HIS Day the following Address was prefented to Her Majesty by his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, as President of the Convocation of the Province of Canterbury, accompanied by the Prolocutor of the Lower House, and a Committee of both Houses.

The humble Address of the Archbishop, President of the Convocation of the Province of Canterbury, and of the Bishops and Clergy of the same Province in Convocation affembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most Loyal and Dutiful Sub-W jeas, the Archbishop, Bishops and Clergy of the Province of Canterbury in Convocation assem-bled, having received your Majesty's most Gracious Licence by the Hands of the Lord Dartmouth, hold

Licence by the Hands of the Lord Dartmouth, bold our felves bound in Duty and Gratisude to return our most humble Acknowledgments for the same, and for the Pious Zeal and Care your Majesty is pleased to express thereby, for the Honour of Religion in general, and particularly for the Dostrine, Discipline and Worship of the Church of England.

And we humbly crave Leave to assure your Majesty, that according to the Trust and Considence you repose in Us, we will apply our selves serieusly to deliberate upon what soever shall appear to us necessary, stand convenient for the Honour and Service of Almighty God, the Good and Quiet of the Church, and the Government thereof as by Law Establish d. Almighty God, the Good and Quiet of the Church, and the Government thereof as by Law Establish'd.

We will also, with all Respect and Duty, receive and consider whatsoever shall be sent to us from your Majesty, in pursuance of your Gracious Intentions signified in the said Licence; and will chearfully and constantly pay the Fidelity and Allegiance, which we bave all Sworn to your Majesty, whom we pray God to continue Long and Happily to Reign over us.

To which her Majesty was pleas'd to make the fol-lowing most Gracious Answer:

I have done my Part, and expect that you will lay afde every thing which may hinder the good Effect of my Licence, and apply your selves heartily to those weighty Matters which tend to the Honour of our Holy Religion, and the Welfare of my Subjects.

The Meetings of the Gommissioners for adjusting the Assairs of this Town, are continued; the the fresh Disputes that have been raised concerning the Title of Exthat have been raised concerning the Title of Excellency, which the Count de Schonborn, the Imperial Commissioner, positively insists upon from the other Ministers, made us apprehend that there would be an Interruption of that Assembly. The Count has deliver'd in a Protestation and Reservation upon his Pretensions alone to that Title, which was never resus'd him by way of Complaisance; but since he would establish it by an absolute Claim of Right, the Ministers from the King of Prussia and Elector of Hanover, have, by Order of their Masters, declin'd complying with that of their Masters, declin'd complying with that Demand, and have given in their Reasons to be entred in the Protocoll. In the mean time Mr. Wich, her Britannick Majelly's Envoy, endea-vours very earnefly to find out some Expedient for the removing this Difficulty, and ealing the Town of that great Expence with which it is at present encumber'd, thro' the many Delays in this Negotiation. The Burghers mer the 22d Instant, in order to come to a final Resolution, in relation to the Proposal of encreasing the Number of their own Troops, and augmenting the Garrison of this Place to three thousand Men, whereas it confilled heretofore of no more than two thousand. This Propolition has at last been rejected, upon a Suggestion that it will be impossible for them to raise Contributions sufficient for their Subsistence. The Swedes give out, that the Janisaries had receiv'd Orders to March from Constantinople the 1st Inflant; and that the King of Sweden defigned to be present at the intended Siege of Caminieck. According to these Reports, the Troops under the Command of General Crassau in Pomerania are to be join'd by the Swedish Forces in the Dutchy of Bremen; and the Swedes flatter themselves that the Emperor will suffer the Regiments they have been raising in the Dutchy of Deux-Ponts to March into Pomerania. The Swedish Colonel Ehsenshild its come hither from Stockholm, being charg'd with Letters for the King his Master. He reports, that the Plague is much abated at Stockholm; but we hear it spreads it self all over the Country; infomuch, that it is got among fome Regiments in Schonen, and the Troops that were affembled in Finland are dispers'd on that Account. The King of Poland continues at Leiptick, but it is thought he will be present at an Hunting Match near Wermsstorff, and have an Interview with the King of Prussia.

Rruffels, February 2. N. S. Letters from Madrid of the 12th past bring an Account, that the Duke of Anjou continued with his Court at Saragossa, and that he had canton'd part of his Forces in the adjacent Villages. 'Tis .consirm'd from Honourable Mr. St. John, one of Her Majelly's thence, that General Staremberg was arriv'd with Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by this Army at Balaguer, which Post he supplied with Sir Clement Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies. all manner of Necessaries, and then continued his

March towards Catalonia. They write from before Gironne of the 19th, that the Siege of that Place had been much retarded by the late great Rains, which had defiroy'd their Trenches, and ruin'd their Works; and tho' the French pretend, that those Works are repair'd, and that they continue the Siege by the Sap, because of the Mines, whereof there is a great number; yet several Letters confirm our former Advices, that the Siege was turned into a Blockade. We have received Letters from France advising, that the French having some time since sitted out six or seven Privateers for an Expedition to the Coast of Brasil, had particularly directed them to make an Attempt upon the Gold Mines there. Pursuant to their Infructions, they landed seven or eight hundred Men near Rio Janeiro, but the Inhabitants of the Country took the Alarm, and falling upon them just as they were landed, they kill'd most of them, and made the rest Prisoners, the Sieur du Clair, who Commanded the Squadron, being one of the number. When those who were left on Board perceiv'd that their Delign had miscarried, they immediately flood out to Sea, and failed for Martineco, having lost most of their Men in the Expedition.

The Marquis de Lans arriv'd here three Days ago from Barcelona, from whence he was fent by his Catholick Majeffy, with an Account of the late Victory in Spain. Monfieur de Lintelo, the States Envoy to the King of Prussia, is likewise return'd hither from Berlin. Our Letters from the Fronviers advise, that the French have been busy in perfecting their Retrenchments between Douzy and Arras, and in turning the Scarpe into the Schelde, and that two thousand Peasants have been employ'd for that purpose; but it is thought their Works are at present interrupted by the Frost. They write from Paris of the 30th past, that the Mareschal de Villars was set out from thence, in order to review the Troops, and examine into the Condition of the Fortifications on the Frontiers; but we have as yet no Account of his Arrival in those Parts.
