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N Wednesday last the Gallies of this Republick fent in hither a French Tartane, laden with Oil and Tobacco from Candia, and bound to Ancona, On Saturday Signior Emo was appointed Ambassador Extraordinary to the French Court; but it is thought he will endeavour to de-Nuncio to the King of Spain, is embark'd at Civita Vecchia. The Abbot del Mare is arrived at Rome, whither he is fent by his Royal Highness the Duke for Savoy, to endeavour to put an end to the Differences, that have been to long depending between his Royal Highness and the Pope. He has had feveral Conferences with the Bope's Ministers on that Affair time his Arrival, and it is hoped he will fucceed in his Negotiation. They write from Naples, that four British, and two Dutch Men of Market arrived there on the 6th Instant. From his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy's

Camp at Conflans, July 18. N. S. Yesterday a Detachment of four thousand Foot, and three hundred Horfe, march'd from our Army, under the command of Lieutenant General Zumjungen, who is to endeavour to possess himself of several Passes all'd the Bauges, between this Place, Chambery and Montmelian, which will facilitate our Design of driving the Enemy from their Camp near the last of these Places, where they are strongly entrench'd, and seem prepar'd to give us a warm Recepand feein prepar'd to give us a warm Recep-tion. This Detachment is follow'd by another of three thousand Foot and one hundred Horse, under the Command of Leiutenant-General Arnheim; who is directed to support the former in case of need, and the whole Army will march, in order to sustain both, if there should be ocrafion. Besides these Detachments, some others have been sent to Faverge and Annecy, both which Places the Enemy abandon deat the approach of our Troops, and retir'd with great Precipitation to Seisel, on the other side the Rhone; so that we have now a free Communication with Geneva, and are Masters of a Country, that will largely contribute to the Subsistence of our Army. Yesterday Mr. Chetwynd, the Queen of Great British's Envoy Extraordinary to the Duke of Savoy, arriv'd here, together with the Spanish and Dutch Envoys, under a Convoy of Horse, commanded by General

Hannover, July 28. N. S. The Count de Harrain arriv'd here the 25th Instant from the Hague, and fet out this Morning for Dresden: From whence they write, that the Duke of Sax-Weimar had surprized the Town of Armstadt, in which the Prince

The Duke has put a Garrison into it, alledging for his Justification, that the Town, and its Dependencies are a Fief belonging to the House of Sax-Weimars: Our Letters from Warsaw of the 18th Instant advice, that the Czar of Muscovy having pass'd the Neister with his Horse, visited the Fortress of Saroka, which he order'd to be strengthned with some New Fortifications; and proceeded from thence to Jaffi, where a Magazine was form'd by his Majesty's Directions, for the Use of the Grand Army, which was marching under the Command of General Czeremetow towards the Danube, in order to break down the Bridges the Turks had laid over that River, and difloge a Body of Janizaries that had posted themselves on this side of it. These Letters add, that the Muscovite Troops, which march'd some time before towards Bender, were only intended to make a Diversion, and give the main. Army time to execute the Designs before mention'd. Notwithstanding this Account from Foland, the Swedes continue to affirm, that the Mufrovites receiv de a total Defeat on the 10th of the last Month near Bender, losing upwards of fifty thousand Men, and one hundred fixty fix pieces of Cannon.

Hague, August 4. N. S. On Wednesday last the

Minister of Sweden was in Conference with the Deputies of the States, who went afterwards to confer with the Ambaffador of Muscovy. They write from Hamburg, that an Officer belonging to the King of Denmark past through that Place on the 25th of the last Month in his way to Hannover, whither he is fent to obtain a Pallage for the Danish Troops through the Country of Sax-Law-enburg, which his Electoral Highness is disposed to grant, according to the Accounts we have received from that Court. The Count de Welthern has likewise sollicited the King of Prussia to suffer the Saxon Troops to march through his Country, but it is not yet known what Aniwer his Majesty has return'd to that Request. These Letters add, that a Quarter-Master in his Czariih Majesty's Service, was arriv'd near Custrin, where he has mark'd out a Camp for the Muscovite Forces, that are to follow in a few days. The Swedes have sent a Trumpet into Berlin, requiring that Court to provide for the Defence of the Post of Schwet on the Oder, intimating, that otherwise they shall be oblig'd to do it themselves. Our Letters from Genoa of the 24th past advise, That the Duke of Savoy continu'd with the Body of his Army at Constans; but that the feveral Detatchments he had made, had oblig'd the French to evacuate Annecy and Chambery, and retire on the other fide the Rhone. These Letters add, That the Duke of Berwick had also quitted his strong Camp near Montmelian, and was now encamp'd under the Cannon of Barreaux.
