Venice, January 2. N. S. They write from Rome, that the Pope has declar'd he will receive no more Proposals on the Part of the Duke of Savoy, in relation to the Disputes that are between the two Courts of Rome and Turin: Whereupon Monsieur de Gubernalis has forborn to make any farther Applications to his Holiness, and is preparing to publish some Papers in Defence of his Royal Highness, against the Proceedings of the Court of Rome. These Letters add, that the Princess Carbogniano was arrived there, and had brought with her the young Marchioness of Caravagio, who is said to be exceeding Rich; and Dona Bernardino, the Pope's Sister, having been to visit her upon her Arrival, it is thought his Holiness has some Intentions of marrying her to Don Charles Albani, one of his Nephews, tho' the Lady is not above thirteen Years of Age. The Cardinal de la Tremouille has received Orders to assist at the Process appointed to examine into, and prove the Nobility of Count Albergotti, on whom the French King has conferr'd the Order of the Holy Ghost. They write from Milan, that *Te Deum* had been Sung there, on account of the late Victory obtain'd by General Staremberg over the Duke of Anjou's Forces in Spain. All the Cannon belonging to the

Town were fired thrice on this Occasion. Our Letters from Napies of the 23d of the last Month advise, that on the 14th an Earthquake had been felt at Taranto, and in the Provinces of Barri and Basilicata, but without doing any considerable Damage; and that four of their Gallies having attack'd a Tartan belonging to Messina, the Commander made a very obstinate Defence for some time, but finding it otherwise impossible to prevent her falling into the Enemy's Hands, he set fire to the Powder in the Gun-Room, and blew her up.

Hanover, January 9. N. S. Though it was thought his Electoral Highness would have order'd the Carnival to be suspended for this Year, by reason of the Plague, it was nevertheless open'd the 4th Instant in the usual manner. They write from Saxony, that the Counsellors Pfingstein and Imhoff had been Try'd and Condemn'd, for having concluded the Treaty of Alt-Ranfadt with the Ministers of Sweden, upon Terms very disadvantageous to their Master the King of Poland; and that the first of those Gentlemen was to be Beheaded by virtue of the Sentence given against him, but that Monsieur Imhoff's Friends had interceded with his Majesty in his Behalf, and got his Punishment chang'd into a perpetual imprisonment. This Court has just now received from the Duke of Wolfenbuttel the Copy of a Letter written from Milan, and containing the Relation of an Action which happened in Spain the 10th of December last, in which the Duke of Anjou's Forces were totally Routed by those of the Allies under the Command of General Staremberg.

Brussels, January 17. N. S. Our Letters of the 12th Instant from Germany have brought hither the agreeable News, that the Action which pass'd the 10th of December in Spain, was entirely to the Advantage of the Allies, notwithstanding the confident Reports of the French to the contrary, and their affected Demonstrations of Joy on that Occasion. This News has been confirm'd to us by a Courier from Duffeldorp, and the Marquis de los Rios, a Major-General in his Catholick Majesty's Service, was expected yesterday at Antwerp in his Way to England, whither he is sent by the King of Spain with an Account of that Victory. The Cannon of this Town were fired yesterday, and the like will be done in all the other Towns in these Provinces that have been reduc'd to his Catholick Majesty's Obedience. Orders are also given for the Singing of *Te Deum*, and for such other publick Demonstrations of Joy as are usual on the like Occasions. Letters from Paris of the 12th Instant say, General Staremberg march'd with his Army thro' Saragossa on the 31st of the last Month, towards Catalonia; and that the Enemy's Troops decamp'd on the 23d from Siguença, directing their March by Daroca towards the Ebro.

Hague, January 16. N. S. We expect every Moment the arrival of a General Officer in the King of Spain's Service, sent by his Catholick Majesty to the Queen of Great Britain and the States General, with an Account of the late Action near Brihuega, and the present Situation of Affairs in Spain. Our Letters from France say, the Siege

Siege of Gironne was continued; but we are told the Garrison had made a very vigorous Sally, in which they nail'd up several of the Enemy's Cannon, and ruin'd part of their Works. The Men of War design'd for the Mediterranean sail'd out of the Texel and Meuse the 11th Instant; those from the Texel have been since forced back by contrary Winds, but it is thought the others, who continued their Voyage, are arriv'd e'er this at Faghtmouth, or in the Downs. The Elector of Triers died the 8th Instant at Coblents, and is succeeded in his Bishoprick and Electorate by his Coadjutor, the Prince of Lorain. The States-General have made Choice of the Count Dhona to Command their Troops in Spain, in the room of General Belcaffel, who was killed in the late Battle; but it is not yet known if he will accept of that Employment.
