Hull, July 1,

N Wednesday last put into Humber 100 fail of light ships going for the North-wards. The same day failed two ships of this place laden with Lead and Cloth for Holland, and this day one for Dort

with Cloth. Here is lately arrived one ship of this place from Dantzig, laden with Flax, and two from Norway.

Warfam, June 20: All our fears and jealousies feem now to be wholly vanisht, as are the hopes of the confederates, the Nobility having generally declared themselves ready to adventure their lives and fortunes in the Kings fervice.

The Vice-Chancellor is returned to the Court, and may fuddenly give his Majesty an account of the homages he has received, and the discoveries he has made of the designes of the disfatissied Par-

Yesterday was observed with much zeal the Aniverfary of the Kings Election, and the fame day their Majesties laid the first stones of the foundation of the Churh of Calmadolens at Beillan, with the ulual ceremony, leaving at the faid foundation a piece of Gold, with an infcription to the value of 100 Ducats.

To morrow we expect here the arrival of Monlieur d' Overbeck, the Elector of Brandenbourgs Minister, to do Homage for the Countreysof Lauenbourg and Buttou.

As yet our Commissioners have not entred upon their Negotiation with those expected from the Cof-facks; nor can we expect much success thereon, so many Arts being used to hinder their union with the Crown of Poland. Letters from the Vaiwode Czernikowsky inform us, that he has much reason to believe that the Tartars intend an invalion, for which it would be neceffary to be well provided, their intentions being principally to fpuil the Countrey

The Provincial Diets are to be held again the 14th of fuly in order to a general Affembly, which is to begin on the 13th of September.

Legorn, June 23. The 11th inftanthis Excellency the Lord Falconbridge went from Florence on his way for Venice, having received many civilities from the Great Duke.

The 14th, the Great Duke on his Throne received the Homage of all the principal Magistrates of Flo-rence in presence of the Great Dutchels, a great Train of Ladies, and all the Nobility and Gen-

try about the Town. The 19th instant arrived here the Hampshire and Pearl Fregats, with the Deptford Ketch, and an empty Pink to take in Provisions for Sir Thomas Atlen's Iquadron, whom they left Eight days before at Formentiers, intending from thence to pais over to Ala gier. The 20th arrived Five Spanish Gallies with the Prince de Ligne on his way to his Viceroyalty of Sicily; he failed again the next day, having re-ceived civil Salutes and Prefents from this place. The Ferfey and Genturion, with the Olive-branch, Owen and David, and several Merchant ships under

their Convoy are upon departure homewards; the Dutch Convoy for Spain and Holland may fuddenly follow, and will make up a Fleet of about 30 fail.

Genoua, June 25. The 20th inftant went hence the Prince de Ligne with three Gallies of the Duke de *Turfi's* fquadron, which are to conduct him to his Vice-Royalty of *Sicily*; at his embarking he was attended by two of the faid States Gallies, with eight Gentlemen sent by the States to compliment him at his departure, and to prefent him with feve-ral refreshments, the Compliments passing without Guns: with these Gallies went out two others' bound for Naples, to attend Segnior Gianettine Doria, and to transport him to Barcellona.

Upon the news of the appearance upon the Coafts of the French Gallies deligned for Tunis, Two of the States Gallies were immediately sent away with 200. Souldiers for the fecurity of Savona. We have now advice that the faid French Gallies are at Vada, which administers fome canfe of apprehension of their intent, that being not in their way for Tunis.

From Florence we are told, that the new Great Duke had received with much civility the Compliments of the forreign Minifters upon the death of his Father : that on the 14th inftant the Senate and Counfel of 200 were to be affembled in the Palace, to fwear fidelity to him according to the cuffom on the like occasions, and that his Excellency the Lord *Falconbridge* had made his addreffes to the Great Duke privately, by whom he was received with great kindness, and was departed thence on his way for Venice.

valry from their Quarters, between this City, Lduwain, and Malines, have order'd Money and Provifions to be fent to them, to take from them all excufes of ill using the Countrey people, many of them being already confirmined by the diforders of the foldiers to guit their habitations.

The Conftable has disposed of many military employments amongs his Creatures, but has not of late medled in any other publick affairs, expecting daily to leave the Countrey, infomuch as the Deputies from the States General of the United Provinces, have not yet had their Audience.

These Countreys seem much satisfy'd with the news that Don Fohn of Austria has at the last been prevailed with to accept of the Government of these Provinces, they having a particular respect for his person, and hope for good days under his Governinent, of which they daily expect the confirmation.

The Constable has fent away most of his Train and Baggage, and intends in few days to begin his journey homewards through *France*, leaving the Gowernment to his fuccessfor for a time, the Count -the Monterey.

The Magistrates of Louvain and Antwerp remain at present without Authority, the time of the old Offices being expired, and as yet no new Election made; infomuch as the people of Louvain have obfliged their Superiors to shut up the Town-house. The Duke d' Haure is nominated by the Council of Bitzwant to be sent to Antwerp to elect new Magistrates there, but as yet his Commission is kept in the City, which had with much approbation been some dayes before represented to the Court and Counhands of the Constables Secretary.

Bruffels, July 12. On Tuesday in the evening the Conftable of *Caffille* went away privately from sence on his return for *Spain*, his departure being not publickly known till the next day. He was pleaf ed to take his leave of the Ministers of State, and the Members of the Council by his Letters; in them excusing himself upon his indisposition of body which would not permit him to give them a formal Audience : before his departure he defired the Count de Marcin, Camp-master-General, Don Estevan de Gamarre, Ambassador to the States of the United Provinces, Don Antonio de Pimentel, the Governour of the Town and Cittadel of Antwerp, the Duke de Villa Hermosa, General of the Horfe, Mefsire Charles Hovines Counsellor of State and chief President, the Baron de la Berliere, a Counfellor of State and Chief Treasurer of the Finances, and Messire Simon de Tierlant, a Counfellor of State, and Chancellor of Brabant to meet together, which they did on Wednesday in the afternoon, where they opened the Conftables Letters, which informed them, that the Queen Regents pleafor the difposal of the Government, was fure to be found in a Cabinet in the Cittadel at Antmerp, of which the Governour of the faid Cittadel had one Key, and the Secretary of State, and War another ; Don Antonio de Pimentel was there-upon ordered to go for the faid Cabinet to Antwerp, and to-convey it hither to be opened in the prefence of the above-named Minister's, who were accordingly to declare the fucceffor to the Government.

Paris, fulr 12. The Duke de Chaulnes lately returned home from his Extraordinary Ambally to the Court of Rome, was the 13th inftant to wait on his Majesty at St Germain's, to whom he gave a brief account of his Negotiation, and was received with great thow of kindness.

The fame day the King met with the Queen and feveral Ladies of the Court to divert himself at the Camp neer St Germains.

The 4th inftant about 9 in the evening, Madams body was honourably, but yet privately, conducted to St Dennis Church in a mourning Charriot with fix horfes, the four Corners of the Pall born by her Almoners, attended by the Prince's of Conde the Dutche's of Longueuille, and Monfieurs and Madams own Officers, with a great train of other Coaches, at the fides of the Charriot about 100 Pages of the Kings houfhold, attended with wax Tapers in their hands, before which marched Monfieur's fwifs Guards, and behind his horfe-Guards all of them with Torches.

The Church was hung with Mourning, at the Door the Body was received by the Religious of the place, where the chief Almoner made a Speech, which was answered by the Prior of that place, which ended the Body was placed upon a bed of State in the midft of the Church, and after the usual fervice performed, conveyed thence into a Chappel, where it is to continue, till a more folemn Service fhall be there performed.

The fame day died the Duke of Bourbon, eldeft fon to the Duke of Enguyen, in the Hoftel de Conde, 2 Child of 32 months old, whole body being embalm'd, was with little folemnity convey'd to St Valery to be there interred in the burying place for that Family.
