Rome, June 14. N Sunday last the Pope rode in great State according to the cuftom of his predeceffors to take possession of the Church of St. John Lateran, in which passed nothing more extraordinary then the new and rich Liveries of the Count de Prado the Portugal Ambassador, who in this, asin other Ceremo-

nies has appeared with extraordinary splendor. The Pope caused the usual distribution of Moneys to be made amongft the people, but the fcramble proved fomcwhat Tragical to the people, two of them being killed, and feveral others hurt in the throng.

The Pope returning to Monte Cavallo, he there difmiffed feveral of the Pages from his fervice, for whole encouragement he was pleased to remember to them, that 66 years before he had ferved Paulus Quinous in the fame employment as his Page, and caufed an Alms of Bread and Moneys to be di-

ftributed amongft the poor. Segnior Nerli, Nephew to the Cardinal of that name, is nominated to be fent as Nuncio into Poland, as Raviqqa into Portugal, but neither of their perfons feem grateful at prefent to the Countreys to

which they are to be employed. The Spaniards feem much fatisfyed with the Pope, in that amongst other kindnesses he has done them, he has been pleafed to gratify them with that which was refuled to them by his predeceffor, in giving them leave to difpole to pious uses the Revenues of the Convents that were supprefied within the Government of Milan, and in taking off the Cenfure which was upon that account given out against the

Provoft. Father Everard Nithard, late Confessor to the Queen Regent of Spain, is by Order from her Majefty, returned to dwell in this City, and has accordingly been received and entertained by the Spanish Ambassador, and the Cardinal Porto Carrero, but takes up his Lodgings at the Jeíuits.

Don Camilla Rospigliofi is much decayd, and is fupposed, past recovery. Cardinal Ghinetti is also in as weak condition, and tis believed will in little time leave his Cap to the Popes disposal, as may al-fo Cardinal Nerli, by reason of his great age and indifposition of body.

The people are in great apprehensions of a new Impost upon Wax and Salt, which causes no fmall murmurings amongst them, and gives them fre-quent occasions to remember the freedom they enjoyed under the last Pope, which was but too much manifested in the Cavalcade made by the prefent Pope to St Jean Lateran, where the people could not refrain from paying him the honour of calling upon his name inftead of that of *Clement* the X. to the no small dislatisfaction of the Court.

Cardinal de Bouillon on his return for France, was in great danger of being killed by the fall of his Horse down the precipice of a Rock, from which he narrowly escaped by casting himself to the ground over the head of his Horfe.

Madrid, Fune 20. The 13th instant the two Com-panies of Comedians came in 8. Triumphal Chariots, to act publickly a holy Comedy before the

City, which had with much approbation been fome dayes before represented to the Court and Councel.

This Court is now in Mourning for the Death of the Great Duke of *Florence*, for whom this King-dom had a great Efteem for his zeal to the Publick Peace of Christendom, and his particular inclination to this Monarchy.

The 16th inftant the King and Queen attended by the Ladies and great Officers of the Court, with the Councels, Magistrates of the Town, Embassadors, and other Publick Ministers, together with the Grands and great numbers of perfons of the greatest quality of both Sexes, were placed according to their Ranks and Dignities, by the Major Domo Ma-jor and Prefident of *Caftille*, in the great place of this City, where they were diverted with the Bull fports, till the night put an end to the Spectacle.

From Alecant we have advice of the arrival there the 7th instant of the Mary, Forefight, and Pearl, English Fregats, convoying the John and William laden with Victuals for Sir Tho, Allen, who was expecting them at Port Mahon, whither they fayled the next day. The Briftol and Hampfbire passing by at the fame time for the fame Port.

Sir Thomas Allen having taken in his Provisions and other neceffaries, intends to return to the Coaffs of Barbary

A Turkish Bregantine has lately plundered and carried away the people of a French Saylia. *Hague, July 1*. On Tuesday last arrived here

the Landgrave of. Heffen, attended by a large Train in good Equipage, and has fince received. Visits from all perfons of the greatest Eminency of this place, which he is fince returning. He has alfo made his Addresses to Madam the Princels Dowager and the Prince of Orange, by whom he was received with great Civility.

The States of these United Provinces have sent their Deputies to Maestricht to mediate between the Abbels of Hocht and the Marquis de Westerloo concerning their pretentions to the Cafile of Peter-(cl.em, and fince the Prince of Liege feems to espouse the cause of the Abbes, the Rhinegrave is ordered to assist the Marquis in keeping the possession, but fo as to prevent the fortifications thereof, it lying almost under the Command of the Canon, upon the Forts of Maestricht. The Commissioners are endeavouring to make a friendly agreement to the fatisfaction of both parties,

The City of Leyden still continues to follicite for the shutting up of the Channel of Tergaw, the corruption of whole waters they suppose to be the cause of all those diseases which usually rage in that City, and are now upon the encrease.

The differences between the Elector of Cologne and the City of that name, are by the mediation of the Elector of Menty, and his Envoye the Sieur Jodici, fully compoled, and the agreement was accordingly figned, on the 22 paft, to the great fatif-faction of all parties.

The Treaty between the Prince Elector Palatine and the Duke of Lorrain, is faid to be well advanced, and tis hoped may be also in few days brought to a happy conlution.

Paris, fuly 2. A Spanish Courier Extraordinary is lately passed by this City on his return to Madrid from Bruffels, informing us, that the Queen Regent had made choice of the Marquis de Montercy, second fon to Don Louis de Haro, and now a Collonel of a Spanish Regiment, to take the name of Governor of the Netherlands for a time, but is upon all matters relating to the faid Government, to conform himfelf to the advice of Don Estevan de Gamarre, with fome other perfons joyned with him as a Council, fo that tis believed the Conftable of Castille will in few days refigne his Charge into their hands, and put himfelf upon his way homewards.

From Vivaret? we are informed, that the people of that Countrey who had fome months fince tumultuoufly and feditioufly oppofed the new Taxes imposed on them, and had been perswaded by the Marquis de Castres and other Gentlemen of the Countrey, to lay down their Arms upon a promife of an Act of Oblivion, and the abolishing the faid Taxes ; being now told that Fifteen hundred Dragoons were marching towards them with fome other Foot, to take an account of their former infurrections, they again took Arms, and were drawn together in a body, to the number of 6000 men; and that feveral Reformed Officers were entertained by them, but their principal Commanders were Couteias and Coquille, who had formed them into Companies and Order, and placed them upon feveral Posts wh re they lay orderly intrenched, and had already made a flour opposition to fome of his Majesties forces which were sent to reduce them; and that they had burnt down feveral houfes of the Gentry, whom they fuspect to be their most zealous opposers.

His Majefty has hereupon ordered a confiderable force to be fent against them, and amongst others, two Companies of his Musqueteers, and fome of the Guards of his body, who are to begin their march on Thurlday next, with fix Companies of the Regiment of Guards, under the Command of the Sieur Magalotti; these are ordered to joyn with the forces which are already in Languedoc for the reduction of those Rebels.

The Kings Declaration having been fent to the Parliament of *Tholoufe*, ordering all the Proftors of that as well as other Parliaments, to take their Commiffions in his Majefties name: the faid Proftors have refufed to give their obedience, by reafon of the expences of the faid Commiffions, and have rather chofen to abfent themfelves from the Parliament, which put a prefent flop to the proceedings of that Affembly; whereupon, the Judges meeting to confider of fome fit remedy for this great inconveniency; a Prefident and one Counfellor infifting two clofely upon the priviledges of the Proftors, ipeaking with lefs refpect of the Kings Declaration, have fince by his Majefties Order been confined, one to Montargis, and the other to la Tonfterre.

The King has ordered a stately Hearse to be erefted in the Cathedral Church of Nostre Dame in this City, where a solemn Funeral service is to be celebrated to the memory of the Duke de Beaufort, who dyed at Candia during the Siege; but the Parliament of Paris are disputing the point of Precedency with the house of Vendosme, at that Ceremony, and are objecting against the Title of High and Potent Prince, which is given the deceased Duke in the Act of Parliament which they are to pass in order to the faid Ceremony, which they solve is not to be given, but to the Legitimate Princes of the blood.

On Friday next the body of Madam, the late deceafed Dutchefs of Orleans is with great Ceremony to be conducted to St. Denis, where the Abbot

Boffaet, Bishop of Condon is to pronounce her Funeral Oration.

Paris, July 5. On Wednelday night last Madams Heart was Honourably attended by Torch light, from St Clou to Val de Grace, by a numerous train of Coaches, where it is to be deposited according to a promise she had formerly made to the Nuns of that place.

Whitehal, July 3. On Thursday laft the Chevalier de Flamarens, Envoye from Monfieur the Duke of Orleans, was Conducted to bis Audience from their Royal Highneffes at Richmond by Sir Charles Cotterel Mafter of the Ceremonies, where he Condoled with them for the Death of Madam. The first inflam the Swedish Refident Chevalier de Lyonberg, and Monfieur Stamford Refident from the Duke of Newbourg, made their Complyments upon the fame fubject to His Majesty. The Swedish Refident had the next day an Audience from the Queen, to whom he addreffed himself, with the like Complyments, to which he was introduced after the usual form.
