Venice, May 15. N. S.

HEY write from Genoa, that his Grace the Duke of Argyle was arrived there, and wou'd embark on Board the Confederate Fleet Commanded by Sir John Norris, which has been forced back to Vado by contrary Winds, but will Sail again with the very fell Opportunity. The Earl of Peterborough having had several Conferences with his Royal Highusthe Duke of Savoy at the Venerie, is likewise spedily expected at Genoa, in order to go on Board the faid Fleet, and proceed with it to Bar-Marihal Thaun arriv'd the 8th Inflant at Turin, from whence he was conducted the next Morning to the Venerie. It is thought he will return in a few Days to Milan, having first conterted with his Royal Highness the necessary Meafires that are to be taken this Campaign. Thursday last our Doge personnid the Annual Ceremony of espousing the Sea, which was done with the accustom'd Formalities. Monsieur Parisot, Envoy from the Duke of Lorrain to this State, has had his Audience of Leave, and is preparing to return home very speedily. Our Letters from Rome advise, that the Pope has written to all the Catholick Electors of the Empire, in behalf of the late Electors of Bavaria and Cologn, and had appointed his Nephew Signior Albani to assist as his Nuncio Extraordinary at the approaching Election of a new Emperor. The Marquis de Prie acquainted the Pope at his last Audience, that the Elector of Mayence had appointed him Ambaffador from the Empire during the present Vacancy, since which he has acted as such, and been received in that Charaster. The Countess of Borromeo arriv'd the 8th Instant at Rome, where the will continue a few Days, and then proceed in her Voyage to Naples; from whence some Persons of Diffinction have been ordered by the Viceroy to wait on her, and conduct her thither.

Leipsiet, May 18. N. S. Monieur Westphal, his Polish Majesty's Envoy to the King of Prussia, is return'd by his Majesty's Order to the Court at Berlin. The Hereditary Prince of Muscovy having receiv'd an Express from his Czarish Majesty, signifying his Consent to the Match on soot between that Prince and the young Princess of Wolfenbuttel, set out immediately for the Court of Wolfenbuttel, and was expected from thence at To:gow the 16th: Soon after which it is thought the Nuptials will be solemniz'd at that Place. The Czar of Muscovy continues at Jawarrow, and is perfectly recovered of his late Indisposition. He has sent frequent Expresses to the King, intimating haw much he desired a speedy Interview with his Majesty, which he considered as indispen-

fably necessary at the present Conjuncture; whereupon the King having provided for the Security
of this Electorate during his Absence, set out this
Day for Poland, in order to meet the Czar at
Cracow. As his Majesty's Presence is of great
Consequence here, it is thought he will return
hither in less than a Month's time. Our Letters
from Jawarrow advise, that Prince Constantin Sobieski, Son to the late King of Poland, was at
that Place, where the Czar treated him with a
Respect due to his Quality. Prince Ragotski and
Count Berezini are there likewise, and have been
admitted to an Audience, wherein they desired
his Czarish Majesty's Intercession and Protection
in behalf of themselves and their Adherents. Signior Fantoni, the Duke of Guasala's Minister here;
had his Audience of Leave before the King's departure for Poland; and as his Majesty has been
pleased to assure him that he was ready, in Coneurrence with the other Electors of the Empire,
to favour his Masser's Pretensions to the Dutchy
of Mantua, that Minister proposeth to prevail
with their Electoral Highnesses to stipulate the
Duke's admission to the Succession of that Dutchy
at the ensuing Election of an Emperor.

From the Camp at Warde, May 28. N. S. On Monday Night the 25th, a Detachment of near four thousand Men of the Garrison of Ipres marched cut under the Command of the Count de Villars, Brother to the Mareschal; they came to Harlebeck about five the next Morning, and attacked a fmall Fort there, in which we had only forty Men, commanded by Lieutenant Dunbar of Lieutenant-General Murray's Regiment, who behaved themselves with very great Gallantry, and repulsed the Enemy three times; but six of them being killed, and the Lieutenant and thirty two more being wounded, they were obliged to furrender. The Enemy afterwards fet Fire to the upper part of the Wood Work of the Sluices, notwith-flanding its being contrary to an Article in the Treaty of Contributions, by which these Sluices, as well as others on the Lys, and the several Rivers in this Country, on the to be secured. The Damage is very inconsiderable, and will be repair'd in four or five Days. The Prince of Holstein-Beck, upon the first Notice of the Enemy's Motion, march'd out with the Garrison of Lisle, sollowed by a Detachment of Horse, to endeavour to cut off the Enemy in their Retreat, but they retired in so much halle, that it was not possible for him to come up with them. Yesterday we made a general Forage along the Senset and the Schelde, within half Cannon Shot of Bouchain, with an Escorte of three thousand Foot, two thousand Horse, and six pieces of Cannon, commanded by Lieutenant-General Cadogan. The Troops that remained in the Camp were like-wise ordered to be in a readiness to March, it
