PART I

Description of Site of Existing Path

That part of the Footpath in the Parish of Hambledon in the city of Winchester shown on the Definitive Map of Public Rights of Way prepared under Part IV of the National Parks and Access to the Countryside Act 1949, as Footpath No. 8 which commences approximately 120 metres north of its junction with Road C30 and runs north-north-westwards for approximately 103 metres then northwards for approximately 90 metres. A total distance of approximately 193 metres.

PART II

Description of Site of Alternative Highway

A 1.8 metre wide headland path which commences at a stile at the southern end of the path described in Part I of this Schedule and runs northwards on the west side of a fenced hedge for approximately 190 metres to a stile to connect with Footpath No. 9.
