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Venice, July 10. N. S.

THE Corps of the late Signior Foscarini, Ambassador-Extraordinary from this State to the Hague, having been brought hither by Land, was interred on Monday last. Baron Urbich, Plenipotentiary and Councellor of State to his Czariſh Majesty, has had his Audience of Leave, and is ſet out from hence, appearing well ſatisfied with the Succesſ of his Negotiations, and the Preſent made him by the Senate at his Departure. A large Convoy bound to the Levant is ſailed with a favourable Wind, as is likewise another for Dalmatia. They write from Rome of the 4th Instant, that the Pope return'd thither the Sunday before from Castle Gondolio, and has ordered Signior Spirito to hasten his Departure for Barcelona. On Sunday the 28th of the last Month the Countess of Beronico arrived at Naples, having been met by the Viceroy, and a numerous appearance of the Nobility at some distance from the City, into which she was conducted with much Pomp, and receiv'd with a Discharge of the Artillery, and the Acclamations of the People.

Hanover, July 21. N. S. Mr. Scot, Esvoyn-Extraordinary from the Queen of Great Britain to his Polish Majesty, set out from hence on Sunday last for Dresden. The same Day the Prince of Kourakin, Minister and Plenipotentiary from the Czar of Muscovy to her Britannick Majesty, arrived here from England, and set out yesterday for Wolfenbuttel, from whence he is to proceed to Dresden, before he returns to the Czar his Master. His Czariſh Majesty has ratified the Contract of Marriage between his Son the Hereditary Prince of Muscovy and the Princess of Wolfenbuttel, whose Dowry is settled at seventy thousand Crowns a Year. His Majesty has desired, that the Solemnization of the Nuptials may be deferred to the end of the Campaign, in which case he proposeth to assist in Person at the Ceremony, which is to be performed at Wolfenbuttel. On the 10th Instant the Electoral Princess, who has of late been much indispos'd, was deliver'd of a Daughter to the great Joy of this Court. Upon Advice, that the King of Poland has refus'd to proceed to the Election of a new Emperor 'till the 20th of the next Month, the Baron de Goertz has suspended his Journey to Frankfort. Our Letters from Poland of the 3d Instant advise, that the Army in Lithuania was marching to join the Saxons and Muscovites, soon after which it is thought they will endeavour to penetrate into the Swedish Pomerania. It is confirm'd on all Hands, that the Principality of Wallachia has thrown it self into the Protection of his Czariſh Majesty.

Cologne, July 21. N. S. Signior Albani, the Pope's Nephew, is arrived here from Frankfort, and has been Complimented, and receiv'd the usual Presents both in behalf of the Magistrates and Chapter. It is said he is to set out forthwith for Dusseldorp, in order to confer with the Elector Palatin, and endeavour among other Matters to induce his Electoral Highness to give his Consent that Commachio be restored to the See of Rome: After which he will return to Frankfort, in order to be present at the approaching Election of an Emperor. The first Detachment from Flanders under the Command of Count Vehlen, has pass'd the

Maine at Cotsheim, where the second Detachment conducted by Count Feltz is likewise speedily expected, in order to pass the said River, and pursue their March to the Upper Rhine.

Hague, July 24. N. S. On the 20th Instant the King of Prussia caus'd a Memorial to be delivered to the States, wherein he desires immediately to be put in Possession of the House of Dieren, and that the Conferences for settling his other Pretensions may be regularly continued; since this Monsieur Hymen, Minister of that Prince, has been in Conference with the Deputies of the States. Yesterday a Courier from his Excellency Sir Robert Sutton, the Queen of Great Britain's Ambassador at Constantinople, pass'd thro' this Place, in order to embark for England. He brings Advice, that since the Surrender of Mongatz every thing continues quiet in Hungary. The Grand Vizier march'd from Adrianople the 14th of May, with the Forces that have been encamped near that Place; and the rest of the Troops are in Motion on every side, in order to follow him towards Bender, the Place appointed for the general Rendezvous of the Army, which was to be assembled by the 12th or 15th Instant. Monsieur Swabe, Minister from the Duke of Sax-Meiningen, has been in Conference with the Deputies of the States, upon the Subject of some Troops which his Master offers to put into the Service of this State. According to our Letters from Brussels, the late Elector of Bavaria is still at Luxemburg, it being not yet known whether he is to proceed from thence to Command on the Rhine, or return to Namur. They write from Dresden, that the King of Poland return'd thither the 17th from Torgaw, and that the Hereditary Prince of Saxony is to go directly from Leicktenburg to Slaven, and from thence to Frankfort. On the 22d the Body of the late Prince of Nassau was taken up by a Skipper near the Place where the Prince was lost. Our Letters from Vienna advise, that Mr. Whitworth, the Queen of Great Britain's Ambassador Extraordinary, and Plenipotentiary to the Czar of Muscovy, arriv'd there from Dresden the 5th Instant, and that on the 8th his Excellency deliver'd her Majesty's Credentials to the Empress-Regent. The King of Denmark set out from Copenhagen on the 18th of this Month, and arrived on the 20th at his Army, which was to March on the 24th. Count Sinzendorf and Baron Heems have been for two or three Days at Amsterdamb. It is reported with great Confidence here, that the Empress Regent has prevail'd with the Elector Palatin to assist in Person at the ensuing Election of an Emperor at Frankfort, in order to promote and secure his Catholick Majesty's Interest on that Occasion.

Brussels, July 25. N. S. Letters of the 23d from the Duke of Marlborough's Quarters at Cote advise, that the Army encamped on the 21st with the Right at Ligny, and the Left at Marle, having Aire in the Rear. These Letters add, that upon Advice, that a Body of the Enemy's Forces had that Morning taken Post before Arleux, in order to attack the Place, forty Squadrons and all the Grenadiers of the Army were immediately detached to endeavour to prevent their Design; but our Advices of yesterday from Douay bring an Account, that they made themselves Masters of Arleux the Day before at three in the Afternoon, after a very vigorous and long Resistance from the Garrison.
