

# The London Gazette.

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Hull, July 1,

**O**N Wednesday last put into *Humber* 100 sail of light ships going for the Northwards. The same day sailed two ships of this place laden with Lead and Cloth for *Holland*, and this day one for *Dort* with Cloth. Here is lately arrived one ship of this place from *Dantzic*, laden with Flax, and two from *Norway*.

*Warsaw*, June 26: All our fears and jealousies seem now to be wholly vanish, as are the hopes of the confederates, the Nobility having generally declared themselves ready to adventure their lives and fortunes in the Kings service.

The Vice-Chancellor is returned to the Court, and may suddenly give his Majesty an account of the homages he has received, and the discoveries he has made of the designs of the dissatisfied Party.

Yesterday was observed with much zeal the Anniversary of the Kings Election, and the same day their Majesties laid the first stones of the foundation of the Church of *Calmadolens* at *Beillan*, with the usual ceremony, leaving at the said foundation a piece of Gold, with an inscription to the value of 100 Ducats.

To morrow we expect here the arrival of Monsieur *d'Overbeck*, the Elector of *Brandenbourg*s Minister, to do Homage for the Countreys of *Lauenbourg* and *Button*.

As yet our Commissioners have not entred upon their Negotiation with those expected from the Cossacks; nor can we expect much success thereon, so many Acts being used to hinder their union with the Crown of *Poland*. Letters from the *Vajvode Czernikowsky* inform us, that he has much reason to believe that the Tartars intend an invasion, for which it would be necessary to be well provided, their intentions being principally to spoil the Countrey.

The Provincial Diets are to be held again the 14th of July in order to a general Assembly, which is to begin on the 13th of September.

*Legorn*, June 23. The 11th instant his Excellency the Lord *Falconbridge* went from *Florence* on his way for *Venice*, having received many civilities from the Great Duke.

The 14th, the Great Duke on his Throne received the Homage of all the principal Magistrates of *Florence* in presence of the Great Dutchess, a great Train of Ladies, and all the Nobility and Gentry about the Town.

The 19th instant arrived here the *Hampshire* and *Pearl* Fregats, with the *Deptford* Ketch, and an empty Pink to take in Provisions for Sir *Thomas Allen*'s Squadron, whom they left Eight days before at *Formentiers*, intending from thence to pass over to *Algier*. The 20th arrived Five Spanish Gallies with the Prince *de Ligne* on his way to his Viceroyalty of *Sicily*; he sailed again the next day, having received civil Salutes and Presents from this place. The *Fersey* and *Centurion*, with the *Olive-branch*, *Onen* and *David*, and several Merchant ships under

their Convoy are upon departure homewards; the Dutch Convoy for *Spain* and *Holland* may suddenly follow, and will make up a Fleet of about 30 sail.

*Genova*, June 25. The 20th instant went hence the Prince *de Ligne* with three Gallies of the Duke *de Turfs* Squadron, which are to conduct him to his Vice-Royalty of *Sicily*; at his embarking he was attended by two of the said States Gallies, with eight Gentlemen sent by the States to compliment him at his departure, and to present him with several refreshments; the Compliments passing without Guns: with these Gallies went out two others bound for *Naples*, to attend Segnior *Gianettino Doria*, and to transport him to *Barcellona*.

Upon the news of the appearance upon the Coasts of the French Gallies designed for *Tunis*, Two of the States Gallies were immediately sent away with 200. Souldiers for the security of *Savona*. We have now advice that the said French Gallies are at *Vada*, which administers some cause of apprehension of their intent, that being not in their way for *Tunis*.

From *Florence* we are told, that the new Great Duke had received with much civility the Compliments of the forreign Ministers upon the death of his Father: that on the 14th instant the Senate and Counsel of 200 were to be assembled in the Palace, to swear fidelity to him according to the custom on the like occasions, and that his Excellency the Lord *Falconbridge* had made his addresses to the Great Duke privately, by whom he was received with great kindness, and was departed thence on his way for *Venice*.

From *Máltha* they write, that the Great Master had by the direction of *Vasberga* his principal Engineer, began a Fortification of Eight Bastions or Bulwarks for the defence of the Bourg and the Isle, and the Two Ports on that side, which he hopes will be suddenly finished, and would be of great service to the place if the Turks should attempt it.

From *Milan* we are informed that the Duke *d'Orsini*, the new Governour, has lately published several Edicts in order to the preservation of the peace and well-governement of that place, one of them severely prohibiting the wearing of Fire-Arms; and has set apart Two hours of Three days in every week for giving publick Audience to such, as shall make their addresses to him, which has got a little won upon the people.

From *Turin* they write, that the General, Marquess *Giron*, *Francisco Villa* after some few days sickness was departed this life; a person much lamented by the Court and City for his great, and eminent virtues, of which he had given several proofs in the defence of *Candia*, till he was called thence to the service of his own Prince; by his death there is one vacancy to be disposed of amongst the Knights of the Annunciation, as also the Charge of Generall of the Foot, which is supposed the Duke will confer on Don *Gabriel de Savoye*.

The Count *Bigliore de Lucerna* is designed Ambassador Extraordinary to *Rome* from the Duke of *Savoye*, and is preparing for his journey thither.

*Brussels* July 4. The Estates of *Brabant* not prevailing with the Constable for removal of the Cavalry

vally from their Quarters, between this City, *Louvain*, and *Mulines*, have order'd Money and Provisions to be sent to them, to take from them all excuses of ill using the Country people, many of them being already constrained by the disorders of the soldiers to quit their habitations.

The Constable has disposed of many military employments amongst his Creatures, but has not of late meddled in any other publick affairs, expecting daily to leave the Country, insomuch as the Deputies from the States General of the *United Provinces*, have not yet had their Audience.

These Countreys seem much satisfy'd with the news that *Don John of Austria* has at the last been prevailed with to accept of the Government of these Provinces, they having a particular respect for his person, and hope for good days under his Government, of which they daily expect the confirmation.

The Constable has sent away most of his Train and Baggage, and intends in few days to begin his journey homewards through *France*, leaving the Government to his successor for a time, the Count-*de Monterey*.

The Magistrates of *Louvain* and *Antwerp* remain at present without Authority, the time of the old Offices being expired, and as yet no new Election made; insomuch as the people of *Louvain* have obliged their Superiors to shut up the Town-house. The Duke d' *Haure* is nominated by the Council of *Brabant* to be sent to *Antwerp* to elect new Magistrates there, but as yet his Commission is kept in the City, which had with much approbation been some dayes before represented to the Court and Counsels of the Constables Secretary.

*Brussels*, July 12. On Tuesday in the evening the Constable of *Castille* went away privately from hence on his return for *Spain*, his departure being not publickly known till the next day. He was pleased to take his leave of the Ministers of State, and the Members of the Council by his Letters; in them excusing himself upon his indisposition of body which would not permit him to give them a formal Audience: before his departure he desired the Count de *Marcin*, Camp-master-General, *Don Estevan de Gamarre*, Ambassador to the States of the *United Provinces*, *Don Antonio de Pimentel*, the Governour of the Town and Cittadel of *Antwerp*, the Duke de *Villa Hermosa*, General of the Horse, *Mesire Charles Houines* Counsellor of State and chief President, the Baron de *la Berliere*, a Counsellor of State and Chief Treasurer of the Finances, and *Mesire Simon de Tierlant*, a Counsellor of State, and Chancellor of *Brabant* to meet together, which they did on Wednesday in the afternoon, where they opened the Constables Letters, which informed them, that the Queen Regents pleasure for the disposal of the Government, was to be found in a Cabinet in the Cittadel at *Antwerp*, of which the Governour of the said Cittadel had one Key, and the Secretary of State, and War another; *Don Antonio de Pimentel* was thereupon ordered to go for the said Cabinet to *Antwerp*, and to convey it hither to be opened in the presence of the above-named Ministers, who were accordingly to declare the successor to the Government.

*Paris*, July 12. The Duke de *Chaulnes* lately returned home from his Extraordinary Ambassy to the Court of *Rome*, was the 10th instant to wait on his Majesty at *St Germain's*, to whom he gave a brief account of his Negotiation, and was received with great show of kindness.

The same day the King met with the Queen and several Ladies of the Court to divert himself at the Camp near *St Germain's*.

The 4th instant about 9 in the evening, Madams body was honourably, but yet privately, conducted to

*St Dennis Church* in a mourning Charriot with six horses, the four Corners of the Pall born by her Almoners, attended by the Princess of *Conde* the Dutchess of *Longueville*, and Monsieurs and Madams own Officers, with a great train of other Coaches, at the sides of the Charriot about 100 Pages of the Kings household, attended with wax Tapers in their hands, before which marched Monsieur's swiss Guards, and behind his horse-Guards all of them with Torches.

The Church was hung with Mourning, at the Door the Body was received by the Religious of the place, where the chief Almoner made a Speech, which was answered by the Prior of that place, which ended the Body was placed upon a bed of State in the midst of the Church, and after the usual service performed, conveyed thence into a Chappel, where it is to continue, till a more solemn Service shall be there performed.

The same day died the Duke of *Bourbon*, eldest son to the Duke of *Enguyen*, in the *Hofel de Conde*, a Child of 32 months old, whose body being embalm'd, was with little solemnity convey'd to *St Valery* to be there interred in the burying place for that Family.

'Tis here reported that the insurrection of the people in *Vivarety* is appeased by the interposition of Monsieur de *Brancafe*, of which we expect confirmation.
