### Deal, July 14.

Spanish man of war is now riding in the Downs, homewards bound, but deteined by contrary winds. Yefterday came on shoar from thence, a person of great Quality, attended by several Gentlemen, to repose himself privately in a house he has taken in this Town, till the wind shall prove more favourable for his intended voyage; he is supposed to be the Constable of Castille from Oftend, on his return for Spain.

Malaga, fune 17. Here lately arrived two fmall vefiels from Argier, one in 12 the other in 4 days, informing that the Argier men of war were in Port 27 fail, Two Gallies only and Three Bregantines being not then come home; and that they had Six new fhips upon the Stocks. They farther fay, that their Fleet was like to continue Three or Four moneths in Port, attending the return of their foldiers, who were gone into the Countrey to collect their Tribute.

Cadis, June 23. Yesterday failed hence Sir Edw. Spragge and Sir John Harman, with about 50 fail of Merchant men, which touched there from the Streights, bound for England, the Dragon is ordered to attend them home to the Dawns; Sir Edw. Spragge intending to convoy them as far as the height of Lisbonne.

From Tangier, Letters of the 15th instant tell us, that my Lord Ambassador Howard having received all his Goods from Sally, intended in few days to return by Land incognito for England, having disposed of his Train and Servants by sea.

Van Ghent, the Dutch Vice-Admiral passed late ly by the Port of *Tangier*, paying all due Complements to that place, and taking in Water and fresh Provisions.

They farther fay, that the Emperor of Morocco was in the field with a numerous Army, profecuting his Conquests to the Southwards.

That my Lord Middleton, the Governor of Tangier, iffued out of the Town with a fmall party of Horfe and 200 Foot, Commanded by Major Farr, born, to difcover the ground about an adjacent Hill to cut Grafs for the lervice of the Garrifon, but difcovered a number of Horfe and Foot of the Moors which had lain in ambufh, with whom he had a skirmifh, wherein feveral perfons were killed on each fide, but made good his Retreat with much Honour and Gallantry.

Rome, fune 28. The Pope enjoys his health beyond all expectation, his complexion and method of living flowing him to be more vigorous then those of his age use to be, Cardinal Chigi gains more upon his affection then any other of the Colledge, and has made a neerer friendship then formerly with the Cardinals Barbayini and Rospiglios.

The Pope feems fully reconciled to Queen Chriftina, and as a testimony thereof, gave her a formal visit on Sunday last, who to show her respects, caused all her servants to quit her Palace to give the entire possession thereof to the Popes Guards and Officers: the Queen received him at the bottom of the frairs, where the humbly killed the Popes fect, attending him into her apartment, where their convertation lafted a confiderable time with mutual kindnefs and civility. The Queen feems now inclinable to continue her abode in *Rome*, and hopes to be reftored to the Penfion which the received from the former Pope. The Thurfday following the returned the vifit to the Pope in the Quirinal, where the was civilly received and with as much kindnefs as the could expect.

On Tuelday laft Cardinal Buonvis went hence, intending for Luca; his Nephew is preparing to goe Nuncio for Cologne. Cardinal Raggi is gone by sea to Genous, and Cardinal Caraccioli departed for Naples stbut the Marquis de Pescara is stopped by a Feavor, upon which diffemper he has been vifited with much kindness from the Pope, and perfonally by several of the Cardinals. Yesterday Cardinal d' Este left the Town; Cardinals Conti and Burbárigo, intend to morrow to go to divert themselves in the Countrey, but the latter to make fome flay at Florence, where he is to perform the Ceremony of investing the Great Duke with the Coller of Great Master of the Order of the Knights of St Stephen.

To morrow the Pope intends to be present at Sr Peters Church in the Vatican, where he is to receive from the Marquis A' Afb rgues the Spanific Ambaffador, the Tribute, and a white Nag, with the usual Geremonies, in acknowledgment for the kingdoms of Naples and Sicily.

Madrid, July 8. The 24th fast happened a tumult in the farcets of this City, meer the French Ambassadors house, occasioned by a quarnel between: some Spaniards and the French Lacqueys, in which, one of the latter being kill'd, the French Abbassadors Family set apon the Spaniards, in which disputibleveral perfors were wounded, but the Officers of Juflice interposing, prevented any farther miss thef.

Monfegilior Borromeo, the Popes Nuncio, being made Secretary of State to his Holinefs, went hence the 2d inftant, leaving behind him as his Subflitute, Don Antonia Benavindes, Prefident of the Council de la Crufada, who remains here with the full authority of a Nuncio, tillithe arrival of the Nuncjo of Poland, who is to ducceed here in the fame Character and Authority,

The 7th instant in the afternoon, was performed before their Majeftyns and the Councils in the great place of this Town, the Second folema Bull-sport, whereinabout 14 Bulls were killed; in the morning the, common people hwere entertained with the fame (port, all people that pleafed, taking the liberty of setting on the Bulls; fome of them paying dear for their recreations; in which two were killed by the Bulls, and feveral wounded.

Hambourg, July 8. From Ratisbonne they write, that the Duke of Lorrain has fent thither his Ratification of the agreement made between him and the Princes of the House of Naffaw Sarbruck, which has been delivered to the Emperor's Commissioner, and was received with great satisfaction, to all that Assembly. They farther tell us, that the Treaty for fecurity fecurity of the Empire has received some obstructions, by reason of several difficulties which have been made in proportioning the sums of money, which are to be railed upon that account.

From Vienna we are informed, that an Express is lately arrived from General Spork, defiring his Imperial Majesty to give him Orders, how he shall behave himself towards several Towns of Hungary, who have by their Deputies declared, that they cannot confent to the admission of German Garisons, it being a point which will absolutely destroy and ruine their Priviledges, and if the Emperor will still press it, they will not make any forcible opposition, but only keep their Gates shut, that their posterity may find that they gave not their confents to this breach of their Liberties.

The Emperor continues his Leavies, and has ordered five or Six Regiments to march for the reinforcement of his Army in Hungary.

Caffovia is upon Treaty, but defires that half the Garrifons to be placed there, may confift of Hungarians.

Count Botskay, a principal Officer amongst the Hungarians is not taken as was reported, but his forces being defeated, is fled for fatety into Transylvania.

In Poland they much fear the invalion of the Tartars and Coffacks, and that their Nobility will not be timely enough in Arms to oppole them. The General Diet is to begin on the 7th of September next enfuing, about which time tis believed, the Queen may be folemnly Crowned, who is now great with Child.

Dantzick, July 11. Letters from Poland affure us, that the General Diet for the whole kingdom, is to be Affembled at Warfam on the 9th of September, of which they have greater hopes then of any of the former.

The Elector of Brandenbourgs two Ambassadors, Overbeck and Van Offams are arrived at the Court to do Homage to the King of Poland for the Counties of Lawenburg and Busam, and have prefented the Queen with a Bason and Ewer of Gold to the value of 3000 Ducats.

value of 3000 Ducats. His Majefty has defired the Vice-Chancellor to apply himfelf to General Sobiesky, to endeavor to draw him on to a compliance, of which we daily expect the fuccess; the faid General having taken fome days time to consider thereof.

. The Archbishop of Guefae seems still discontented, and refuses to come to the Court, but tis still believed, he will be also wrought upon to reconcile himself, finding most of the great perfons of his faction complying with the Court.

The Noble's in Great Poland have defired that the Lord Treasurer Murftin, and the Castellan of Posen, Zgrimultowsky, and some others, may be summoned to appear at the General Diet, there to answer to such things as shall be charged upon them.

Tis faid, the Great Duke of Muscowy hath upon the arrival of Nassekin, refolved to Treat with Sweden, and to accept of the Mediation of England and Sweden.

The Deputies from Hunenko, one of the Generals in *Whrania*, having prevailed for a confirmation of their priviledges, lately took their leaves of both their Majeflies, and are returned well fatisfy'd with their Negotiation. The fears of an Invalion threatned by the Turks and Tartars, are now vanisht, and seem to have been only reports fally spread abroad by that party, whole ci deavors have mostly aimed at new disturbances; he people begin now to be fatisfy'd with the prefent Government,

and to conceive great hopes of living quietly in the possession of their Estates under the present King.

Some of the Preparatory Diets which have beet held in order to the more General Affembly, are broken off, but have received from his Majefty, power to reaffemble, and particularly, that of Stroda in Great Poland.

Venice, July 12. On Munday last his Excellency my Lord Falconbridge Ambasiador Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain, made his solemn entry, conducted by C valier Michael Morofini with a great Train of the Senators, from the Island di San Spirito to his own Palace upon the Great Channel, attended by a large train of Gondolas with Extraordinrry Pomp, and was the next morning by the fame Senators conducted to his Audience at the Colledge through multitudes of People, which thronged from every part to fatisfy themfelves, with a view of that Pompous Ceremony. His Excellencies train confisted of about 60. persons who were carried in five of his own Gondelas, all of them as rich and Noble as their Mourning could permit. His Audience ending he returned with the famé State to his Palace, and fince received vifits from the Forreign Ambaffadors and Ministers, many of which he has already returned.

Ghent, July 23. On Friday last his Excellency the Count de Monterey gave a publich Audience. He intends in the first place to put the Reform of the Army into Execution, and to put them into a better Method of difcipline, and io to dispose of them into quarters, as may be most for the ease of the Country.

On Saterday in the Evening the Constable of Castile took shipping at Ostend, on board a man of War of 20 Guns, attended by two other ships on which his Goods are Embarked, bound for Spain,

On Friday last Count Marsin Camp-Master General, fell fick of a Feavourish distemper, but is upon recovery.

Paris,  $\neq$ uly 23 The Infurrection at Vivaretz is not yet fupprefied, the number of the Rebels is faid to confift of 8000 men, amongft whom is employed as a Principal Commander one de Roulle, formerly a Serjant in his Majefties Guards, whofe Brother was lately employed hither with two other of their Deputies to negotiate in behalf of thefe Revolters; but were committed Prifoners to the Baffille, and fince fent from thence to the Chaftelet, where they have been Examined by the Sieur de Pomerevil, one of the Mafters of Requefts.

The Marquis de Caftres is with a confiderable force about Pont d' Esprit, but has not yet thought fit to attempt upon them, expecting first the arrival of the rest of the forces with the Musqueteers, under the Command of the Sieur d'Artagnan, who are on their march; as is also Monsieur de Besons the Intendent of Justice in Languedoc, with order to execute His Majestices Commands against the faid Revolters, who tis believed will not be able to oppose the forces that will be fent against them.
