

that they have actually engaged three thousand Sailors at Constantinople for the Service of the Fleet, who are preparing to go on Board with the utmost Expedition. These Advices add, that the Cham of Tartary had resolved to invade Muscovy at the Head of a very powerful Army, which his Son, in Conjunction with the Palatin of Kiovia, penetrates thro' Podolia into Poland. This is what the Swedes have thought fit to publish of their Affairs on that side. On the other hand we are told, that the Muscovites are drawing their Forces down towards the Borithenes; and that, for the greater Expedition, they had caused their Infantry to be Transported by Water. These Accounts add, that the Tartars having actually made an Irruption almost as far as Veronitz, were encountered by the Muscovites near that Place, who defeated them, and took a great number of Prisoners. Tho' this Particular comes confirm'd from several Places, we know not yet what Credit to give to it, having been so often deceiv'd in our Accounts from those Parts. They write from Danzick, that the Cham of Tartary's Son and the Palatin of Kiovia were encamp'd with a Body of Twenty five or Thirty thousand Men between Niemirow and Braslaw, but that the Polish Troops, that had been posted on the Neister, having been joined by the Muscovites, were marching to Attack them. Our Letters from Saxony advise, that the States of that Electorate, assembled at Dresden, having consented to all the Supplies demanded by his Polish Majesty, it was thought the Diet would soon break up, and that the King wou'd speedily return into Poland. The Cardinal of Saxe-Weitz set out from Dresden the 27th of the last Month in his return to Vienna, where he is to be employed in forwarding the Accommodation with the Hungarian Malecontents.
