Frankfort, May 28. N. S.

THEY write from Vienna, that the Count de Mollart set out from thence the 19th Instant for Barcelona; from whence a Courier is daily expected with Dispatches for the Empress Regent relating to the Government of the Hereditary Countries, and to the nominating a Person who is to be Ambassador on the behalf of his Catholick Majesty, as King of Bohemia, at the approaching Election of an Emperor. It is expected that the Choice will fall on Count Wratislaw, tho' there are some other Competitors for that Employment. These Letters add, that the Garrison of Buda has been changed, and that all possible Care is taken for the restoring the Tranquillity of Hungary. The Marechal de Bezons is arriv'd in the Enemy's Lines, and has been to visit all the Posts in those Parts. The French have thrown a Bridge over the Rhine at Selingen, and give out that they intend to pass that River; but as the Army of the Empire, which is daily reinforced, will be shortly in a Condition to make Head against them, it is the general Opinion that they will not be able to undertake any considerable Enterprize. The Prince of Nassau Hadamar is dead suddenly of an Apoplexy. He was Judge of the Imperial Chamber at Watzler; but it is thought no Person will be appointed to succeed him in that Employment 'till after the Election of a new Emperor.

From the Camp at Warde, June 1. N. S. On Friday the 29th past his Grace the Duke of Marlborough began the Review of the Troops, with that of the Horse of the first Line of the Right Wing of the Army under his Command, consisting of those of Great Britain and Hanover, and both Men and Horses appear'd in such good Order as gave his Grace a great deal of Satisfaction. The Meadows and Grounds along the Senfet in the front of our Army affording Grass sufficient to subsist our Horse for several Days, and that much more convenient than their fetching Forage to their Pickets, the Disposition was made on Saturday for taking such Posts upon the Senfet as are proper for the Security of the Grasers, and sixteen hundred Foot and eight hundred Horse being appointed for this Service, have taken Possession of the Posts between Arleux and Wavrechin near Bouchain, and are to be reliev'd every eight and forty Hours. The Pickets of both the Armies are likewise constantly drawn out at the Head of the Line, and all other necessary Dispositions made to support them in case the Enemy should attempt to give them any Disturbance; the Grasing being within sight of their Army, and some of our advanced Posts within less than Musket Shot of their Outguards.

Hague, June 2. N. S. An Express the Count de Zinzendorf had sent some time since to Genoa, return'd from thence two Days ago, with Letters dated the 18th of May importing, that the Fleet commanded by Sir John Norris sail'd from Vado on the 15th, with a fair Wind, which continuing favourable, it was not doubted but the next Ac-

count of them would be that the Forces were landed safe at Barcelona. The Duke of Argyle and the Earl of Peterborough were still at Genoa when this Express came away, but were preparing to leave that Place; his Grace being ready to embark for Barcelona, and the Earl of Peterborough on his return for Vienna. The King of Prussia arriv'd the 29th past at Wesel, and was expected last Night at Cleves. Monsieur Hymen, his Majesty's Envoy, has signified to the States, that his Master intends to be here in a few Days; but having acquainted them at the same time, that his Majesty designs to come in a private manner, they have thereupon resolv'd to send no Deputation as usual to Cleves; but have order'd their Envoy, Monsieur Lintelo, to repair thither forthwith. The Conferences appointed to accommodate the Matters in dispute betwixt his Prussian Majesty and the Prince of Nassau are continued; but as yet the Commissioners are not come to an Agreement upon any of the Articles that are in debate before them. The Prince having not hitherto consented to the quitting of Dieren to his Majesty, the States have made fresh Instances to him on that Account. The States being inform'd, that the French are fitting out several Men of War at Dunkirk and other Places, they have thereupon order'd all the Ships that are in a Condition to put to Sea to sail forthwith, and join the Queen of Great Britain's Fleet in the Downs, by which means they will be able to make Head against the Enemy should they think fit to come out, and oppose their Designs. Monsieur Matueof, his Czarish Majesty's Ambassador, has acquainted this State, that the Son of the Cham of Tartary having laid Siege to Bialacerkiew, a considerable Place on the Frontiers of Poland, the Muscovites under the Command of Prince Galliczin march'd to its relief, and obliged the Tartars to abandon the Siege, after they had lost upwards of two thousand Men in three several Assaults. The Tartars retired in some Disorder towards Sieniawa, near which Place a Detachment of the Muscovites came up with their Rear Guard, consisting of about ten thousand Men, which they entirely defeated, killing great numbers of the Infidels, and setting at Liberty seven thousand Christian Slaves. The States of Holland are to meet the next Week, at which time it is thought they will come to a Resolution of raising some Millions by way of Lottery. Count Zinzendorf return'd the 29th of the last Month from Nimeguen, where he has been to confer with the Baron de Hontheim, the Elector Palatin's Minister. They write from Paris, that the Duke of Alva died there the 28th of the last Month, in the Forty fifth Year of his Age.

Falmouth, May 24. On the 22d sail'd to Cruise the Griffin and Flying Mercury Privateers, and yesterday they sent in a French Privateer of six Guns and fifty two Men: The said Dutch Privateers met two more French Ships off this Place, which they chased, and we believe they are taken.

Cowes, May 26. Yesterday pass'd by this Island to the Westward Sir John Leake's Squadron of thirteen Ships of War, with a fair Wind, which continues.
