Windsor, July 22.

THIS Evening the Marquis Sauli, Envoy-Extraordinary from the Republick of Genoa, had a private Audience of Leave of Her Majesty; to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Dartmouth, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, and Conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.

Lisbon, July 9. N. S. Our Letters from the Frontiers advise, that both Armies are marching into Quarters of Refreshment; and that his Excellency the Earl of Portmore was preparing to return to his Place. A Dutch Privateer has brought in either a Moorish Man of War of thirty six Guns, said to be the Admiral of Sally, which, after a very sharp Engagement, was obliged to surrender; the Privateer retook on this occasion the Master and all the Men belonging to a small British Ship, taken by the Moor some Days before in her Passage hither from Ireland.

Hamburg, July 24. N. S. The Imperial Resident here has required the Magistrates of this Place, Lubeck and Breme, to supply the Forces appointed for the Preservation of the Neutrality in the North, with a Train of Artillery to be employ'd in that Service. Hitherto no Reply has been made to this Demand, by reason the Deputies from Lubeck and Breme, who are appointed to examine into that Affair, are not yet arrived. Upon Advice, that a Contagious Distemper rages in Zealand, our Magistrates have ordered that no Persons coming from those Parts shall be admitted into the City. Our Letters of the 22d Instant from Roslock advise, that several Saxon Regiments have posted themselves near Landsberg on the Polish Frontiers, where they have thrown up very strong Intrenchments for their better Security. These Letters add, that the Crown General was marching with the Troops under his Command towards Pomerania, in order to join those Forces. The Swedes are equipping their Fleet with extraordinary Diligence, and give out, that their Men of War and Transports will be ready to sail upon the first Notice they shall receive that his Swedish Majesty has begun his March. A Muscovite Ship of forty Guns, lately built at Amsterdam, had the Misfortune to fall in with two Swedes, who took her after a very obstinate Defence near Memel, and carried her into Calmar, where they are now refitting her. The Swedes have likewise taken a Fleet of Merchant-men bound from Riga to Lubeck, on board of which several Persons in this City had considerable Effects. Our Advices from Pomerania make mention of a very great Victory obtain'd by the Turks over the Muscovites. Other Letters take no notice of any Action that had been between 'em, however they say, the two Armies were so near, that it would be difficult for 'em to separate without coming to an Engagement. To Morrow the Danes are to receive in this City,

from the Elector of Hannover's Commissaries, the Sum of three hundred thousand Crowns, lent by his Electoral Highness to the King of Denmark, upon the Security of three Bailiwicks in the County of Oldenburg.

Hanover, July 24. N. S. Monsieur Schleinitz, heretofore Councillor to the Duke of Wolfenbittel, having been very instrumental in regulating every thing relating to the Match between the Hereditary Prince of Muscovy, and the Princess of Wolfenbittel, is received into the Service of his Czarish Majesty, who has appointed him his Envoy-Extraordinary to this Court, and he has accordingly had his first Audience of his Electoral Highness in the accustomed manner. The King of Poland has chosen the Waywod of Koss to be Governor to the Prince his Son, whose Court he has settled, and appointed a very considerable Revenue for the Maintenance of it. The Prince is set out for Francfort, from whence it is said he will proceed to Italy after the Election of an Emperor. Monsieur Goertz, who is to be his Electoral Highness's Plenipotentiary at that Solemnity, is gone to his own Seat in the Country, but will repair from thence to Francfort as soon as he hears the time is fixed for the Election.

Dublin, July 21. Yesterday a Fleet of fifty Sail of Colliers arrived here from Whitehaven.

From on Board the Adventure in Ventry in Dingle Bay, July 14. We were order'd from Galway to Boffin Island, from whence we were to Convoy the Oley Frigate from China into Kinfale, but were forced yesterday by contrary and strong Gales of Wind into this Place; however we shall sail again as soon as possible.

Falmouth, July 23. Yesterday came in hither from Cruising the White Phenix of Flushing, Jacob Stephens Commander, and brought in as Prize the Society of Rochel, laden with Salt for Placentia. This Ship was lately called the Robert and Nathaniel of London, and in March last was freighted with Fish in this Port for Leghorn, but was taken by the French in her Passage thither.

Plymouth, July 24. This Day came in the Possillion with Oborn from Flushing for Lisbon, and the Merlin Packet-Boat from Spithead for the West-Indies.

Tarmouth, July 25. Yesterday failed hence the outward-bound Russia Fleet with their Convoys. Several laden Colliers are passed through our Road to the Southward. This Day failed hence her Majesty's Ships the Folkstone and Advice's-Prize, with a Fleet of Merchant-ships under their Convoy for Holland.

Deale, July 26. Here are Her Majesty's Ships the Canterbury, Torbay, Essex, Le Moot, Medway, and Monk; also the King of Spain bound for New-England, the Russel Galley and Bonetta Sloop for Lisbon; with several Coasters.
