**T**HE Prussian Troops that have been Quarter'd this Winter in the Parmesan, are to March towards Piemont, where a Body of three thousand Men are already assembled, and are encamped near Sufa. All the other Forces that are at present in Lombardy are likewise filing off towards those Parts; where all the necessary Dispositions are making for the speedy opening of the Campaign. Our Letters from Spain tell us, that the Dutchess of Anjou continued in an ill State of Health, and had been advised to reside during the Campaign at Corella, a Town in Navarre. These Letters add, that it was resolv'd at Saragossa not to open the Campaign till the 15th of the next Month, at which time the great Heats will not suffer them to undertake any thing of Importance. The Duke of Anjou's Affairs have suffer'd very much from some Contests between the Duke of Vendome and General Mahoni, which have been carried very high, and managed with great Animosities; infomuch that we are told the Duke of Veadome has threatn'd to quit the Service. The Miquelets continue to annoy the Spanish Forces, and frequently intercept their Convoys of Provisions, by which means their Army suffers much for want of Necessaries, and their Troops grow very thin through Sicknefs and Desertion. The Marquis de los Balbastes, late Viceroy of Sicily, being recall'd, is preparing to go to Spain by the way of Marseilles, and we hear the Prince of Santo-Buono is appointed to succeed him. We have received Letters from Barcellona of the 19th Instant, importing, that the Reinforcements lately sent from Naples, are safely arriv'd there; but as yet we have had no Account of the Squadron under the Command of Sir John Norris, since he sail'd the 15th from Vado. The Prince of Avellino, his Catholick Majesty's Ambassador at Rome, has, in his Master's Name, notified to the Pope the Death of the late Emperor, and desired his Holiness to promote the King of Spain's Interest at the approaching Election.

*Venice, May 25. N. S.* The Prince de Santo-Buono, who has resid'd here in the Quality of Ambassador from the Duke of Anjou to this Republick, having been appointed Viceroy of Sicily by that Prince, is upon his Departure thither. The Countess of Borronico is still at Rome, whether the Prince of Trivulzio, Nephew to the Viceroy of Naples, is come to attend her, and has been admitted to an Audience of the Pope. Several Persons have been lately taken up at Rome for uttering false Money, and among the rest a Spanish Priest, on whom were found a great number of Counterfeit Pistoles. The Funeral Obsequies of the late Emperor have been observ'd with the accustomed Ceremonies in all the Churches in Naples, where the Imperial Troops have taken the usual Oath to his Catholick Majesty.

*Hamburg, June 4. N. S.* The Muscovite Troops that have been appointed to join the Saxon Forces on the Oder, are marching that way. They

write from Copenhagen, that the Danish Fleet will soon be in a Condition to put to Sea, and that the Baron de Lewendael is upon his Departure for Norway. The Swedish Forces continue quiet in Pomerania, where they have been review'd by King Stanislaus, and expect speedily to be joined by a Reinforcement out of Schonen. A malignant Distemper rages at Elsenor, and destroys great numbers of the Inhabitants, for which reason timely Care has been taken to post Guards upon the Roads leading from it, and cut off all Communication with that Place. It is said the King of Poland will be receiv'd by the Chief of the Polish Senators at Cracow, from whence they are to attend his Majesty to the Interview appointed between that Prince and the Czar of Muscovy.

*Frankfort, June 7. N. S.* They write from Vienna, that the Count de Wackerbarth, who set out the 27th for Poland, was taken ill suddenly on the Road, so that he has not been able to prosecute his Journey. The French continue very industrious in their Endeavours to revive, and continue the Disturbances in Hungary, for which purpose they have been at a considerable Expence already, and are very profuse in their Promises to Prince Ragotski, and the rest, provided they will effect what is required of them; but as the Hungarians in general are weary of the War, and extremely desirous to enjoy the Benefits of the late Amnesty, without exposing their Country to farther Confusions, it is not believed that a few of their Ring-leaders will be able to answer the Purposes of the French, by renewing the War in those Parts. On the contrary, our Letters from the North advise, that Count Berezzini is going into the Service of his Czarish Majesty, who has promised to confer on him part of the Estate of the late General Mazeppa. These Letters add, that the King of Sweden is retired into a Monastery within seven Leagues of Bender, and that no Account had hitherto been given of the Palatin of Kiovia, which inclines People to believe the former Reports of his being kill'd in the late Engagement with the Muscovites. The French have prepared a great number of Bridges at Fort Louis, and threaten to pass the Rhine near that Place, in order to force our Lines; but as the Army of the Empire has lately received considerable Reinforcements, and our Lines are in a very good Condition, it is not doubted but they will meet with many Difficulties in that Enterprize.

*Falmouth, June 3.* Yesterday came in the St. Teresa of and from Bilboa for London. Just now sail'd the Ann Packet-boat, Captain Peak Commander, with two Mails for Lisbon. Sir John Leake is riding with his Squadron about four Leagues off this Place, and has sent the Mary Galley in hither, to wait for an Express.

*Whitehall, June 8.* Her Majesty has been pleas'd to appoint Charles Cesar, Esq; to be Treasurer of the Navy.
