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HE Garrisons of our Castle, and all the other fortified Places belonging to this State, have lately been exchanged; the rest of the Forces are continuing their March with great Di-igence towards Piedmont, whither the Count de Thaun, who has been lately indispos'd, is preparing to return. They write from Genua, that the Republick have refolv'd to fit out four Men of War and five Galleys, in order to fecure their Tride for the future from the Infults of the French. A Ship come thither in ten Days from Barclona reports, that General Staremberg had fent the Forces lately arrived there from Italy into Quartes of Refreshment at Mataro, and other adjacent Plass. The Departure of the Duke and Dutchess d Asjou for Corella was fix'd for the 10th Iniant; bribe Duke of Vendome's Departure for the Army madeferred for some Days. However all the Offiunin Saragossa were ordered to set out immediatehotheir respective Commands, on pain of being Cahier'd. Our Letters from Turin advise, that a Minister was arrived there from Parma to acquaint the Duke of Savoy with the Differences between his Master and the Duke of Modena; whereupon his Royal Highness, as Vicar-General of the Empirin Italy, fent and required the two Competitions of dishifs their Troops, and come to an Agreement without any farther Effusion of Blood. And that this Demand of his Royal Highness might have the greater Weight, Count Thaun ordered firem hundred Horse wedge the Count I haun ordered fiteen hundred Horse under the Command of Count Koninfeck to march into the Parmefan, which obliged those Princes to recal their respective Troops; and we are since inform'd that the Matters in Dispute between them are referred to the Arbitration of the Pope and the Great Duke of Tuscany. It is thought his Royal Highness's Troops and those of his Allies will have a general Rendezvous the 22d Instant at Orbassan, all the necessary Meafirst being taken for that Purpose. Signior Albany the Pope's Nephew is gone from hence to wait on the Ling of Poland at Carelsbad, whither the Cardinal of Saxe-Zeits is likewise to repair very specific time Overtures have been made of a Match batween the Prince-Royal of Saxony and one of the Archdutchesses. Signior Albani having con-

ferr'd with his Polish Majesty at Carelsbad, is to proceed from thence to Frankfort, where he is to be present at the Election of a new Emperor. They write from Rome, that the Pope has named a Nuncio for the Court at Barcelona, and that Signior Spinola is appointed to that Employment. A Courser arrived here the 16th Instant with Letters from his Catholick Majety, containing Instructions for the Administration of Affairs in his Heardstary Countries. On the 15th it a Empressal Dowager Amelia was taken so ill, that her Life was thought to be in danger, and publick Prayers were thereupon order d to be put up in all Churches in her Behalf; but having been blocded twice by the Advice of her Shyscians, her Majesty is new thought to be in a fair way of Recovery.

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Copenhagen, June 23. N. S. The Troops continue their March with all Diligence towards Holsein, and it is not doubted but their design is upon the Swedish Forces in Pomerania. The time of the King's Departure is not yet fix d. his Maof the King's Departure is not yet fix d, his Majesty having had an Accident, which in all likely-hood will delay it for fome Days. He lately overturn'd a Chaise which he used to drive himself, and having by that means received some hurt, he has been ever since confined to his Chamber. The Contagious Distemper continues at Elsenore, and all possible Care is taken to prevent it from extending it self to this Place. It does not yet appear by the Weekly Bills that many Persons appear by the weekly Blus that many retions dye here, and where there is the leaft Suspicion of any Infection, the Houses are immediately shut up, and all the Persons belonging to them are sent to Saltholm, pursuant to an Order of the Magistracy; which being punstually observed it raises great Murmurs and Discontents and order of the sailes great Murmurs and Discontents are ved, it raifes great Murmurs and Discontents a-mong the Inhabitants. We hear from Stockholm, that the Sickness is entirely abated in that City, and that the Senate is thereupon returned thither. They write from Jaroslow, that the Conferences between his Czarih Majetty and the King of Poland are hnish'd, and that among other things it was resolved, That though it was thought conversion the Follow to keep on the Conference of the Conferenc nient for the Poles to keep on the Defensive, the Turks having not declared War against the Republick, yet they shall oblige themselves to maintain a good Body of Troops in the Ukrain; and such Poles as are at present out of the Kingdom, and refuse to return into it by a limited time, shall be declared Rebels, and be proceeded against accordingly. Care will likewise be taken to pay the Troops of the Crown the Arrears due to 'em, and an Express is to be fent to the Ottoman Court to know for what Reason the Turks result to admit of an Ambassador from the Republick, and what has induc'd 'em to enter upon such Measures as give the Poles just Grounds to apprehend they are refolv'd to break the Truce of Carlowitz.
