Venice, March 14. N. S. Prince James Sobieski is preparing to fet out from hence forthwith, and proceed to Rome, in order to wait on his Mother the Queen Dowager of Poland. It is now doubted whether that Princess will pass into France, as it was once thought she intended, or retire into a Monastery; and some are of Opinion, that it is in the Pope's Power to perswade her to continue at Rome; from whence they write, that the Austrian Ministers strictly examine such as Demand Passports of them for the Kingdom of Naples; before they think fit to grant them, and that this is done at the Instances of the Viceroy, who continues to watch and secure such as are suspected of ill Intentions against the Government. Upon Advice that some disassed Persons were attempting to raise Commotions in the Abruzzo, several Of ficers have been fent to observe that Province, and the like Precautions have been taken in all such Places as adjoin to the Ecclesiastical State. They Places as adjoin to the Ecclesiastical State. write from Milan, that frequent Robberies had of late been committed there; but that upon an Order to feize and force into the Service all Vagabonds, and such as cou'd give no Satisfactory Account of themselves, those Disorders had been much discontinued both in the Capital, and all other Places belonging to that State. Leiplick, March 22. N. S. They write from Deciden, that the States of this Electorate afsembled there, have come to a Resolution upon

the most material Points proposed to them by his Majesty. The Cardinal of Sax-Zeits continues at Dresden, and has lately received a Present from the King of a very rich Cross valued at five thousand Ducats. We are advised from the North; that the Garrisons of Caminieck and Fort Triz nity have received a supply of Provisions for a Year; and that the Great Marshal of the Grown had confiderably augmented the Garrison of the first of those Places. The Czar of Muscovy was expected the 12th of this Month at Leopold, where several General Officers were appointed to attend his Majesty's Arrival. Soon after which the Prince of Galliczin will fet out from thence; in order to Command a Body of Muscovice Infaritry that is forming near Afoph. We have received no Confirmation of the King of Sweden's Departure from Bender, or of any Acts of Hosti-

lity begun by the Tartars on the Frontiers.

Frankfort, March 25. N. S. They write from Landau, that the French have made a Draught out of their Troops in Alface for the Low-Countries, notwithstanding which they pretend they shall be strong enough for some extraordinary Attempt by the opening of the Campaign, and are accordingly making all necessary Preparations for some considerable Enterprize on this side. Hereupon an Express has been fent to Vierna, and all imaginable Precautions are taken to obviate their The Marshal de Harcourt, who, we are Deligns told, is to Command on the Upper Rhine, is speedily expected at Strasbourg, immediately upon which the Enemy give out their Army is to be assembled. The late Rains have occasioned very great Inundations, which have done confiderable Damage to the Fortifications of Landau, as well as those of Strasbourg, Fort Lewis, and other Places. The Recruits for the Forces in Flanders and the Upper Rhine, pass daily through this Place; and the Jews having undertaken to remount the Cavalry, several Commissaries have been appointed to inspect the Recruits, and see that they punctually perform their Contracts. They write from Vienna, that the Turkish Aga is not yet arrived, but was expected every moment. It is thought the Prince of Savoy will fet out for Holland foon after his Arrival. The Prince of Lamberg, who died lately at Vienna in the 45th Year of his Age; was Intervolute 16th Inflant, with great Solemnity, in the Cathedral Church of that City. The Prince of Schwartzemberg is made Steward of the Houshold in his room, and has already taken Possession of that Office.

Hague, March 31. N. S. We are advised, that the Count de Lecherain, who is order'd hither by his Catholick Majesty from Barcelona, is landed at Genoa; and being fet out Post from thence, he is speedily expected here. The Horse Guards that were quartered here this Winter, march'd from hence this Morning towards the Frontiers, and

the Foot will follow in a few Days. They write from the Frontiers, that the French are busy in Cloathing their Regiments, and preparing Equipage for their Cavalry; but meet with many Discoulties in that Affair for want of Mony, of which the Officers have received very little hitherto, but are made to expect confiderable Sums upon the Arrival of Marshal Villars. They themfelves own, that their Recruits come up very florly, which they impute to the badness of the Roads; infemuch that it is thought it will be the 12th of May before they can all arrive. We are a sur'd, that almost all their new rais'd Troops are drawn out of the Militia, and forced into the Service. Most of their Horses are in a very mean Condition, and the they have plenty of Forage, yet it is very bad and unferviceable. They pretend they shall have a considerable Army near Arras, and another on the Meuse, and that they will attempt to drive the Allies from some of the Posts they have taken on the Scarpe; but they are hitherto fo backward in their Preparations, and the Troops of the Allies are so advantageously posted, that there is no room to apprehend they will be able to put their Design in execution. Tho' they feem most in pain for Arras, which Place they have provided with considerable Stores, yet are they no less diligent in repairing the Fortifications of the other Towns, as not knowing where the Storm is likely to fall, but preparing in all appearance to be every where on the Defentive.

Bruffels, April 2. N. S. Letters of the 30th past from Tournay advise, that the Enemy continue very quiet in their Quarters, without attempting to disturb the Confederate Troops in any of their Posts on the Scarpe and the Deule. The Troops canton'd near Orchies are shortly to be reinforced by two Saxon Battalions from Mons. Lieutenant-General Cadogan, who Commands the Body whereof that Cantonment is composed, has his Quarters at St. Amand. Advices of the 30th past from Paris assure us, that a Detachment of Regular Troops, with some Miquelets, had sur-prized and dispersed the Regiment of Walloon Guards in the Duke of Anjou's Service in Catalonia, making a confiderable number of Prisoners, and taking four hundred Herses, with a great quantity of Baggage. We hope the next Post will bring us tome further advantageous Particulars of this Action.
