Westminster, May 15.

HER Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in Her Royal Robes seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Mr. Davy, Deputy Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from Her Majesty to the House of Commons, requiring their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, Her Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for establishing a General Post-Office for all Her Majesty's Dominions, and for settling a Weekly Sum out of the Revenues thereof, for the Service of the War, and other Her Majesty's Occasions.

An Act for laying certain Duties upon Hides and Skins tanned, rawed or dressed, and upon Vellum and Parchment, for the Term of thirty two Years, for prosecuting the War, and other Her Majesty's most necessary Occasions.

An Act for laying a Duty upon Hops.

An Act for Taking, Examining and Stating the Publick Accounts of the Kingdom.

An Act to make an Attempt on the Life of a Privy-Counsellor, in the Execution of his Office, to be Felony, without Benefit of Clergy.

An Act for the better preventing of Excessive and Deceitful Gaming.

An Act for making more effectual an Act of the forty Third Year of the Reign of Queen Elizabeth, Entituled, An Act concerning the Assizes of Felony, so far as it relates to the Assize of Billa.

An Act to render more effectual an Act made in the Sixth Year of Her present Majesty, Entituled, An Act to Repeal a Clause in an Act of the Seventh Year of the Reign of his late Majesty, for amending Highways, which enjoins Waggoners and others to draw with a Pole between the Wheel Horses, or with double Shafts, and to oblige them to draw only with Six Horses, or other Beasts, except up Hills.

An Act for Repairing and Amending the Highways leading from Roylton in the County of Hertford, to Wandesford-Bridge in the County of Huntington.

An Act for Repairing the Highways from Sheet-Bridge in the Parish of Petersfield, to the Town of Portsmouth in the County of Southampton.

An Act to enable Her Majesty to grant the Scite of the Castle of Exon (Parcel of Her Duchy of Cornwall) for Ninety nine Years, for the Use and Benefit of the County of Devon.

An Act for Repairing the High-Ways between Dunstable and Hockley in the County of Bedford.

An Act for the Preservation of White and other Pine-Trees, growing in Her Majesty's Colonies of New-Hampshire, the Massachusetts-Bay, and Province of Main, Rhode-Island and Providence-Plantation; the Naraganset Country, or King's-Province, and Connecticut in New-England, and New-York and New-Jersey in America; for the Masting Her Majesty's Navy.

An Act for rendering the Proceedings on Writs of Mandamus and Informations in the Nature of a Quo Warranto more speedy and effectual, and for it more easy trying and determining the Rights of Offices, and Francises in Corporations and Boroughs.

Vienna, May 9. N. S. On Wednesday Night 1:2

Major-General Graven arriv'd here with the agreeable News, that Cassovia had surrendered to the Germans on the 26th past; the Garrison, consisting of three thousand Men and upwards, accepting the Pardon that had been offer'd to 'em, and taking the Oaths of Fidelity and Allegiance to his Catholick Majesty. On the 29th Count Caroli brought to Marshal Pals the Articles of Accommodation sign'd by the Principal of the Malecontents, who march'd their Men into the Plains of Mutin, where near eleven thousand of them threw down their Arms, and surrendered their Standards and Colours to General Pals, in the Presence of Monsieur Locher. When this was done, the General acquainted them with the Death of his Imperial Majesty, at which they seem'd much astonish'd, but took the Oaths requir'd of them in a very submissive, but chearful Manner. There are now only three Places of Defence that have not made their Submission, of which Montgatz is the Chief; and so far as Count Caroli's Lady is in that Town, the Governor of which is his near Relation, and much devoted to his Interest, and his own Regiment is in Garrison there, it is expected that neither that nor the other two Places will make any Opposition, especially since they are out of all possibility of Relief from their Army; so that it is not to be doubted but a General Peace will be establish'd in a few Days, and the Kingdom of Hungary restor'd to its former Tranquility; for the forwarding and perfecting of which, Orders are sent to General Pals to continue in that Country. The King of Prussia has sent a very obliging Letter to the Empress Regent, in which he assures her Majesty of his Vote in favour of the King of Spain at the ensuing Election, and has order'd Monsieur Bartholdi, his Resident here, to go forthwith on the same Errand to his Catholick Majesty, and accordingly that Minister set out from hence yesterday for Barcelona. The Empress has likewise receiv'd Letters to the same purpose from the King of Poland.

From the Camp at Warde, May 21. N. S. The Boats laden with Ammunition and Stores being safely arrived at Bethune, St. Venant and Aire, according to their Distribution, the four thousand Palatines, which made part of their Convoy, are coming forward to join the Army, and the other Troops employ'd in that Service are return'd to the respective Garrisons from whence they were drawn on this Occasion. Thirty two Boats laden with Forage, and other Provisions for the Army, are likewise safely arriv'd near Douay up the Scarpe; but as we still expect another Convoy the same way, the Troops continue encamp'd between St. Amand and Mortagne till the whole is past by in Security. The Prince of Savoy's Equipage being arriv'd at the Abby of Anchin, which is appointed for his Quarters, his Highness is expected at the Army to Morrow. The Armies on both sides continue in their former Camps. The Enemy have not made any Detachment from their Army, as it was given out they intended to do upon the Death of the Emperor.

Hague, May 22. N. S. We have with extream Satisfaction received a Confirmation of the Agreement with the Malecontents in Hungary. It is said, that their Army, consisting of about twelve thousand Men, took the Oath of Fidelity to the King of Spain on the 29th of April, which Oath

was tender'd to 'em by General Palfi; immediately after which, having surrend'ed their Colours and Standards, they were all disbanded. Count Berezini is the only Person excepted out of the Amnesty granted on this Occasion, Prince Ragotski having three Weeks time allow'd him for the accepting of it. On the 20th past a Courier arrived here from Turin, with Dispatches for the Marquis del Bourgo, his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy's Minister at this place; whereupon he acquainted the States, and the Ministers of the Allies, that the Duke his Master was resolv'd, upon the Instances of the Queen of Great Britain, to put himself at the Head of the Army in Piedmont this Summer. The Marquis, pursuant to the Orders transmitted to him by the same Courier, sets out to Day for England, where he is to concert the necessary Measures for the Operations of the ensuing Campaign, and supporting the Designs of his Royal Highness. Our Letters from the Low-Countries advise, that both Armies continue in their former Posts; but that the Enemy suffer very much for want of Forage. The Conferences between the King of Prussia's Ministers, and those of the Prince of Nassau, are continued here, tho' no great progress has been hitherto made in that Affair. The States of Holland continue to meet every Day, but are not yet come to any Resolutions upon the Projects that have been laid before them for the levying of Money: They seem inclin'd to do it by a Lottery, which is to be of the same Nature with those that have been made in England, and by which they will be able to raise some Millions. The Count de Schonborn is arriv'd here from the Elector of Mayence, being sent by that Prince to concert with the States, and the Ministers of the Allies, such Measures as shall be thought expedient at this Conjunction for the Interest of the Empire, and that of the Common Cause.
