Dublin, June 14. N Saturday last arrived here the Right Honourable the Countess of Offory; who was met upon the way and attended into this City by a Train of above 60 Coaches, most of them with Six Horses, and about 200 Gentlemen on Horseback; his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant received her at her Coach fide where the alighted, and conducted her to her aparement in Sir James Shanes house, where the received the Compliments of all the great perfors of the Town, and intends with the first fair wind to put to sea from hence for England.

His Excellency being informed of feveral violencies; murders and robberies committed by the Tories, has ordered a Proclamation to be issued out against the principal of them, commanding them to submit themselves to their Tryals before the 30th of this instant June, after which time they are to be taken and adjudged as Rebels and Tazitors to His Maiesty, promising a reward of Twenty pound for every of them that tha! be taken alive, or for every head of them that shall be brought into the Sheriff of the County where he shall be killed.

All the Army in Ireland is ordered to a general Rendezvous at the Carragh of Kildare in the County of Kildare on the 20th of July next, where his Excellency intends to take a view of it.

Falmouth, June 15. A Dutch Merchant fhip put in here the 11th inftant from Rofs in Ireland, whether the was employed to lade home with Provisions, but a late death of Cattle in those parts, had so much raised the prizes, that The was forced to change her design and take in Coals.

Rome, June 3. The Pope having taken notice of the Lownels of the Apostolick Chamber, which upon several occasions has been much Exhausted by the Popes his Predecessors, has begun to make a considerable Retrenchment in all his Expences, and to make an abatement in the Salleries to all his Officers, and has for Example began it upon those Charges which he lately conferred on his Relations; Reducing the pay of the General of the Church, from 12 to hix thouland Crowns a year, dealing proportionably with others. He intends to make fale of two of his Galleys, which are supposed to be more then are necessary for his service.

The Cardinal de Bouillon is well advanced on his way towards Bavaria. The Duke de Chaulnes the French Ambassador is upon his departure homewards, leaving the place he held, at all Ceremonies to the Portu-

gal Ambassador.

Vien a, June 7. The Emperor seems not altogether unwilling to hearken to the inteffirceon of the Princels Ragotski for the pardon of the Prince her Son, but intends to place strong Garisons in all the strong places which belonged to him till he shall have given full satisfaction of the truth of his pretended obedience and fidelity. The Imperial forces have taken Franschip in Hungary, and tis be-lieved will soon make themselves masters of the rest. Several of the principal inftruments in those late disturbances are taken, and amongst others, the Deputy who was sent by the Rebels to the Ottoman Court to beg the afsistance of the Turks, was seised on his return, and tis believed, will be made exemplary.

The Count de Tattenbach is hitherto reprieved, by rea-Jon of his diftemper which makes him insensible of his prefent condition; no Process is yet formed against the Count Serini and Frangipani, whose punishments its believed will be deferred till the affairs of Hungary be put into a more quiet posture.

Danzig, June 17. Ehe 12th instant Sir Peter Wich, Envoye Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain, left this place in Order to his return home; The Senate of this City having given him feveral testimonies of their respects, sending their Barge to attend him to his ship, and firing 9 Guns from their Castle as a salute

to him when he went on board.

Letters from several parts of Poland seem to represent the affairs of that kingdom to be in a much better posture then formerly; the party which was supposed to be confederated against the present Government, being much declined, and many of the most powerful amongst them falling off from them and closing with his Majesty and his Government. The lesser Diets have in most places declared for an Open and Armed Affembly in the field, for which his Majesty has issued out his Letters; upon his next and last summons; the Gentry and Nobility of every Palatinate and Circle are to appear in Arms at the place which is to be appointed for their Rendezvous under pain of death and confileation.

The Cities in Prusia have sworn fidelity to the Kings though many practices had been used by the disaffected

party to prevent it.

The two Generals Sobieski and Wisaiewsky are not yet fully reconciled; but tis hoped fuch endeavors will be used that may in probability effect it, or at loast prevent a confederation in the Army

A Letter from Camienick Pedolsky informs, that the Tartars have endeavoured to recruit the losses they received the last winter in their Horses, intending to try their fortunes once more in Ukrania. This notwithstanding an Envoy is lately arrived at Warsaw from Tarrary, offring

the King the affistance of the Cham.

From #kranin they find, that the Cossacks are not like to accept of the Treaty offered them by the Poles, whole Commissioners have for some time attended others from the Collacks for that purpole; the people are generally inclinable to peace, and willing to have a right understanding between them and the Crown of Poland, but the Officers and others who have by the late disturbances raised their own fortunes, defire to preferve them by a war, and are contriving how to deprive Dorofensko of his Command 22 General,

Hague, June 27. On Monday last the Pensionary de Wis with the Deputies employ'd with him to the City of Groningue, made their reports to the States General; concerning their arbitration of the point in dispute, touching the pretentions of several of the Citizens to voices in their Assembly by vertue of several Lands they held in the Province, whom they have thought fit to exclude by this new Regulation; upon the hearing it was resolved after a long debate, and the opposition made by the Deputies of two Provinces & that the sentence of the Arbitrators be confirmed under the great Seal of the States General, and fent away to the Province of Groningue, but with a reserve, that it shall not be put in execution, till after the expiration of three weeks, in which time the answer of the City of Graningue may be expected, and if the faid City feem diffatisfied, the execution may be suspended for a longer time.

Paris, June 28. His Majesty has countermanded the Order given to his Gallies to go to the assistance of Monneur'de Martel before Tunk, and has commanded the Count de Vivenne now at sea with them, to bring

them back again to Thoulan.

From Thoulon we are informed that two men of War which belonged to the Squadron of Monsieur de Martel, are lately returned under the command of the Chevalier de Valbella, informing that they left the said de Mar-tel before Tunis with 11 men of War, intending to take the first opportunity of sending in his sire ships to burn the Turkish ships within the Harbor, which to prevent, the Turks had taken down all their Masts, and drowned their ships, which they intended to weigh up again to soon as our ships were gone from their Port.

Letters of the first instant from Maltha tell us that the Grand Master had received intelligence, that the Prime Visier had appointed all the Ottoman Gallies to meet at Navarrin, where the Corlairs of Barbary were ordered to joyn with them, which gives him cause of jea-Touly, least they might have a deligne to make a desent upon Calabrid, Sicily, or Maltha it felf; which last place
