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Deal, July 14.

A Spanish man of war is now riding in the Downs, homewards bound, but detained by contrary winds. Yesterday came on shoar from thence, a person of great Quality, attended by several Gentlemen, to repose himself privately in a house he has taken in this Town, till the wind shall prove more favourable for his intended voyage; he is supposed to be the Constable of *Castille* from *Ostend*, on his return for *Spain*.

Malaga, June 17. Here lately arrived two small vessels from *Argier*, one in 12 the other in 4 days, informing that the *Argier* men of war were in Port 27 sail, Two Gallies only and Three Bregantines being not then come home; and that they had Six new ships upon the Stocks. They farther say, that their Fleet was like to continue Three or Four moneths in Port, attending the return of their soldiers, who were gone into the Countrey to collect their Tribute.

Cadis, June 23. Yesterday sailed hence Sir *Edw. Spragge* and Sir *John Harman*, with about 50 sail of Merchant men, which touched there from the *Streights*, bound for *England*; the *Dragon* is ordered to attend them home to the Downs; Sir *Edw. Spragge* intending to convoy them as far as the height of *Lisbonne*.

From *Tangier*, Letters of the 15th instant tell us, that my Lord Ambassador *Howard* having received all his Goods from *Sally*, intended in few days to return by Land *incognito* for *England*, having disposed of his Train and Servants by sea.

Van Ghent, the Dutch Vice-Admiral passed lately by the Port of *Tangier*, paying all due Complements to that place, and taking in Water and fresh Provisions.

They farther say, that the Emperor of *Morocco* was in the field with a numerous Army, prosecuting his Conquests to the Southwards.

That my Lord *Middleton*, the Governor of *Tangier*, issued out of the Town with a small party of Horse and 200 Foot, Commanded by Major *Farr-born*, to discover the ground about an adjacent Hill to cut Grass for the service of the Garrison, but discovered a number of Horse and Foot of the Moors which had lain in ambush, with whom he had a skirmish, wherein several persons were killed on each side, but made good his Retreat with much Honour and Gallantry.

Rome, June 28. The Pope enjoys his health beyond all expectation, his complexion and method of living showing him to be more vigorous than those of his age use to be; Cardinal *Chigi* gains more upon his affection than any other of the Colledge, and has made a neerer friendship than formerly with the Cardinals *Barbavini* and *Rospigliosi*.

The Pope seems fully reconciled to Queen *Christina*, and as a testimony thereof, gave her a formal visit on Sunday last, who to show her respects, caused all her servants to quit her Palace to give the entire possession thereof to the Popes Guards

and Officers; the Queen received him at the bottom of the stairs, where she humbly kissed the Popes feet, attending him into her apartment, where their conversation lasted a considerable time with mutual kindness and civility. The Queen seems now inclinable to continue her abode in *Rome*, and hopes to be restored to the Pension which she received from the former Pope. The Thursday following she returned the visit to the Pope in the *Quirinal*, where she was civilly received and with as much kindness as she could expect.

On Tuesday last Cardinal *Buonvisi* went hence, intending for *Luca*; his Nephew is preparing to goe Nuncio for *Cologne*. Cardinal *Raggi* is gone by sea to *Genova*, and Cardinal *Caraccioli* departed for *Naples*; but the Marquis de *Pescara* is stopped by a Feavor, upon which distemper he has been visited with much kindness from the Pope, and personally by several of the Cardinals. Yesterday Cardinal d'Este left the Town; Cardinals *Conti* and *Barbarigo*, intend to morrow to go to divert themselves in the Countrey, but the latter to make some stay at *Florence*, where he is to perform the Ceremony of investing the Great Duke with the Collier of Great Master of the Order of the Knights of *Sr Stephen*.

To-morrow the Pope intends to be present at *Sr Peters Church* in the Vatican, where he is to receive from the Marquis d' *Astorga* the Spanish Ambassador, the Tribute, and a white Nag, with the usual Ceremonies, in acknowledgment for the kingdoms of *Naples* and *Sicily*.

Madrid, July 8. The 24th past happened a tumult in the streets of this City, near the French Ambassadors house, occasioned by a quarrel between some Spaniards and the French Lacqueys, in which, one of the latter being kill'd, the French Ambassadors Family set upon the Spaniards, in which dispute several persons were wounded, but the Officers of Justice interposing, prevented any farther mischief.

Monseignor *Borromeo*, the Popes Nuncio, being made Secretary of State to his Holiness, went hence the 2d instant, leaving behind him as his Substitute, Don *Antonio Bonaventura*, President of the Council de *la Crusada*, who remains here with the full authority of a Nuncio, till the arrival of the Nuncio of *Poland*, who is to succeed here in the same Character and Authority.

The 7th instant in the afternoon, was performed before their Majesties and the Councils in the great place of this Town, the Second solemn Bull-sport, wherein about 14 Bulls were killed; in the morning the common people were entertained with the same sport, all people that pleased, taking the liberty of setting on the Bulls; some of them paying dear for their recreations, in which two were killed by the Bulls, and several wounded.

Hambourg, July 8. From *Ratisbonne* they write, that the Duke of *Lorraine* has sent thither his Ratification of the agreement made between him and the Princes of the House of *Nassau Sarbruck*, which has been delivered to the Emperors Commissioner, and was received with great satisfaction, to all that Assembly. They farther tell us, that the Treaty for security

security of the Empire has received some obstructions, by reason of several difficulties which have been made in proportioning the sums of money, which are to be raised upon that account.

From *Vienna* we are informed, that an Express is lately arrived from *General Spork*, desiring his Imperial Majesty to give him Orders, how he shall behave himself towards several Towns of *Hungary*, who have by their Deputies declared, that they cannot consent to the admission of *German Garrisons*, it being a point which will absolutely destroy and ruine their Priviledges, and if the Emperor will still press it, they will not make any forcible opposition, but only keep their Gates shut, that their posterity may find that they gave not their consents to this breach of their Liberties.

The Emperor continues his Leavies, and has ordered five or Six Regiments to march for the reinforcement of his Army in *Hungary*.

Cassovia is upon Treaty, but desires that half the Garrisons to be placed there, may consist of *Hungarians*.

Count *Botskay*, a principal Officer amongst the *Hungarians* is not taken as was reported, but his forces being defeated, is fled for safety into *Transylvania*.

In *Poland* they much fear the invasion of the *Tartars* and *Cossacks*; and that their Nobility will not be timely enough in Arms to oppose them. The General Diet is to begin on the 7th of *September* next ensuing, about which time tis believed, the *Queen* may be solemnly Crowned, who is now great with Child.

Dantzick, July 11. Letters from *Poland* assure us, that the General Diet for the whole kingdom, is to be Assembled at *Warsaw* on the 9th of *September*, of which they have greater hopes than of any of the former.

The Elector of *Brandenbourg*'s two Ambassadors, *Ouerbeck* and *Van Ossanz* are arrived at the Court to do Homage to the King of *Poland* for the Counties of *Lauenburg* and *Butaw*, and have presented the *Queen* with a *Bason* and *Ewer* of *Gold* to the value of 3000 *Ducats*.

His Majesty has desired the Vice-Chancellor to apply himself to *General Sobiesky*, to endeavor to draw him on to a compliance, of which we daily expect the success; the said General having taken some days time to consider thereof.

The Archbishop of *Gacnac* seems still discontented, and refuses to come to the Court, but tis still believed, he will be also wrought upon to reconcile himself, finding most of the great persons of his faction complying with the Court.

The Nobles in *Great Poland* have desired that the Lord Treasurer *Murfin*, and the Castellan of *Posen*, *Zgrimultowsky*, and some others, may be summoned to appear at the General Diet, there to answer to such things as shall be charged upon them.

'Tis said, the Great Duke of *Muscovy* hath upon the arrival of *Nassokin*, resolved to Treat with *Sweden*, and to accept of the Mediation of *England* and *Sweden*.

The Deputies from *Hanenko*, one of the Generals in *Ukrania*, having prevailed for a confirmation of their priviledges, lately took their leaves of both their Majesties, and are returned well satisfy'd with their Negotiation. The fears of an Invasion threatned by the *Turks* and *Tartars*, are now vanished, and seem to have been only reports falsely spread abroad by that party, whose endeavors have mostly aimed at new disturbances; the people begin now to be satisfy'd with the present Government,

and to conceive great hopes of living quietly in the possession of their Estates under the present King.

Some of the Preparatory Diets which have been held in order to the more General Assembly, are broken off, but have received from his Majesty, power to reassemble, and particularly, that of *Scroda* in *Great Poland*.

Venice, July 12. On Munday last his Excellency my Lord *Falconbridge* Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great Britain*, made his solemn entry, conducted by *C. valier Michael Morosini* with a great Train of the Senators, from the Island *di San Spirito* to his own Palace upon the Great Channel, attended by a large train of *Gondolas* with Extraordinary Pomp, and was the next morning by the same Senators conducted to his Audience at the Colledge through multitudes of People, which thronged from every part to satisfy themselves, with a view of that Pompous Ceremony. His Excellencies train consisted of about 60. persons who were carried in five of his own *Gondelas*, all of them as rich and Noble as their Mourning could permit. His Audience ending he returned with the same State to his Palace, and since received visits from the Foreign Ambassadors and Ministers, many of which he has already returned.

Ghent, July 23. On Friday last his Excellency the Count *de Monterey* gave a publick Audience. He intends in the first place to put the Reform of the Army into Execution, and to put them into a better Method of discipline, and so to dispose of them into quarters, as may be most for the ease of the Country.

On Saturday in the Evening the Constable of *Castile* took shipping at *Ostend*, on board a man of War of 20 Guns, attended by two other ships on which his Goods are Embarked, bound for *Spain*.

On Friday last Count *Marfin* Camp-Master General, fell sick of a Feavourish distemper, but is upon recovery.

Paris, July 23. The Insurrection at *Vivarety* is not yet suppressed, the number of the Rebels is said to consist of 8000 men, amongst whom is employed as a Principal Commander one *de Roulle*, formerly a Serjant in his Majesties Guards, whose Brother was lately employed hither with two other of their Deputies to negotiate in behalf of these Revolters; but were committed Prisoners to the *Bastille*, and since sent from thence to the *Chastelet*, where they have been Examined by the *Sieur de Pamerivil*, one of the Masters of Requests.

The Marquis *de Castres* is with a considerable force about *Pont d'Esprit*, but has not yet thought fit to attempt upon them, expecting first the arrival of the rest of the forces with the Musqueteers, under the Command of the *Sieur d'Arragnan*, who are on their march; as is also Monsieur *de Besons* the Intendent of Justice in *Languedoc*, with order to execute His Majesties Commands against the said Revolters, who tis believed will not be able to oppose the forces that will be sent against them.
