By the QUEEN, PROCLAMATION,

For Encouraging Seamen and Landmen to Enter themselves on Board Her Majesty's Ships of War.

W Hereas it is our Royal Intention to give all due W Encouragement to all such Seamen and Able-bodied Landmen, who shall voluntarily Enter themfelves in our Service, and remain on Board our Ships of War in our Royal Navy, we have thought fit (by and with the Advice of our Privy-Council) to Publish this our Royal Proclamation; and we do hereby Pro-mile and Declare, that all such Seamen and Ablebodied Landmen (not above the Age of Fifty five Tears, and not under the Age of Sixteen Tears) who at any time before the Twenty fifth Day of March next ensuing, shall voluntarily Enter themselves in our Service, with a Commission-Officer of any of our Ships of War, or with any Tulica of the Record of the of War, or with any Justice of the Peace, or Chief Mazistrate of any Town, or with any Vice-Admiral, to serve on Board any of our Ships or Vessels of War (Tenders only excepted) shall receive, as our free Gift and Royal Bounty, the respective Rewards and Al-Iowances following; (that is to say) every such Seaman two Months Pay, and every such Able-bodied Landman one Month's Pay, to be paid to them respetively by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of our Navy before the respective Shine on the land of our Navy before the respective Shine on the land. dively by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of our Navy, before the respective Ships, on which they shall be, do proceed to Sea. And we do hereby require and direct, That if any such Seaman, or Able-bodied Landman, shall, within the time before-mentioned, enser himself with any Justice of the Peace, or Chief Magistrate of any Town, or with any Vice-Admiral or other Commission-Officer, to serve on Board any of our Ships of War, or other Vessels before mentioned, such Justice of the Peace, or Chief Magistrate, Vice-Admiral, or other Commission-Officer respectively, shall give to each Man so entring a Certificate under his give to each Man so entring a Certificate under his Hand and Seal, without Fee or Reward, of his Entry, and the time of such Entry, and for what Ship, and shall thereby limit such a number of Days (not exceeding fourteen Days) as may be necessary for his repairing on Roard such Ship, or any other Ship. Tender pairing on Board such Ship, or any other Ship, Tender or Bomb Vessel in our Service, at the next Port which shall be appointed to receive them. And we do hereby declare, that all such Seamen and Able-bodied Landmen, who within the time aforesaid, shall Enter them-selves, as aforesaid, and within the time limited and appointed in Such Certificate, repair on Board any of our said Ships or Tenders appointed to receive them, (according to their Qualifications aforesaid, and not otherwise) shall be entituled to our Royal Bounty berein before appointed, and intended for them re-fpellively, and to their Pay from the time of their first Entring with such Justice of the Peace, or other Officer, as aforesaid; and that they shall be allowed time without Molestain to render themselves on Board our Ships of War: And therefore we do hereby require and command all Captains commanding any of our Ships of War, or other our Ships, and all other Persons what soever, authorized or impowered to impress Mariners for our Service, that they do not impress any such Seamen or Able-bodied Landmen, to whom such Certificate as aforesaid, shall be given, according to the true Intent and Meaning of this our Royal Proclamation on aug Men man in our Syrvice

fail to render themselves on Board such of our said Ships or Vesels, on which they shall Enter themselves to serve, or to which they shall belong, according to the Time limited by such Certificates or Tickets; nor any Person or Persons protested or implayed in the River, or on the Coasts, by the Commissioners of our Navy, Ordnance, Victualling, Customs or Transportation, or the Watermen in our Service, or such Watermen belonging to each Insuring Office within the Cities of London and Westminster and Limits thereof, for Insuring Houses against Loss by Fire, not exceeding thirty for each Office, whose Names and Places of Abode are or shall be Registred and Entred with the Secretary or other Officer of the Admiralty-Office. And to the end we may be truly informed what Persons shall so enter and render themselves to serve on Board our Fleet, in pursuance of this our Royal Proclamation, we do hereby require and command our respective Captains commanding any of our said Ships of War, or other our Ships or Vesels, as aforesaid, and also all Justices of the Peace, chief Mayistrates, Vice-Admirals, and other Commission-Officers aforesaid respectively, to transmit to the principal Officers and Commissioners of our Navy exast Lists and Accounts of the Names, Ages and Descriptions of the Persons who shall voluntarily enter themselves with them, and the Time when, and the Place where, and for what Ship, and of the Time which shall be allowed Persons who shall voluntarily enter themselves with them, and the Time when, and the Place where, and for what Ship, and of the Time which shall be allowed them respectively for rendring themselves on Board, and of the Time of their respective repairing on Board any of our said Ships. And we do hereby require and command the said Seamen and Landmen to repair on Board the respective Ships on which they shall so enter Command the Jaid Seamen and Landmen to repair on Board the respective Ships on which they shall so enter themselves, or to which they shall belong, within the Time limited by such Certificates or Tickets, on pain of our highest Displeasure. And we are graciously pleased further to declare, That Conduct-Mony, according to the Practice of the Navy, shall be allowed to all such Seamen and Landmen so voluntarily entring themselves on Board. according to the true Meaning themselves on Board, according to the true Meaning of this our Royal Proclamation. And for preventing any Deceits or Abuses which may happen by any Per-son or Persons leaving the Ships to which they belong, and entring him or themselves on Board any other of our Ships, in order to obtain the Bounty-Mony herein before granted, we do hereby likewise direct, declare and command, That such Seamen and Landmen belonging to any of our Ships or Vessels whatsoever, as shall absent themselves from any of the Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of our Seips, in order to obtain the said Bounty-Mony, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships they shall so leave, but also shall be severely punished according to their Demerits. And we do hereby further declare, That if such Men in our Service, who are or shall be permitted to be absent by such Tickets, as a sforesaid, do not repair on Board their respective Ships by the Time allowed by such Tickets, they shall not only be liable to be Imprest, but to suffer such other Punishment as by Law may and entring him or themselves on Board any other of but to suffer such other Punishment as by Law may be inslitted on them for such their Neglet. And we do hereby require all our Justices of the Peace, and other Magistrates, and also all our Captains of our Ships and others, who shall be imployed in Impressing Men for our Fleet, That they take particular care not to take up, Impress or Entertain any very old Men, Boys, or others, who by reason of Instrmity or otherwise, are not sitly qualified for our Service in our Royal Navy, for that none such shall be received by the Royal Proclamation, or any Men now in our Service, who by Tickets signed by any of our Flag Officers, have of shall have leave to be a sent from their Duty to the faid twenty fish Day of March next, before they shall be received by the Royal Navy, for that none such shall be received by the Officers of our Fleet into our Service. And we do hereby require and command all our fustices of the faid twenty fish Day of March next, before they shall Peace, Chief Magistrates, Constables, and other Officers.

ficers, That they do use their utmost Endeavours to secure, send and deliver to the Commissioners of our Navy at some near Sea-Port Town, or to such other Person as shall be appointed to receive them, all such Seamen, Watermen, Bargemen and Lightermen, fit for our Service, as shall be found stragling, in order to their being put on Board our Fleet in our Service, and that of what they shall do therein, they from time to time send an Account to the Commissioners of our Navy. And we do bereby direct the respective Officers of our Fleet, who shall receive such Seamen, 10 give Receipts for them, therein expressing the Names of Such Seamen, and on Board what Ship or Veffel, and the time when, and the place where they are received. And the Commissioners of our Navy are hereby directed to give Order, upon producing (at any Port where there are Officers immediately under their Directions) the said Receipts, to pay to the Person producing the same, twenty Stillings for each Seaman, and six Pence fame, twenty Shillings for each Seaman, and six Pence per Man for each Mile he shall be brought above twenty Miles. And we do hereby declare, That no Protedion of any Man in any Ships or Vessels imployed in the River, or on the Coast, by the Commissioners of our Navy, Ordnance, Vidualling, Customs or Transportation, shall be in Force for more than six Months from the Date thereof (except such as shall be signed by the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or any three or more of them.) And we do surther direct, That in all Protections the Persons be not only named, but described by their Places of Residence, and Imployment, and the Service for which they are Protected. ment, and the Service for which they are Proteded. And that if any of the said Persons shall be found upon the Water in any other Service than what they are protested for, they shall be liable to be Imprest, except protested for, they made to us, the Navy-Board, Ord-the Watermen belonging to us, the Navy-Board, Ord-nance, Vitualling, Customs, Transportation, and In-jurance Offices aforefuld. And we do hereby re-quire and command our Commissioners of our Navy, Ordnance, Vitualling, Customs and Transportation, that they do not protect more Men than their Scr-vice absolutely reanires, and to renew all the Penthat they do not protest more Men than their Scr-vice absolutely requires, and to renew all the Pro-tections within their reach by the end of the said time limited for Bounty-Mony, and to revoke all Protestions by them or any of them granted respe-ctively, so soon as the Service is over for which the same respectively were or shall be granted.

Vienna, Frinary 17. N. S. We have of late had Advices by leveral ways from Constantinople, that the Turks continue to make extraordinary Preparations for beginning a vigorous War with the Czar of Moscovy and King of Poland, and conducting the King of Sweeden into his own Country. Our last Letters are of the 18th of December, which confirm those Advices, and add, that fresh Orders were fent to the feveral Provinces of the Turkish Empire to raise Soldiers, and hasten the March of the Troops as much as possible: It is said that the Grand Visier intends to Command the Army in Person, but it is not expected that the Forces, which have lived in a long disuse of War, will upon this sudden Rupture be in any condition to March before the end of May next, or the be-ginning of June. We have by the fame Letters the tollowing Account of the Imprisonment of the Muicovite Ambassador on the 28th of November; his Excellency had Notice that he was defired to wait upon the Grand Viner, but in his way thither he was seized and carried Prisoner to the Seven Towers, together with thirty one Persons of his Attendance. Orders were at the same time given by the Port to keep him very close, and admit no one to speak with him. After this the Jungsur Aga, who is Captain of the Grand Viser's Life-Guards, went with about a hundred and fifty Janisaries and took Possession of his House, and

made an Inventory of all his Goods, which were likewise carried to the Seven Towers, with fix more of his Servants. The Ambassador is tolerably well entertained in his Imprisonment, at the Charge of the Ottoman Court. We have had Reports that the Turks had fent an Officer to Prince Ragotski, to encourage him to continue the War in Hungary as long as possible, but the Ministers here seem pretty ease at present in relation to the designs of the Turks, having had an Account that a Minister would be speedily sent from Constantinople, with affurances of the fincere intentions of the Port to maintain the Peace of Carlowitz with his Imperial The French Ambassador at the Port has offered to accompany the Grand Visier into the Field, and assist him with his Advice, as a Military Officer. He has likewise proffered to send for Ingineers and Gunners from France, to help and in-fruct the Turks in that part of the Art of War. The News we at first received from Spain by the way of France, concerning the Battel near Villa Viciosa, made People here very melancholy; but Count Hamilton being since arrived with Marshal Staremberg's Relation, has given great Satisfaction to this Court, and made it appear how grossy the French had imposed upon us by their Accounts. The Emperor has ordered Te Deum to be Sung for this Victory, which in all its Circumstances is this Victory, which in all its Circumstances is look'd upon to have been as bravely fought, and as gloriously won, as any other during this War. Monseur de Mellarede, the Savoy Minister, who was long expected, arrived here the 12th Instant, having been hindred in his Journey by the badness of the Ways; he has had his Audiences, and receives assurances from all the Ministers, of the graph Dissolving of this Court to content the the real Disposition of this Court to content the Duke of Savoy, which we hope will be effectually done, fince it is of fo much importance to the common Interest that that Prince should be satisfied.
