COUNT Kinsky, Vice-Chancellor of Bohemia, being appointed to assist as second Ambassador from that Electorate at the ensuing Election of an Emperor at Francfort, set out from hence on the 9th for that Place by the Way of Prague, where if he finds the King of Poland, he has Orders to solicit his Majesty to shorten the term of the Election to the 20th Instant, or at least to send his Ministers to the Place of Congress as soon as possible. On the 12th Monsieur Cosbroeck, the third Ambassador from the Kingdom of Bohemia, departed likewise for Francfort, at which Place the respective Ministers begin to assemble, tho' those who are to be the Heads of the several Embassies will not appear till the time appointed. The Prince of Moldavia has published a Manifesto, wherein having set forth the many and continued Hardships both he and his Predecessors, as well as all the Inhabitants of Moldavia, have received from the Ottoman Porte, he exhorts his Subjects to arm themselves in Defence of their Liberties, and join their Forces to those of the Czar of Muscovy, who is marching with a powerful Army to their Relief. As a further Encouragement he assures 'em, that his Czarish Majesty has retitled to him some sufficient for the raising and maintaining ten thousand Men, and has promis'd to restore to 'em all the Fortresses the Turks have forc'd from 'em, that shall be retaken in the Prosecution of the War. At the same time he acquaints 'em, that such as are obedient to the present Summons shall meet with all Favour and Protection; whereas on the contrary all those that do not comply shall be Excommunicated, and treated as Traitors to their Country. They write from Cassovia, that some Deputies are arriv'd there from the Count de Forgatz, in order to Negotiate his Accommodation with the House of Austria.

Francfort, July 23. N. S. The Prince of Savoy arriv'd here at ten this Morning, under a Discharge of all the Cannon on the Ramparts. The Domesticks of the several Ambassadors and Ministers that are to assist at the approaching Election, arrive daily, and are preparing the Apartments appointed for their respective Masters. We are assur'd, the Hereditary Prince of Saxony promis'd to be here incognito; and that the Elector of Mayence is expected by the beginning of the next Month. The French destroy all the Forage in the Neighbourhood of Landau, and give out, that they shall be able to act Offensively this Campaign on the Upper Rhine; but it is computed, that when the Detachments from Flanders have join'd the German Army, it will be equal in number to that of the Enemy. The King of Denmark arriv'd at Rendsbourg the 20th Instant, and has given Orders for his Forces to hold themselves in a readiness to March upon the first Notice. Monsieur Scheinitz having been to regulate every thing with the Czar of Muscovy, relating to the intended Match between the Hereditary Prince his Son, and the Princess of Wolfenbittel, is returned to Wolfenbittel, and receiv'd at his Departure from the Czar a Present of one thousand Ducats, and his Majesty's Picture set with Diamonds.

Brussels, July 27. N. S. On the 25th Instant a Regiment of Foot came hither from Oudenard, being appointed as a further Reinforcement for the Garrison of this Place. Our Letters from the Frontiers advise, that the Enemy have three Brigades of Foot, with two Regiments of Dragoons, and one of Horse, at Quefnoy; and so far as they are loading Ammunition and Bombs at that Place, and at Cambray, we hear a sufficient Body of Forces will be detach'd from the Army, in order to observe 'em. The French have endeavour'd to oblige the Peasants in Artois to Plough their Ground, and sow it against the next Year, offering to supply 'em with the requisite quantities of Seed; but the Peasants have declared in plain terms, that it will be impossible for them to comply with that Demand, unless they are likewise furnish'd with Hay and Oats for their Cattle, to which they have not yet thought fit to condescend. According to our Letters from Paris, the French promise themselves no great Advantages from their Army this Campaign in Catalonia. The Duke of Vendome proposeth little more than to possess himself of some Towns, and seize on such Posts as command the Passage to the Segra, for the Security of which River he seems chiefly concern'd. However, they say his Catholick Majesty's Affairs will necessarily require his Presence in Germany; and that when the Campaign is ended in Savoy, they shall be able to send a strong Reinforcement into Spain time enough to act in the later Season in that Country, and to make use of those Advantages his Majesty's Absence will give them in Catalonia. In the mean time we are assur'd, that their Army is in great want of many Necessaries, and that the Miquelets continue to give them much Disturbance, and to cut off several of their Parties. General Staremberg having received Intelligence, that they had a Design upon Ygualade; order'd a strong Body of Troops to file off that way to prevent the Enemy, and secure themselves of that Post.

Hague, July 28. N. S. On Saturday last the States of Holland were extraordinarily assembled; and yesterday his Excellency the Earl of Orrery was present at a Congress of the Allies. Baron Dalwig and Monsieur Rieck, the Hessian Ministers, have by Order from the Landgrave their Master, presented a Memorial to the States-General, in behalf of the Princess-Dowager of Nassau: Since which Monsieur Ngen and Monsieur Printz have had a Conference with the States on the part of the King of Prussia; and it is thought the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel will at length be persuaded to repair hither, in order by his Presence to facilitate an Accommodation. The Body of the late Prince having been taken up on the 22d by a Skipper, was removed to Dort, where it was Embalm'd, since which it has been conducted to Leuwarden, there to be interr'd with his Ancestors. The Elector of Meints is expected at Francfort the beginning of the next Month, in order to proceed to the Election of an Emperor.

Tarmouth, July 23. Yesterday pass'd by on the back of our Sands, the homeward-bound Hartburgh Fleet with their Convoys. This Day sail'd to the Northward a Fleet of light Colliers and Goasters, under Convoy of several of her Majesty's Ships. The Russia Fleet, with the Convoys, continue here.
