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Rome, June 7.

ON Monday last the Pope held a Consistory, where were proposed and disposed of several Archbishopricks and Bishopricks, amongst others, the Cardinal Visconti, formerly Nuncio in Spain, was upon the recommendation of the Queen Regent made Archbishop of *Montreal* in the Island of *Sicily*, which his Eminence intends suddenly to take possession of.

The same day the Pope gave Audience to all the Cardinals who had any thing to offer, and to the French Ambassador the Duke de *Chaulnes* who took his leave in order to his return home, but departs not from hence till Monday next, intending to see the Ceremonies of to morrow, when the Pope is to ride in state to take possession of the Church of *St John de Latran*, at which the Count de *Prado* the Portugais Ambassador intends to appear with extraordinary pomp. The said Ambassador has lately dispatcht a Courier to *Lisbonne* to give the Prince his Master an account of what has hitherto passed in reference to the affairs of Portugal. Monseigneur *Ravizzi*, by the favour of the Cardinals *Chigy*, and *Rospigliosi* has been nominated by the Pope for his Nuncio to that kingdom, which has so little pleased the Count de *Prado*, that he has made several complaints upon this subject to divers of the Cardinals.

Monseigneur *Marthei* is made Vice-Legate for *Avignon*, though himself seemed not over-zealous to be removed to so great a distance from the Court of *Rome*, he being neerly related to the Pope.

We are here in daily expectation of the arrival of an Ambassador from the Duke of *Savoy*.

The ship on which were embarked the Goods and Baggage belonging to the Cardinal de *Bouillon*, and the French Ambassador, is said to be taken by the Turks, with many persons that took the opportunity of this ship to transport themselves for *France*.

On Tuesday last the Prince *Gasparo Altieri* went to take possession of his new Charge, as Governour of the Castle *St. Angelo*, where he was received with much Ceremony, with several vollies of Canons and Musquets.

Madrid, June 11. His Catholick Majesty has recovered his health and is fallen again to his exercises with the young Nobility, to the great joy of this whole City and Kingdom. Several of the Grands in testimony of their joy came this night in Masquerade to the Palace, with Torches in their hands. A publick Jubilee is to be kept upon this account, and on the 18th the people are to be entertained in the great Place-Royal with a fight with Bulls.

The Constable of *Castille* takes all opportunities to sollicit his return home by reason of his great indisposition of body, which he attributes principally to the air of the *Netherlands*, but as yet, no success is appointed for that Government.

The Count de *Molina* intends in few days to depart in order to his voyage into *England* under the Character of Ambassador Extraordinary.

Don Juan is lately indisposed in his health, principally occasioned by Melancholly; but his apprehen-

sions are great, that attempts are made upon his life.

Warsaw, June 14. From *Bialacterko* we are advised, that the Cossacks seem not so inclinable as formerly to their dependency upon the Crown of *Poland*, but desire rather a brutish liberty and to establish amongst themselves a kind of popular Government; and that *Dorosenska*, one of their Generals, endeavoured in an Assembly at *Czekrin* to persuade them to swear fidelity to him, and wholly to throw off their obedience to the King of *Poland*. *Hanenko* who was also one of the Generals of the Cossacks, a person of different principles and interest from *Dorosensko*, had deputed those 30 persons who had Audience the last month from the King, but returned without any considerable effect.

The Envoy from *Tartary* is still here expecting the return of the Chancellor of this Crown, and intends upon his dismissal from this Court, to go from hence to the Marquis de *Brandenbourg*.

The face of this Court seems much changed for the better, the Queen great with Child. The Primate the Archbishop of *Gnesne*'s resolved to espouse the Kings interest; and the Marshal *Sobiesky* has engaged himself to appear with the Nobles at the general Assembly on horseback in the field, and to act vigorously for the settlement of peace within that kingdom.

Venice, June 14. Here is lately arrived the Gally called *Brassana*, with the Governour of the Three Islands the Proveditor General *Valier*, who on the Thursday following, with a large Train of Senators attending him, made his visit to the Colledge, where he gave them a satisfactory account of all affairs under his charge. He left several Gallies and Gallies refitting at the Port of *St. Crose*, whereon are to be embarked six Companies of Foot, which are more then the usual number which are allow'd for the necessary guard of *Corfu*, which said Companies are to be transported to *Dalmatia*.

Letters from *Zante* and other places, confidentially tell us that the Visier is at last gone from *Candia* with a great Fleet of ships and Gallies, to attend the Commands of the Grand Segnior, who was in the mean time diverting himself in Hunting; though to the ruine of that Country by which he passes, having no less then 30. thousand persons attending him, for his Guard and Recreation.

The same Letters tell us, that the Visier has left the Command of *Candia* during his absence in the hands of his Son and a Bassa, in whom he reposes much Confidence, and has appointed some other persons to assist them as a Council in matters of difficulty; he left the City much repaired and beautified, and has built there a Seraglio, and several other publick buildings, for which he was supplied with materials from *Smirna*, *Alexandria* and *Constantinople*, and had planted great number of Cypress trees about the City, to render it the more pleasant.

'Tis believed Chevasier *Molino* is also departed with him, that which hitherto retarded him, was the expectation of the presents designed by the Republick for the Grand Segnior and several Ministers of this Court, which were some weeks since sent away from *Zante*, with a Convoy of four men of war

War, to secure them from the *Corsairs*.

The Turks who are now possess and Inhabitants of the City of *Candia*, presented the Visier before his departure with a Petition, that he would bestow on them such Lands in that Island, as were formerly in the Possession of several Greeks, and this in Recompence of their faithful Service during the late Wars, but the Visier answered them that they had gotten their Possession of that City and Island upon Articles of surrender, and therefore it was not in his power to gratify them with the Lands they desired, as if they were to be disposed of by right of Conquest.

Vienna, June 24. From *Hungary* we have confirmation of the report, that the 5000 Hungarians which had thoughts of trying their fortunes upon General *Spark*, but finding him in readiness to entertain them, immediately withdrew, and sent away several persons as their Deputies to him to assure him that they were now more inclined to serve the Emperor than ever they were to oppose him, and would oblige themselves to continue faithful to him, if he would please to pardon them and grant them an Act of Oblivion, which has been offered in the Emperors name to *Upper Hungary* upon condition, that they will give the Emperor the sole power of choosing their Palatine; and that no Religion shall be permitted amongst them, but the *Roman, Lutheran, or Calvinist*; that they shall admit of the German forces into all their Garrisons; and that it be declared, that the Emperor alone has power of calling an Assembly of the States of that Kingdom.

Hambourg, June 25. From *Vienna* we have daily news of the hopefulness of the Emperors affairs in *Hungary*, upon the submission and pardon of the Prince *Ragotsky*.

From *Warsaw* they write as pleasingly of the state of that kingdom; the Nobility of all the Palatinates having resolved to put themselves on horseback immediately upon the last summons to attend the King in the open field, and there to resolve upon what they shall find most conducive to the safety and peace of the kingdom, only *Cracovia* and one other Province have spented their resolutions, but the dissenting party are like to fail of their hopes of making their advantage of the dissatisfactions of the Army for want of pay, that being proportionably assigned them out of the several Provinces and Palatinates; to which the several Regiments are ordered for the receipt of their Moneys, which they are punctually to receive.

General *Sobiesky* having considered the general sense of the kingdom, and how much it imports him to preserve his Charge which by a longer opposition might be otherwise disposed of, is said to be convinced of his error and returned to the obedience of the Crown. The Marshal of the Court and the Palatine of *Vilna* have thought fit to be present and concur with their Provincial Diets, and have since submitted themselves to the King, but *Zamoisky*, who pretended to a share in an Estate with the Kings Mother, having spoken in the Diet, of which he was member, with too little respect of the King, is said to have been killed by the Nobles: 'Tis believed all the rest of the dissenting Nobility will be in few days summoned in by sound of Trumpet, those especially which had their conference lately at *Dantzic*, and if they appear not at the time prefixed then by his Majesties Proclamation, their Charges shall be pronounced void, and be disposed of at his Majesties pleasure.

Amsterdam, July 1. We hear even now of the arrival of our *East-Ind* Fleet at the *Texel*, whose return gives much joy to the Merchants both for the richness of the ships, and the good news they bring with them of the victory obtained by General *Speelman*, over the King of *Macasser*, and four other Kings

his Allies; and of the honourable peace which will much conduce to the advantage of our Trade: the Articles are not yet published, only tis said in the general, that the said King of *Macasser* is obliged to pay to the Company of Merchants concerned in the War and Trade in those parts, the sum of 200 thousand Piastras towards their expences in this war, to demolish all his Forts except one, and to permit the Moneys coined by the said Company to pass freely in all his Dominions, without any addition or diminution of the value of them; he is also by the said peace obliged neither to make war or peace without the consent of the Company; nor to suffer any besides the said Company to trade within his Dominions. They farther affirm, that the little Kings of *Binna* and *Dompo* had submitted themselves and people in propriety to the Company.

All the ships bound thither from hence are there safely arrived.

Some ships lately arrived from the *West-Indies* inform us, that the Count *de Lemos* the Spanish Viceroy of the *Indies* was safely arrived at *Lima* in *Peru*, and has reduced to obedience the people which were in rebellion against the Spanish Government, and the authority of his Catholick Majesty, and for a terror to the rest, had ordered the principal of that rebellion, *Joseph de Salazar* to be beheaded, 16 others to be hanged, and 26 to be banisht.

We have even now received information, that our *East-India* ships are safely entered into the *Texel*, the *Meuse*, and into *Zealand*.

Our Letters from *Cadis* tell us, that the Gallions returned, laden to the value of 25 Millions, whereof eight upon the account of his Catholick Majesty, but one of this Fleet foundred about *Havana*, but so as with the assistance of some of her companions, most of her lading was happily preserved.

The *Rotterdam* Convoy is arrived at *Cadis*, where also continues Captain *Toll* beyond the time he intended, expecting the unloading of some of the Gallions.

London, June 29. On Munday last the Envoyes from *Denmark* and *Portugal*, made their Compliments to their Majesties, condoling with them for the Death of Madam.

Yesterday arrived here the Marshal *de Bellefonds* Envoy Extraordinary from His most Christian Majesty, and was this day about noon introduced by Sir *Charles Cotterel* Master of the Ceremonies, and admitted in the usual form to his Audience from His Majesty, to whom he made his Compliments of Condoling for the Death of Madam, in the name of the King his Master: His Audience continued about an hour, which ended, he was with the same Ceremony conducted to his Audience from the Queen, whom he Complimented upon the same Subject, as he did likewise in the afternoon their Royal Highnesses at *St James's*.

This afternoon the Chevalier *Flamarens* Envoy from Monsieur, had his Audience from their Majesties upon the same subject, of condoling for the Death of Madam, to which he was introduced also by Sir *Charles Cotterel* Master of the Ceremonies after the usual manner.
