St. James's, April 20. This Day the Marquis de Saouli, Envoy-Extraordinary from the Republick of Genoa, had a publick Audience of Her Majesty; to which he was Introduced by his Grace the Duke of Shrewsbury, Lord Chamberlain of her Majesty's Household, and Conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.

Turin, April 8. N. S. Upon Advice, that the Enemy were preparing to enter the Vally de Stura early this Campaign, his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy has given Orders to the Marquis d'Entrave to repair forthwith to Demont, for which Place he is to set out in a few Days, and will take with him six Battalions, which being join'd by two others that are already quarter'd in those Parts, they will be sufficient to observe the Motions of the Enemy. The President-Gubernati arriv'd here the 5th from Rome, and has given his Royal Highness an Account of his Negotiation; so that all thoughts of an Accommodation with that Court are laid aside for the present. We have receiv'd Advices by the way of Milan, importing, that several Grandees had been confin'd by Order of the Court at Saragossa, and among the rest the Duke of Ossuna, and the Condes de Pinto and Aguilar. Our Letters from Genoa advise, that the Confederates were busy in embarking the Troops and Ammunition at Vado, and that the Fleet wou'd be ready to Sail for Barcelona on or before the 20th Instant. His Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy, the Dutchess, and young Princes, went yesterday to the Venerie, where it is thought the Court will continue for two or three Months.

Hamburg, April 17. N. S. We have receiv'd Letters from Pomerania importing, that the Swedish Troops posted there have Orders not to March 'till they have receiv'd the Reinforcements out of Schonen, and which are not expected to join them these three Weeks. In the mean time a strong Body of Saxon and Muscovite Forces are actually arriv'd on the Frontiers; so that it is thought the Swedes will find their March out of Pomerania will be attended with more Difficulties than were at first imagin'd. The Emperor's Contingent for the Neutrality arriv'd the 13th at Gruneberg, and the rest of the Forces that are to compose that Body are daily expected. They write from Berlin, that a Courier was arriv'd from Holland, with Assurances to the King of Prussia, that the States-General were resolv'd to give his Majesty entire Satisfaction in his Demands; whereupon the King resolv'd to take a Journey to Cleves, and it is thought he will proceed from thence to the Hague. We are told the Margrave Albert will have leave to attend his Majesty to Cleves, where a considerable Estate is fallen to him in Right of his Lady. Our Letters that are come in this Day from Koenigsberg speak much of the great Preparations of

his Czarish Majesty, and confirm the late Defeat of the Tartars.

Berlin, April 21. N. S. An Express arriv'd the 8th Instant at Oranienburg, where the King of Prussia was then residing, being dispatch'd by Monsieur Gromkau from the Hague, to acquaint his Majesty that the States-General are inclin'd to satisfy him in the Particulars that Minister was charg'd to lay before them. This has been extremely well taken by his Majesty, who immediately sent Orders to his Troops design'd for Flanders to continue their March thither without any delay. Since this his Majesty has resolv'd to take a Journey to the Hague, and has already named the chief Officers, and other Persons that are to accompany him thither. The time of his Departure is not yet fix'd, and it is thought he will not set out 'till the beginning of the next Month. Count Dhona, who came hither lately with his Family from Prussia, is to continue here, the King having named him to assist at the Privy-Council, where he is to have the first place, he being the eldest in Reception of all those of which it is compos'd at present. He is likewise to have the Direction of the Foreign Affairs; but the Care of dispatching them will be continued to Monsieur Ilgen. Monsieur Rantzau, the King of Denmark's late Envoy at this Court, being appointed to go with the same Character to the Court of Vienna, has desired the Elector of Hanover's Resident to obtain a Pass from his Master for the Equipage he leaves here, and which he proposeth to send down the Elb to Copenhagen. The Count d'Esferen arriv'd here the 9th Instant from the Elector Palatin, and has since his Arrival been to wait on the King of Prussia at Landsberg, whither his Majesty went from Oranienberg on Thursday last. We are told his chief Business is to urge, in his Master's Name, the assembling the Body of Forces appointed for the Preservation of the Neutrality, and that he was very favourably receiv'd by his Majesty. It is said moreover, that he is Commission'd to intercede with the King in behalf of the late Grand Marshal the Count de Witgenstein. This Morning his Majesty set out from Landsberg for Neuendorf, a Place about two Miles beyond Francfort on the Oder, whither he was attended by a very small Retinue. It is reported here that eight thousand Muscovites left in Prussia, with a Body of Saxons consisting of about six thousand Horse, are drawing towards the Frontiers of Pomerania, and that some Danish Forces are assembling near Oldenburg.

Hanover, April 21. N. S. Monsieur Goes, Envoy from the States-General to the King of Denmark, is gone through this Place in his return from the Hague to Copenhagen. Soon after his Arrival he was admitted to an Audience of his Electoral Highness, after which he continued his Journey to Hamburg. A Lieutenant-Colonel in the Service of King Stanislaus arriv'd here on Friday last in 30 Days from Bender, and set out the 19th for Pomerania. He gives a most advantageous Account of the situation of the King of Sweden's Affairs in those Parts, and exaggerates the Preparations of the Turks to so high a Degree, that his Reports meet not with a general Credit at this Place. The Elector proposeth to go speedily to hunt the Stag at a Place call'd Veyhausen in the Country of Zell

Zell; accordingly his Equipages are preparing with great diligence, and the Grand Veneur is already set out, in order to dispose every thing against his Electoral Highness's Arrival. They write from Dresden, that the Cardinal of Sax-Zeits set out from thence the 15th Instant, in his return to Vienna, having had the good Fortune to accommodate some Differences that had of late prevail'd among the Princes of the House of Saxony.

*Brussels, April 29. N. S.* The Marshal de Villars arriv'd the 25th Instant at Arras, since which all the Neighbouring Garrisons are in Motion, and they are now assembling their Army, which they give out is to encamp between Bouchain and Marquion near Cambrai, and that the Head Quarters will be at Oisy. Our Letters dated yesterday from Tournay advise, that his Grace the Duke of Marlborough was still there, and that the Confederate Army was encamp'd within two Leagues of that Place. It was intended, that it should have advanc'd to Day to Orchies, and to Morrow to Douay, but that March is deferr'd for the present. They write from the Hague, that all things being settled there in relation to the eight Palatin Battalions named as part of the Contingent for the Queen of Great Britain and the States General, those Troops have receiv'd Orders to March forthwith to the place of Rendezvous in Silezia, and will immediately be followed by the other four Battalions that are to compleat the Quota to be furnished by the Queen and States.

*Whereas there are great Complaints of the want of due care to Pave and Cleanse the Streets, and other Passages of the City and Liberty of Westminster, and to free them from the Annoyance of Vagrants and Sturdy Beggars, notwithstanding the several wholesome Laws in that behalf; so the end none may pretend Ignorance of their respective Duties in this regard, Publick Notice is hereby given, that by the said Statutes it is among other things Enacted,*

*That the Inhabitants shall on every 8 & 9 W. Wednesday and Saturday at least, sweep or cause to be swept and cleansed, the Streets, or other Places before their Houses, Buildings and Walls, that the Dirt and Soil may be heaped ready for the Scavenger, or other Officer thereunto appointed, to carry away, on forfeiture of 10 s. for every neglect.*

*That no Person shall throw, or cause, or suffer to be thrown, or laid, any Ashes, Dust, Dirt, Rubbish, Dung, or other Filth or Annoyance in any open Street, &c. before their own Houses, &c. on the Penalty of 5 s. or lay the same, or cause to be laid before the Houses of other Persons, Churches, Church-yard Walls, or into any Common Sewer, &c. but shall deliver the same to the Scavenger, or other Officer, on pain of forfeiting 20 s. for every such Offence.*

*That no Person shall hoop or cleanse any Barrels, or other Casks, or set out Coaches to make or mend, rough Timber or Stones to be sawn or wrought in the Streets, on Penalty of 20 s. for every Offence.*

*That the Scavengers, or other Officers, shall come every Day, except Sundays and Holidays, and by a Bell, or otherwise, give sufficient Notice thereof to carry away the Dirt, Ashes, &c. on the Penalty of 40 s. for every Offence.*

*That all Householders, or if Houses are empty, the Owners thereof shall keep the Pavement in repair before their Houses, on pain of forfeiting 20 s. per Rod, and 20 s. a Week, till the same be sufficiently amended.*

*The said Offenders may be Convicted by the Knowledge or View of any one Justice, by Confession of the Party, or Proof of one credible Witness upon Oath, in which last Cases the Persons that Discover and Prosecute, are entituled to half the Penalties.*

*Every Constable neglecting to carry Vagabonds or wandring Beggars before a Justice of Peace, to forfeit 20 s. one fourth part whereof shall go to the Informer.*

*For the more effectual putting the said Laws in Execution, the Justices within the said City and Liberty intend to hold Petty-Sessions on Tuesdays at St. Margaret's Westminster; Wednesdays at St. James's; Thursdays at St. Ann's; Fridays at St. Martin's, at the hour of 10 in the Morning on each of the said Days.*
