Plymouth, June 1 2.

His day arrived here the Advife Fregat with feveral Merchants under his Convoy, bound for the Streights, who the fame day fet fail from hence in purluance of their voyage.

Barn, taple June 12. This laft week arrived here the Margaret of Oleron from Rocbelle, the Mary of Argenton and the Port Louis; all of them laden with Salt, Vinegar, and Brandy.

On TI ursday last was cast away upon this Bar a small vessel of this Harbor laden with Coals.

Cadis, May 25. We have not yet any certain news of the appearance of the Gallions though daily expected.

Several Turkith feamen who were on board the Argier men of war in the encounter between them and Captain *Kempthor a* speak with a kind of altonihment of his great valor and conduct in that unequal engagement, from which the Turkifh fhips went away, carrying with them many marks of that days fervice 3 affirming that one of their men of war of 30 Guns was for roughly handled by him, that flue cou d not be kept above water but funk in the Bay of Tethuan.

Rome May 28. The Portuguele Ambaffador made his feconc Entry as Ambaffador of Obedience on the 22 inftant with ex raordina y pomp and splendor. Don Gasper Altieri the Popes Nephew with the Guards receiving him at his Palace, and conducting him to St Peters Church, the Greac Guns being in the mean time fired at the Cafile St Angelo; having ended his Devotion, he was thence conducted to the Vatican, and in a publick Confiftory, received wi h the honours due to his Character, where having prefented his Credentials and payed obedience according to form, he was entertait ed by the Pope at Dinner with all his Train, and afterwards returned with the fame pomp as he came to his Palace, and again faluted by the great Gaus. The fame afternoon he began his vifits to the Colleage, and in the evening expoled great numbers of Torches before his Palace, where was also erected a Machine, from whence flowed a Fountain of Wine which ran the whole day the mbaff_dor the fame evening throwing about leveral handfuls of me ey amongst the people.

Madrid, May 29. 7 he Confrable of Cassille continuing to follicite her Catholick Maj fly to be 10 al ed from his Government of the Netherlands, the air of which Countrey he supposes to be prejudic al to 1 ts health, has dispatcht away a Courier to Vienna to consult with the Emperor about the cloice which is to be made of a successfor to the said Government.

The King daily recovers flrength, and the little fits of bis Ague which yet continue on him, hinder him not from his daily exercises amongst the young Lords of the Court, which has much revived the drooping spirits of the Nobility.

The Popes Nuncio has left this place to be prefent at a general Chapter or Convention of the Cordeliers at Valadolid, where they have made choice for General of their Order, of Father Paluci, a Sicilian and Guardian of Jorufalem, fo that the Nuncio who had thoughts of prefiding in that Affembly, intends fuddenly to return hither.

• Vienna, June 7. The 4th inftant their Imperial Majeffices arrived hete from Laxembourg, great preparations are making for Comedies and other diversions for the lolemanising the Emperors birth day on the 9th inftant. The Imperial Army met according to their Orders at their Rendezvous about *Tyrnaw*, and after fome days of reft marched thence towards *Npper Hungary*, upon the frontiers whereof they found, that the Hungarians had prepared fo warmly to entertain them in the Forrefts, where they had fet ffrong guards upon all the possess that finding it roo hazardous to attempt an entrance that way, it was thought to be more convenient to draw off towards the frontiers of *Poland* and *Zipferland*, hoping to find lefs oppofition and an eafter passage that way into Hungary.

gary. The Count Efferhafi is joyned to the Imperial Army with a body of 5000 Hungarian Hoffe and 3000 Foot, by which addition the whole Army there is computed to amount to above 30 thousand men, to which (though it be a confiderable Army) the Emperor intends to add more, the Leavies of new Companies, being every where advanced with much diligence.

A Courier lately arrived here informs, that a confiderable body of an Army was lately feen to march neer *Waradin*, confifting of many Companies drawn out of *Tranfylvania*, Moldavia, and Walashia, amongft whom were observed to be 15 Enfignes of the Turks, but it was not yet discovered what they intended, whither to fecure their frontiers only, or to affift Prince Ragotsky in the defence of the Upper Hungary.

fence of the Upper Hungary. The Prince Ragotsky's Mother is now foliciting on the behalf of her ion to make his peace with the Emperor, and procure his pardon, offring the Emperor to entertain a confiderable number of men in his fervice, and to pay down a large fum of Moneys.

pay down a large fum of Moneys. The Deputies from Hungary are difinitied their attendance here, having in vain made their addreffes to the Emperor for the countermanding the march of his Army, and the withdrawing of the German Garrilons from Hangary; they had fatther defired, that a full Affembly of the States of that Province might be fummoned, to whom might be committed the care of pur ifhing the Rebels, without involving the innocent in their fuffrings.

Part of the Artillery defigned for the Imperial Army is already fent away, and the reft may follow in tew days, fo foon as the Horfes are atrived which have been bought for the draught of them.

General Spork has put a German Garilon into Trenshin upon the borders of Hungary, and intends to do the like in a'l other places in the Upper Hungary which shall fall into his hands, which the inhabitants a prehending, have batricadoed up all the passages into their Countrey, statending to keep themselves upon their guard till they hear the success of their Deputies, whom they employd to the Emperor.

Hambourg June 10. From Erford we are told, that three Regiments of the Duke of Lorrains forces are quartered in the County of Wittenstein, under the Command of the Baron de Lijp, expecting the Dukes farther Orders.

From Copenhagen, that the Heer de Wit, Ambassador from the States of the United Provinces, arrived there the 1st instant, and intended to make his publick entry the 6th.

Queen Chriftina's Envoy employed to Stockholm, has taken his leave of the Court there, and is returning to Dantzick, where on the 5th inftant artived the Vice-Chancellor of Poland to take the homage due from that Cisy to the King his Mafter. From Multony we are informed that the Great Duke had no intention as was leandaloufly reported to turn Mahometan, but only had propoled the alteration of fomething in the Greek Church which he fuppoled to be difonant from the word of God. The fame Letters affirm, that the Mulcovites are lomewhat more then formerly inclined to entertain a good underftanding with the Sewdes.

clined to entertain a good understanding with the Sewdes. From Halberstads we are told, that the Elector of Erandenbourg's forces were posselt of Regenstein, which was a place of great itrength, and that the Lunenbourgers were encamped at Blankembourg about a League distant from the Gastle, impatiently expecting the end of the Truce, during which, the neighbouring Princes endeavour to compole the dispute between them, but tis fearod their interpolition will not have any good effect, both parties seeming resolved to justify their pretensions. In the mean time the Officers of each party are charging one another with their Papers ; amongst others, Major General Stanck was pleafed to write from Planckenbourg to the Commander Fordel, Governour of Regenstein, to congratulate his new Government of fo ftrong a place, telling him, if he intended to keep it, it would be neceflary for him to procure Mofes his Rod to draw waters out of the Rocks, to which the Governour returned his answer, that the Brandenbougers could not want water fo long as their ftores of wine lasted, but if the place was attempted, he should find that their Women had hot water enough to drive them from the walls.

Hague, June 20. The Count d' Estradesformerly Ambafisdor from His most Christian Majetty to the States of these United Provinces, arrived lately here but without any publick Character, and went hence to Amsterdam, intending in few days to return to his Government of Dunkirk.

The Venfioner de Wit is lately returned hither from Groningue with leveral other Deputies which were employed with him by the States.

The 15th inftant arrived at Middlebourg a Skipper, Peter Van Goethen with his fhip from the Terceras, who informs, that on the 13th of the 1.ft month he met near that Ifland the Spanish Gallions on their way homewards from the Indies, confisting of 18 fail, so that we conclude them arrived before this at Cadis.

Captain *Toll* with the Merchants fhips under his prorection is fuddenly expected home, having let fail from *Ca*dis the 16th paft.

Our Vice-Admiral Van Ghent is with his fquadron gone from Cadis, with intention to renew a Treaty with those of sally.

Our Convoy defigned for the streights lies ready at the Texel to fail with the first fair wind.

Paris, June 21. An Extraordinary Courier is lately arrived here from Monfieur de Gremonville, who left the Emperors Court at Vienna, on the 8th inflant, and Reports that the Prince Ragotsky, was arrefted by his Mother, who had formerly used all her Arts to prevent the diffurbances railed in Hungary, who had delivered him into the hands of the Imperial forces, upon the news whereof the people which had revolted in the Upper Hungary, had layd down their Armcs, and the Garrifons opened their Gates and admitted the Empemors forces, and that his Imperial Majefty intends to place confiderable Garrifons in all their fitrong places and Forts, End to find out and punish the Authors of these diffurbances.

His most Christian Majesty has bestowed the Abbies which lay vacant upon the doath of the Bishop of Langres, upon the Abbot d' Harcourt, referving a yearly pension out of them, of 8000. Crownes, which is to be paid to the Chevalier de Lorrain, with 4000. Crownes more which are to be yearly raised out of other Benistices.

His Majefty intends on Thursday next to go from St Germains to Verfailles to continue there about a fortnight, intending after his return from thence, to St Germains, to visit Chambeurg.

The Conflable of Cafiile wholy intent upon his return into Spain, defired lately His Majeflics Paf. port to fecure him in his paffage through France, which His Majefly readily fent him, Ordering Monfieur de Louuoy to write to him, that he was much faithfied with his Refolution to pafs through any part of his Dominions, that he might have fome opperunity given him to make him fome return for the Civilities he had received from him, and has Ordered it be interted into his Pafsports, that all the baggage belonging to the Conflable or any of his trayn or attendants, fhall freely pafs without any fearchs or payment of any kind of Duty.

Madam arrived the 12th inftant at Calais, and the next day at Bologne, and in both places was received with Extraordinary Honour, the 14, fhe was Honourably Entertained at Montrevil by the Duke d' Elbeuf, the 15th the came to Abbeville, where the was met by feveral of His Majeftiesforces, the 17th to Beauvais, and the 18th to St Germains, where the was received by their Majefties and the whole Court with great Exprefitions of joy.
