**M**onsieur Parisot, the Duke of Lorain's Envoy to this Republick, set out from hence on Wednesday last in the Evening, and returns home by the way of Inspruck. They write from Rome, that the Duke of Anjou had lately publish'd an Edict, wherein he Protests against every thing the Court of Rome has lately done, or shall do in relation to the Affairs of Spain. He likewise refused the Spanish Augustin Friars the Liberty of sending their Deputies to the General Chapter of that Order, because it was held at Rome; and having been informed that the Chapter are likely to make Choice of a Neopolitan for their General, he has for that reason already protested against that Choice. The Pope has granted large Indulgences to all such as shall Pray for a speedy and unanimous Election of an Emperor, and was to assist on Monday last in Person at a great Procession appointed for the obtaining those Indulgences. In the mean time he has written to all the Popish Princes in the Empire, in behalf of the late Electors of Cologne and Bavaria, and prest in very earnest Terms to have them restored. A Courier is arrived at Rome, being sent from Barcelona with a Patent, Constituting the Count de Borromeo Viceroy of Naples, he having hitherto acted in that Character only Provisionally. Upon the Arrival of this Courier, his Lady is preparing to proceed with all Expedition to Naples.

*Turin, May 30. N. S.* This Court has put on close Mourning on Account of the Emperor's Death, and all the Foreign Ministers residing here have done the same. The Duke of Argyle sailed the 23d Instant from Genoa for Barcelona, and the Earl of Peterborough return'd hither the 27th, and went straight to the Venerie, where he has continued ever since; but it is thought his Lordship will set out in a few Days for Vienna. Our Letters from the Frontiers advise, that the Enemy's Troops, both Horse and Foot, are in a very mean Condition, especially those that have been detached by the Duke of Noailles from Catalonia. The Duke of Berwick's Equipage is arrived at Grenoble, at which Place he is expected in a few Days, and it is said he will take his Quarters at Fort Christian. These Letters add, that a Detachment the Enemy had ordered for the Rhine has been Countermanded. The Mountains are not yet passable by reason of the Snow, which continues to lie in greater quantities than has been known at this Season. The Marquis d'Onubrio, Envoy-Extraordinary from the King of Spain at this Court, set out this Morning on his own private Affairs for Milan.

*From the Camp at Warde, June 11. N. S.* On the 9th Instant his Grace the Duke of Marlborough finish'd the Review of the Army; and yesterday Lieutenant-General Murray, with the eight Battalions and nine Squadrons under his Command, was ordered to take Post between Warneton and

Commines, for the better Security of the Navigation of the Lys against the Garrison of Ipres; and is to give from his Corps sufficient Escorte for the Flower, and other Provisions that are ordered to be sent to Bethune and Aire. Yesterday the Army Commanded by the Prince of Savoy made a very good Forage along the Senet near Arleux, without any Loss or Disturbance from the Enemy. The Enemy have made a Detachment from their Army of fifteen Battalions and fifteen Squadrons, which are march'd towards Cambrai, and 'tis said are designed for Germany.

*From the Camp at Lens, June 15. N. S.* Yesterday Morning at break of Day his Grace the Duke of Marlborough march'd with the Army under his Command in six Columns from the Camp of Warde, and having passed the Canal of Arleux and the Scarpe near Vitry, in presence of the Enemy, came and encamped on the Plains of Lens, with the Right at Lewen, and the Left near Henin-Lietard. The Hereditary Prince of Hesse was Commanded with thirty Squadrons, which were posted between Arleux and Biache, to observe the Enemy's Motions, and cover our March, for which the Disposition was made in such a manner, that the Enemy did not think fit to attempt any thing. The Enemy having made a Detachment from their Army, which they give out is intended for Germany, the Prince of Savoy, according to the Instructions he received from Vienna, was obliged to Detach thither the Imperial and Palatine Troops, consisting of fifty Squadrons and twelve Battalions, who begun yesterday to March towards the Rhine, and encamped last Night at Orchies. His Highness went himself to Tournay, and designs to go from thence for two or three Days to the Hague, and will join the Troops at their passing the Rhine at Coblenz. The Troops of Denmark, Saxony and Hesse, which compos'd part of the Prince's Army, are returned to their former Post in that under the Command of his Grace the Duke of Marlborough. The Enemy decamp'd yesterday soon after we begun our March, and are now posted behind the Scarpe, with their Right at Monchy le Preux, their Left at the Ruiffeau of Ugy, and the Town of Arras before their Center.

*Hague, June 16. N. S.* All our Letters from France agree, that Sir John Norris arriv'd with the Fleet under his Command the 27th of the last Month at Barcelona; but still pretend he has been very much damaged by a Storm on the 17th, mentioned in their Letters from Marseilles, tho' they confess the Loss sustained in it is not so considerable as it was at first reported. According to these Letters the French are fitting out several Ships at Brest, Rochefort and Port Louis, and it is said, that so soon as those Ships are ready to Sail, they are to receive some regular Troops on Board. The French King having prohibited the Importation of all Merchandizes sent from such Countries as belong to any of the Powers engaged in the present War against France, it is thought here, that an entire stop will be put to the Trade with that
