My Lords and Gentlemen,

I T is with great Pleasure I tell you, at the End of this Session, That you have fully made good all the Assurances you gave Me at the Reginning of it.

This I look upon as a further Pledge of my Sub-jests Duty and Affection, which is the firmest Support of my Throne.

I Thank you, Gentlemen of the House of Commons, in a particular manner, for what you have done. You have complied with my Desire in granting a Supply for Building many new Churches, and you have not enly enabled me to carry on the War, but have made effectual Provision for paying those beauty Debts which were almost grown an insupportable Purther on the Publick; and this at a time when our Enemies every where pleased themselves when our knimes every where pleased inemserves with the Hopes that the Supplies for the Service of the Current Year could not have been found. You have Disappointed them in all Respects, and by the great Sums you have raised, the greatest ever granted to any Prince in one Session, you have restored the Public Credit, which I will take Care to preserve has a feward Management. by a frugal Management.

The World must now be fatisfied, That nothing can be too dissicult for a Parliament filled with so much Zeal for the True Interest of the Nation in Church and State.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

The Satisfaction I take in the Power with which God has intrusted me, is to employ it for the Protection and Good of all my People, whose Prosperity I have as much at Heart as ever any of my Predecessirs had.

You se the happy Effects of a mutual Confidence between me and my Subjects; I shall look upon any Attempt to lessen it, as a Step towards Dissolving

my Government.

The Temper you have shown, will I hope Convince those who have the Nissfortune to differ from our Church, that their Liberty is not in Danger.

It is needless for me to r peat the Assurances of my earnest Concern for the Succession in the House of Hannover, and of my fixed Resolution to Support and Encourage the Church of England, as by Law Rabillad Established.

Tou are now Returning to your several Countries, and I expect from you, that you will surther Recommend your selves to me, by studying to promote the Publick Peace and Quiet

And then the Lord Keeper, (by Her Majesty's Command) Prorogued the Parliament until Tuefday the Tenth of July next.
