeavor to promote a war.

Milan, May 28. The Duke d' *Ossuna*, our Governour having made his Entry into this place some days since with extraordinary pomp and Magnificency, and taken possession of his Governour's, has been pleased to confirm all the Orders formerly made by the Governours his predecessors, and the Officers preferred by them. He has thought fit for the avoiding of all disturbances to forbid the carrying of Fire-Arms in any City under his command and jurisdiction, permitting them to be born only by travellers upon the high-ways, and those of a fixed size and bigness, which are to be left at the Gates of the respective Cities.

This last week the Duke was informed of the death of the Prince de *Bozqueto*.

The Queen Regent of *Spain* has conferred the Office of Great Chancellor of this State upon Don *Raphael Zapora*, a member of the Council of *Arragon*.

Legorn, June 2. The 26 instant arrived here his Excellency the Lord Viscount *Falconbridge* from *Genoua* upon one of that States Gallies, where he was presently visited on board by Sir *John Finch*, his Majesties Resident at the Great Dukes Court, Sir *Tho. Clusterbuck*, the English Consul, the Captains of the English men of war then in Port, and most of the Merchants, and saluted by the Guns from their ships, where also passed mutual salutes between the Gally and the Town; which ending, the Governour of the Town came on board to welcome His Excellency in the name of the present Great Duke; upon his landing, his Excellency was attended by *Signior Canonico*, a Gentleman from the Great Duke, to inform his Excellency of the death of the late Great Duke his Father, and to know his resolution touching his coming to *Florence*; for which place his Excellency intends to set forwards on Monday next to make his Entry on Wednesday, to visit the Great Duke *incognito*, and to depart from thence the Saturday following on his way for *Venice*.

The 31th past arrived here the *Neptune* Pink in 10 days from *Tunis*, informing, that 17 French men of war continue to block up that Port, suffering no vessels to pass in or out; at the departure of this vessel they had a design of sailing to *Porto Farina* to endeavor the burning of the Turkish ships that are in that Port, and to attempt the taking of the Port there, having it seems little hopes of concluding a peace, the Turks standing high on their demands of 110 pieces of 8 for every French Captive, and 40000 for damages received by the French since their continuance before their Port.

By the same Pink we are told, that 25 Christian Slaves lately escaped from *Biseria* in a Bregantine, that 6 Turkish Bregantines are gone out from *Porto Farina* and *Quilletta* to cruize, and many others sitting out at *Biseria* for the same employment.

Yesterday arrived here three French ships in 22 days from *Alexandria*.

Vienna, June 4. The Empress *Eleanor* is well recovered of her Feavor, during which distemper, she was frequently visited by their Majesties; she has still thoughts of taking her journey of pilgrimage to our Lady of *Zelle*, and their Imperial Majesties of returning to reside in this City.

The Imperial Army has past the *Wasg*, and the Regiment of *Baden* has taken up Quarters upon the Estate of the Prince *Ragotski*, where it seems they have committed some disorders, of which the Archbishop of *Graz* has made complaint in an Audience he had from the Emperor on Thursday last.

The Deputies of *Upper Hungary* are still pressing the Emperor that they may not be obliged to Quarter his forces or receive German Garisons, but as yet the Emperor has not declared his resolution, but his forces still continue their march towards them.

Si. the Orry has hitherto evaded the importunities of the Nuncio, promising to make what submissions the Church shall please to require of him for his heretical opinions, provided he may not be sent to *Rome*; he pretends to extraordinary experiments in Chymistry, in which he spends much time, promising to make Gold, and discover

discover excellent secrets in Physick, the better to induce the Emperor to intercede for his preservation.

Here is lately returned by Post from Poland the Count de Schaffenberg, giving his Imperial Majesty an account of the state of affairs in that kingdom, where, by the great prudence and excellent conduct of that king, many of the discontented great ones have been prevailed with to lay aside their animosities, and reconcile themselves to the Court, so that tis hoped that kingdom may in little time be settled again in peace, and their Enemies frustrated of their hopes.

Brussels, June 13. On Sunday last Don Estevan de Gamarra the Spanish Ambassador to the States of the United Provinces, but at present in this Court, entertained the Dukes of Lunenbourg's Envoye to the same States, lately returned from Dunkirk (where he had complimented his most Christian Majesty in the name of the Dukes his Masters) the next day the said Envoye departed hence for the Hague.

On Monday, upon information given to the Guards of several Robberies committed upon the high-ways, two Horsemen belonging to the Garrison of Louvain, were seized entering into this City, and carried to the Spanish Court of Guards, where proof being made against them, they were found guilty, and in the afternoon hanged upon two trees on the side of the highway where they had committed the robbery; which severity tis hoped may be a terror to the rest of them, and severly the ways for travellers.

On Tuesday last arrived here the Duke de Villa Hermosa our General of the Cavalry, and was here as well as in all other places of this Province honourably received; at his alighting he was complimented by the general Officers of the Army, and divers of the Nobility; the same day the Duke went to the Palace to attend the Constable of Castille, and was the next day honourably Treated by him, with several of the principal persons of the Court; he intends to take a view of all the Horse which as yet continue in their Quarters between this City, Louvain and Malines, but will be suddenly drawn out to a place appointed for the Rendezvous for the reception of their new General.

Letters from Spain bring with them the pleasing tidings of his Catholick Majesties recovery from his Ague, assuring us that he is now past all danger.

His Excellency the Constable of Castille expects with some impatience the news of the nomination of his successor for the Government of these Provinces, till whose arrival tis not believed convenient for him to return for Spain although a Fregat lies ready equipped for him at Ostend for his transportation.

The Prince de Ligne was the 28th past at Sleynach between Inspruck and Trent, where the Princess being indisposed, obliged him to stay one day, he intended to be at Genoua the 12th instant, there to embark himself for Sicily.

From Maestricht we are told, that the Baron de Asperen has taken a view of the whole Garrison, and caused the Commissaries to give in true Lists of them, he intends a more exact review of them in few days, and then to dispose of many of the Horse and Foot to other places.

The Marquis de Westerlo, Baron of Peterschem, and Colonel of a Regiment of Dragoons for the service of his Catholick Majesty, has employed many men for the fortifying of Peterschem, suspecting that the Elector of Cologne had a design to have seized it, upon a dispute risen between the said Marquess and the Abbot of Hocht upon antient pretensions, but tis hoped the Rhinegrave Governour of Maestricht will take care to see this business composed.

Paris, June 18. To morrow his most Christian Majesty goes from St Germain to Versailles, where he intends to continue about a fortnight, and at his return to divert himself at his Cappuzier St Germain. This evening Madam is expected at St Germain.

The Countess of Northumberland infinitely afflicted for the loss of the Earlier Husband, arrived here on Monday last in the evening, and this afternoon departs hence on her way for England.

The 4th instant, Casimir King of Poland arrived at Meaux with the Princess Palatine, where they were honourably received by the Inhabitants, and the Regiment of Louvigny, and complimented at the Bishops Palace by the Lieutenant General, with the Officers and Sheriff, as also by the Clergy; the next day the Princess Palatine went thence on her way for Germany, and the King of Poland returned to Raincy.

London, June 10. This day His Majesty was pleased to order his Proclamation to be issued out, Commanding all Officers or Soldiers serving in any of the Armies of the late Usurped Powers, and have been disbanded, cashiered, or turned out of the same, who are not under imprisonment, or other legal restraint, or have not their constant habitations and families within the Cities of London and Westminster, or the Suburbs, or Borough of Southwark, or who cannot procure or obtain a Licence from His Majesty or one of his Majesties Principal Secretaries of State, or any three or more of his Privy Council in that behalf, to depart out of the said Cities of London or Westminster, the Liberties and Suburbs thereof, and the Borough of Southwark, on or before the 16th day of this instant June, and not to return again, or come within 20 miles of the said places until after the 16th day of December next, and that in the mean time they wear not, use, carry, or ride with any Sword, Pistol, or other Arms or Weapons; upon pain of His Majesties high displeasure; ordering all offenders herein to be seized by the Lieutenants, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Constables, &c. Their Armes taken away, and themselves sent to the Goal of the City or County where they are apprehended, and a note of their Names and Offences sent to the Lords of His Majesties Privy Council, that they may be proceeded against for their Contempt according to Justice, as may more at large be read in the Proclamation now published.

Seal, June 11. This day arrived in the Downs, but made no stay there. The John and Margares, and the Castle Fregat, both of them from Bantam.
