UNIVERSITIES OF OXFORD AND CAMBRIDGE ACT 1923

A Statute made by the Governing Body of Corpus Christi College, in the University of Oxford, on the 8th August 1979, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1923.

Whereas Her Majesty, in pursuance of the Regency Acts 1937 to 1953, was pleased, by Letters Patent dated the 16th day of July 1979, to delegate to the six Counsellors of State therein named or any two or more of them full power and authority during the period of Her Majesty's absence from the United Kingdom to summon and hold on Her Majesty's behalf Her Privy Council and to signify thereat Her Majesty's approval for anything for which Her Majesty's approval in Council is required:

And whereas a Representation duly made to Her Majesty in Council by the Secretary of State for the Environment that burials should be discontinued as hereinafter directed in the Churchyard of St. Mary and All Saints, Whalley, in the County of Lancashire, shown hatched on the plan annexed

hereto, has in pursuance of an Order in Council made the 23rd day of May 1979, and duly published, been taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother, and His Royal Highness The Prince Charles, Prince of Wales, being authorised thereto by the said Letters Patent, and in exercise of the powers conferred on Her Majesty by section 1 of the Burial Act 1853 (1853 c. 134) and of all other powers in that behalf, do hereby, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, on Her Majesty's behalf order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:

1. Burials shall be discontinued forthwith in the Churchyard of St. Mary and All Saints, Whalley, Lancashire, shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto.

Provided that—

(a) in any vault or walled grave now existing in the said Churchyard, burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stone-work or brick-work properly cemented;

(b) in any earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (Churchyard of St. Mary and All Saints, Whalley, Lancashire) Order 1979.
