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Lisbonne, June 9.

THere are now in *Setubal* Eight Holland ships, employ'd by the States to lade Salt, to the value of a Million of Crusados, according to a former agreement, but as yet the Dutch Resident has not received his Orders for their lading.

The Grand Master of *Malta* has lately sent his Commission to a Fidalgo of *Portugal*, a Knight of that Order, and Brother to *Montenegro*, Vice-Admiral to *Brazille*, constituting him his Ambassador to this Court: he is in Order thereunto gone into his Province to make preparation for his entrance which he intends to make with much splendour.

Vienna, June 28. Their Imperial Majesties have for some days been diverting themselves in hunting at *Stockerau*, but returned yesterday to this City. Monseignor *Marcshottri*, the Popes Nuncio to *Poland* is lately arrived here from that Kingdom, with a Guard and a great Train, the guard is dismissed, and the said Nuncio this day departed hence on his way for *Rome*.

The Popes Nuncio to this place having by an express received several dispatches from the Court of *Rome*, made his addresses to the Emperor, and amongst other things, desired that Chevalier *Borry* who has been some time a prisoner here, might be delivered up to him the said Nuncio, to be sent to *Rome*, which the Emperor accordingly granted, and on Friday last the said *Borry* was brought to him, and by his Order sent to the Bishops Palace, where he had a guard appointed to secure him, and Irons put upon his hands and feet; he is since sent away for *Rome* with a party of 30 Horse.

Here is lately arrived a Courier from General *Spork*, giving an account of the posture of affairs in *Hungary*; affirming that Prince *Ragoſki* had received Imperial Garisons into several places of his own territories, and particularly into *Echeid*, and his Castle of *Potaok*, and delivered several Companies of his forces to the Emperors service, and had since liberally entertained the Generals and other principal Officers of the Army, professing his readiness to obey all the Emperors Commands. The people of *Cassovia* have not yet submitted, but the Army is marched towards that place intending to lay a formal siege to force them to their Duties, having received the Canon and train of Ammunition which was sent to them.

Venice, June 28. A vessel arriving here from *Zant* informs us, that an Herald arriving some days before at *Candia*, acquainted the Grand Visier of the arrival of the Grand Segnior at *Adrianople*, having spent his time by the way in the diversions of the Country, especially in hunting, in which he principally pleases himself. The Visier immediately ordered all his Train and Baggage to be embarked, and his Gallies and all his Fleet to be in readiness to sail with the first Orders, and that he intended to take with him our Minister Chevalier *Molino*. The Emperor intends not to move towards *Constantinople* till the Visiers arrive.

Proveditor General *Bernardo* is lately arrived at

Zant, where are also several of our men of war from the Isle of *Corfu*, with whom are to be joyned six light Gallies and 4 Galeasses, under the Command of Segnior *Cornaro*, to free the seas from those Corsairs, who much disturb Navigation, to the great prejudice of the Merchants: some prizes have been already rescued out of their hands, and some of the Pyrats taken, who are sent to the Visier to be exemplarily punished as disturbers of the peace.

The Magistrates at *Spalatro* are building Magazines for the Merchants, and Lazarets or Hospitals for suspected Goods, and for sick and infirm persons, which are already well advanced, and are inviting to them great numbers of people, whom they intend to employ as Porters and Labourers to search and air suspected Goods to avoid infection. The Jews, inhabitants of the same City, who are great Traders in the *Levant*, have desired and got leave, that four of their own Tribe may be employed in the Lazarets, to take care of such Merchandises as belong to them.

On Monday the 16th instant arrived here his Excellency the Lord *Falconbridge*, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great Britain*, but continues yet *incognito*, he intends to divert himself some days at *Padua*, till he has fitted himself to make his solemn Entry.

Some skirmishes have happened between the Imperial forces and the Hungarians, who continue still in Arms, in one of which about 300 Hungarians were killed upon the place, and two of their General Officers, *Botskay* and *Bani* taken prisoners; but in another place, a party of the Hungarians defeated some of our Foragers, and took about 16 prisoners.

Our Army is much more assaulted by sickness than the enemy, of which have lately dyed many Officers as well as Soldiers, amongst others, Colonel *Gayman*, an Officer of great eminency in the Army; Colonel *Lesly*, who Commands a Regiment of Foot in this Expedition, is fallen ill of the same Camp-distemper, with little hopes of recovery.

The Counts *Serini* and *Frangipani* are still confined, and have been lately interrogated upon several points, and their depositions carried to the Emperor.

The Spanish Ambassador is now quitting his Lodgings to make room for the Marquis *de los Balbaces Spinola*, daily expected here from *Milan* to succeed him in the same Character, but intends not to return for *Madrid* till August.

Legorn, June 30. The 24th instant departed the *Ferly* and *Censurion* Fregats, with several Merchant ships under their Convoy, and in their company the Dutch Convoy for *Spain* and *Holland*. The 26th sailed hence the *Hampshire* and *Pearl* Fregats, and *Deptsford* Ketch, on their way to the Fleet, under the Command of Sir *Tho. Allen*, of whom we have had no late account.

The French Gallies and Galiois are said to be now at *Porro Fino*, and may be expected here to morrow on their way for *Tunis*, to oblige those of that place to an agreement, who will not yet hearken to the Articles which have been offered them. It is also said, that Eight French ships are sent away for *Tripoly*

Tripoly to endeavor to make a peace there, or at the least to confine the Turkish ships to their Ports.

Amsterdam, July 14. Here passed lately by this place, Monsieur *Akaki* on his return from *Dantzig*, his most Christian Majesty having thought fit to recall him from his employment in those parts, the better to take off all suspicion of any designs he might have to give any disturbance to the affairs of *Poland*.

The Bishop of *Stratsbourg* is daily expected at the *Hague*, intending afterwards for *Brussels*, to be present at the solemn commemoration of the miraculous Host, whither is also going the Baron *d'Isola* upon a Yacht sent him by the States.

The Bishop of *Cologne* intends suddenly to make a voyage into *Italy*.

From *Berlin* we are informed, that the Elector of *Brandenbourg* has promised a considerable succor to the King of *Poland*, if his occasions shall require them, and has already sent one of his best Regiments to his service.

Some French ships passing from *Rio de Gambi* to *Curassow*, have seized a ship belonging to the *Guiny-Company* of the Chamber of *Groningue*.

Hague, July 15. The Heers *Vreiberghe* and *Vanderwocht* are lately returned home from *Brussels*, and have given the States an account of their Negotiation there, about the Differences and disputes with the Admiralty of *Ostend*.

The Commander *Vander Broeck* lately returned home from the *East Indies* is daily expected here to give the States an account of all affaires in those remote parts.

The French Ambassador has lately presented two Memorials to the States, one of them desiring the restitution of a ship which was taken and carried into *Zealand* during the late wars, and the other for the restoring of some Ecclesiastical Estates about the territory of *Hulst*, which are said to have belonged formerly to the Clergy of *Courtray*.

The dispute between the Marquis of *Westerloo* and the Abbess of *Hocht* is like to have a peaceable issue, the Council of *Liege* being willing the Marquis should appeal from the sentence given against him, upon Condition the Fortifications of *Peterschem* might be demolished, and the Garrison withdrawn.

Brussels, July 16. On Friday last returned hither Don *Antonio de Pimentel*, Governour of *Antwerp*, who was employed by the Commissioners to fetch from the Cittadel of *Antwerp*, the Cabinet wherein was contained the Queen Regents pleasure in constituting a Governor of the *Neiberlands*. On Saturday the said Commissioners assembling at the Palace, the Cabinet was opened, wherein was found a Commission, constituting the Count *de Monterey*, Governour in the place of the Constable of *Castille*, the news whereof was immediately disperst through this City, and generally received with extraordinary satisfaction for the great opinion the people have of his virtue and merit: On Sunday the Count *de Marcia*, Camp-Master-General, went to *Antwerp* to Compliment the new Governour upon his preferment. The Councils have also chosen several of their Body, and the City several Deputies to Compliment him upon the same subject, and to make their submissions to his power, and withal, to invite him to countenance with his presence the Anniversary for the so Famed miracle of a consecrated Host, stabbed by the Jews in the year 1370, which is observed here with extraordinary solemnity.

The Count *de Monterey* is expected here on Thursday next, the whole City as well as the Soldiery making preparations to receive him with much Honour.

Ghent, July 16. The Constable of *Castile* having privately left *Brussels*, to avoyd the Ceremonies of taking leave, which his want of health would not dispence with, being about half a League from the Town, sent back all his footmen, and two of his Coaches, a party of horse there attending him for his Convoy, with whom he went that night, viz. on Tuesday the last week to *Hall*, from thence to *Conde*, and so towards *Cambreay*, with a design to have passed through *France*, but then his mind changing he changed also his road, and turning back through the Country, on Monday about seven in the Evening, he arrived here, but sent in an Officer before him to prevent the Ceremony of a solemn Reception, which was intended him by the Governour, nor would he receive the Visits of the Governour or Grand Bayliff, excusing himself upon his Indisposition. Yesterday he went away privately in his own Coach without the attendance of any but his one servants to *Bruges* Port, where he took Boat, and intends this day to go to *Ostend*, there to Embark-himself for *Spain*.

The Count *de Monterey* has entred upon the Government as his successor, and his Council settled according to his Instructions. The President of *Flanders* and Surintendant Monsieur *Arembaut*, after a long Confinement at *Brussels*, was this last week restored to his Employments, and has been since with the four Members at *Bruges* in the Execution of his Office.

Paris, July 16. On Sunday last his Majesty, attended by Monsieur *Colbert*, and several persons of his Court, went to see the opening of his Camp, where he intends his Army shall continue exercising and relieving the Regiments by turns, till the midst of *September*.

Yesterday his Excellency Mr. *Montague* was introduced according to form by Monsieur *de Berlise* to his Audience from his Majesty to condole with him for the death of Madam, and the same day had his Audience from the Queen upon the same subject.

The same day the Residents from *Sweden* and *Mantua* made their Compliments likewise to his Majesty upon the same occasion.

The Heer *Gabel*, the Danish Resident went hence on Saturday last for *Denmark*, but has left his family behind, and took no leave of the Court, intending to return again within two months.

We have not yet any certain news of the composition of the troubles in *Vivarez*.

London, July 16. On Thursday last arrived here His Highness the Prince Landgrave of *Hessen Castle* to take a view of the Curiosities of this place, as he has done of those of several other Kingdoms and Countrys in his Travels; yesterday in the afternoon he was conducted to His Majesties presence, by Sir *Charles Cotterel* the Master of the Ceremonies, as he was afterwards to the Queens, from whom he had a kind reception suitable to his Birth and quality.
