The same Letters affirm, that the Muscovites are somewhat more then formerly inclined to entertain a good understanding with the Sewdes.

From Halberstand we are told, that the Elector of Erandenbourg's forces were possest of Regenstein, which was a place of great itrength, and that the Lunenbourgers were encamped at Blankembourg about a League distant from the Gastle, impatiently expecting the end of the Truce, during which, the neighbouring Princes endeayour to compole the dispute between them, but tis feared their interpolition will not have any good effect, both parties seeming resolved to justify their pretensions. In the mean time the Officers of each party are charging one another with their Papers; amongst others, Major General Stanck was pleased to write from Planckenbourg to the Commander Forael, Governour of Regenstein, to congratulate his new Government of so strong a place, telling him, if he intended to keep it, it would be necessary for him to procure Moses his Rad to draw waters out of the Rocks, to which the Governour returned his answer, that the Brandenbougers could not want water fo long as their stores of wine lasted, but if the place was attempted, he should find that their Women had hot water enough to drive them from the walls.

Paris, Jime 21. An Extraordinary Courier is lately arrived here from Monsieur de Gremonville, who lest the Emperors Court at Vienna, on the 8th instant, and Reports that the Prince Ragotsky, was arrested by his Mother, who had formerly used all her Arts to prevent the disturbances raised in Hungary, who had delivered him into the hands of the Imperial forces, upon the news whereof the people which had revolted in the Upper Hungary, had layd down their Arms, and the Garrisons opened their Gates and admitted the Emperors forces, and that his Imperial Majesty intends to place considerable Garrisons in all their strong places and Forts, What to find our and punish the Authors of these disturbances.

His most Christian Majesty has bestowed the Abbies which lay vacant upon the doath of the Bishop of Langres, upon the Abbot d' Harcourt, reserving a yearly pension out of them, of 8000. Crownes, which is to be paid to the Chevalier de Lorrain, with 4000. Crownes more which are to be yearly raised out of other Benisices.

His Majesty intends on Thursday next to go from St Germains to Versailles to continue there about a fortnight, intending after his return from thence, to St Germains, to vikt Chambourg.
