MR. Chetwynd, the Queen of Great Britain's Envoy-Extraordinary to the Duke of Savoy, is arrived here, and has been to wait on his Royal Highness at the Venerie. The Count de Provana is to set out on Friday next for the Court of Vienna, whither he is sent in the Quality of Envoy-Extraordinary from the Duke of Savoy, to make his Compliments of Condolance on the Death of the Emperor. On the 14th Instant his Royal Highness enter'd into the 45th Year of his Age, and receiv'd the Compliments of the Chief Officers of the Court, and all the Foreign Ministers on that Occasion. The Regiment of Guards commanded by the Marquis d'Andorno was drawn out before the Palace, where they made a tripple Discharge; as did likewise all the Cannon from the Ramparts and Citadel; and in the Evening the Princes were entertain'd with Fireworks at the Venerie. It is said the Enemy have been carrying on a private Correspondence with some Persons in Coni, and had drawn out some Troops in order to surprize that Place; but that their Designs have been frustrated by a seasonable Discovery.

Vienna, May 27. N. S. Our Letters from Hungary advise, that the Fortrefs of Ungwar was surrendered the 15th Instant; but that Prince Ragotzki having been informed of the late Emperor's Death, had sent his Command to the Governor of Montgat, not to deliver up that Place till he was compell'd by Necessity, by which means the Prince will have time to try if his Affairs may be brought to receive a more favourable turn from the present Conjunction. The Emissaries of France give out, that the Prince has lately received considerable Remittances from thence, and that the French King has engag'd to furnish him with Monthly Supplies, that he may be the better enabled to insist upon his own Terms, and encouraged to hold out to the last Extremity. He was before Treating with the Czar of Muscovy, and Proposals were made for putting two thousand Men, that still remain under his Command, into his Czarish Majesty's Service; but since he has receiv'd Advice of the Emperor's Death, and been tempted by these Overtures from France, he has appointed a Conference with Count Esterhass, who has the like number of Men at his Disposal, and they are to see what remains to be done, in order to continue the Troubles in Hungary, and prevent, if possible, the good Effects of the late Accommodation; but as those Forces are too weak to answer their Purposes, and the Town of Montgat is closely block'd up by General Palfi, this Court is under no Apprehensions of any further Disturbances from thence; but look on that Affair as too firm and secure to be in any danger of a Relapse. Monsieur Bruinynx, having receiv'd an Order from the States to that purpose, has given this Regency an Assurance, in the Queen of Great Britain's Name, of her Majesty's Concurrence with their High Mightinesses, in the Resolutions they had taken to stand by the House of Austria, and promote his Catholick Majesty's Interest at the ensuing Election. The Count de Wackerbarth, the King of Poland's Minister to this Court, set out from hence this Morning. It

is thought he has receiv'd Orders from his Master to meet his Majesty on his way to Poland. The Chevalier Dini, the Grand Duke of Tuscany's Envoy-Extraordinary, is come hither, to make his Master's Compliments of Condolance on the Death of the late Emperor. Count Wratisslaw being appointed to assist as his Catholick Majesty's Ambassador and Plenipotentiary at the Election of an Emperor, is preparing to set out for Francfort accordingly.

Cologne, June 5. N. S. They write from Francfort, that the Army of the Empire is encamped at Munkenstrum, and is daily reinforc'd by the Arrival of the Troops that are marching thither from all Parts. The Regiments of Savoy and Lobkowitz, consisting of two thousand Horse, are expected in the Dutchy of Wirtemberg this Week, in order to join it; and the Duke of Wirtemberg, who has the Command of this Army during the Absence of the Prince of Savoy, has ordered Entrenchments to be thrown up, and secur'd the Avenues of the Camp, to prevent any Attempts from the French. His Highness went the first Instant under a Guard of Horse to Selingen, to view the situation of the Enemy, who have not yet made any Movements. Mareschal Harcourt has been for some time at Strashbourg, and the Mareschal de Bezons has his Quarters at Drusenhetm. The French Army is said to consist of thirty eight Battalions, and as many Squadrons; and they still give out, that they shall be in a Condition to pass the Rhine in a few Days time; but such Care has been taken by our Generals, that shou'd they be able to put their Design in Execution, it will have no other effect, than the consuming the Forage, and raising some Contributions in the Marquisate of Baden-Dourlach. Two thousand Recruits for the German Troops in Flanders arriv'd in the Neighbourhood of this Place on Sunday last, and are at present encamp'd between Merzem and Nihlen, from whence they will speedily continue their March towards Brabant. Our Letters from the North advise, that the King of Sweden was retired from Bender, having been obliged to it by a Mutiny among the Janizaries. They make no mention of the Motions of the Turks; but assure us, on the contrary, that his Czarish Majesty will be in such a forwardness, as to be able to prevent them, and be before 'em in the Field. These Letters add, that the Czar has declared that so soon as the Interview between his Majesty and the King of Poland is over, he will without delay put himself at the Head of his Army.

Brussels, June 13. N. S. Upon Advice that Mareschal Villars has made a Detachment towards Germany, the Imperial and Palatine Auxiliaries, which serve on this side, have received Orders to March back to the Rhine; and the Prince of Savoy, who returns with them, has appointed the Imperial Commissary, who is at present in this Place, to make Preparations for their March thro' these Provinces.

Ostend, June 15. N. S. On Tuesday the 9th Instant his Grace the Duke of Marlborough finished the Review of the Army with that of the Foot in the Pay of the States-General; the several National Corps of which appear'd in very good Order. On the 10th the Forces commanded by the
