TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT 1971

City of Bradford Metropolitan Council, Conservation Area, Southfield Square, Bradford

Notice is hereby given, in pursuance of section 277 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971, as amended that City of Bradford Metropolitan Council, as Local Planning Authority, after consultation with the West Yorkshire Metropolitan County Council have determined that the area described in the Schedule to this notice is an area of special architectural or bistoric interset, the character or special architectural or historic interest, the character or appearance of which it is desirable to preserve or enhance, and have accordingly designated the said area as a conservation area.

The effect of designating an area as a conservation area are as follows:

- Where any application for planning permission for development of land in or adjacent to the conservation area is made to the Council and the development would, in the opinion of the Council, affect the charac-ter or appearance of the conservation area, the appli-cation will be subject to the special procedure in section 28 of the Act.
- (2) Any building within a conservation area, other than an excepted building in section 58 (2) of the Act, and buildings excepted by the Secretary of State, must not be demolished without the consent of the Local Planning Authority.
- (3) Advertisements in a conservation area may also be controlled by the Local Planning Authority to avoid detraction from the appearance of the area.
- (4) Trees in a conservation area are also protected by the Act and any person doing any prohibited act including, felling, topping, lopping, uproduced at mildly damaging a tree will be guilty of an offence. Trees of a certain size or species or trees belonging to specified persons or bodies may be excluded by the Secretary of State.

Plans and details regarding this Conservation Area may be inspected during normal office hours at the office of the Chief Planning Officer Jacobs Well Bradford.

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The conservation area of Southfield Square consists of 75 dwellings of through terraced houses on three sides of a 75 dwellings of through terraced houses on three sides of a central garden. These were erected in small blocks of 2, 3 and 4 properties between 1845 and 1885. The Square is an example of middle class housing built at a time when Bradford was becoming established as an international worsted wool centre, attracting merchants from other parts of the country and the continent. To accommodate such people housing development took place away from the polluted central area of the City. The majority of the houses in the Square are Listed Buildings and the Square itself is a rare example of mid Victorian housing provided for the emerging middle classes. 30th May 1980
