Genoa, July 19. N. S.

OUR Advices, by a Vessel which came hither in nine Days from Barcelona, import, that a Squadron of English and Dutch Ships arriv'd there the 5th Instant from Lisbon, with new Supplies of Men and Money. The Campaign is not yet open'd in Catalonia, and it is thought the excessive Heats will prevent both Armies from undertaking any Enterprize of Consequence this Season. The Miquelets continue their Incurfions with much Success, and give great Disturbance to the Forces of the Duke of Anjou; infomuch that the Enemy have been oblig'd to post Troops at Tervel, and other Places in order to restrain them. They write from Rome, that Seignior Cufani, Nuncio in ordinary to the Court of France, is recall'd from that Employment, the French King having express'd a dislike to his Person, upon a Pretence, that being his Catholick Majesty's Subject, he is devoted to his Interests. Seignior Aldobrandino, Auditor of the Rota for the Province of Bologna is appointed to succeed him, and it is said Signior Cufani will be prefer'd to the Bishoprick of Pavia.

Lisbon, July 24. N. S. The excessive Heats having oblig'd our Generals to send the Forces into Quarters of Refreshment, the Earl of Portmore is come hither, in order to concert the necessary Measures for opening the Campaign as soon as the Season will permit the Army to return into the Field. The Brasil Fleet is ready to put to Sea, and will sail with the first Wind that shall offer after the 28th instant. The Queen of Portugal being with Child, the Physicians have advis'd her Majesty to bleed by way of Prevention.

Hamburg, July 28. N. S. The Swedes being apprehensive, that the King of Denmark's intentions are to penetrate into the Dutchy of Brema, have reinforc'd all the Garrisons in that Country, and post'd some regular Troops, and great Numbers of the Militia on the Banks of the Eibe for their better Security. They have likewise command'd all the Peasants, that are capable of bearing Arms, to arm themselves in order to oppose the Danes, and for their better Encouragement, have promis'd to such as shall behave themselves well on this Occasion, an Exemption from all Taxes for four Years. The King of Denmark continues at present at Rendsbourg, but it is said he will remove to the Castle of Reynbek, where the Apartments have been fitted up for his Majesty's Accomodation. The Danes are daily baking great Stores of Bread at Altena; and General Schuitz has been sent hither to demand a certain Quantity of Beer and Hay, for the Service of the Army, which we hear has been readily granted by our Magistrates. The Duke Administrator of Holstein Gottorp, has been twice to wait on the King at Rendsbourg, where he was receiv'd with particular marks of Respect by his Majesty. The Queen Dowager of Denmark is expected speedily at Gluckstat, from whence her Majesty proposeth to proceed through the County of

Oldenbourg, to the Court of her Brother the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel.

Francfort, July 20. N. S. On the 27th instant Monsieur Consbroech, Aulic-Counsellor, and secret Referendary of the Empire, being appointed one of the Ambassadors from the Kingdom of Bohemia at the ensuing Election, arriv'd here from Vienna. His Collegues are Count Windisgratz, and Count Kinisky the younger, Vice-Chancellor of Bohemia, who are likewise expected very speedily. They write from Coblentz, That the Elector of Treve's Baggage was to set out from thence for this place on the 3d of the next Month, and that his Electoral Highness propos'd to follow in Person on the 9th. Yesterday the Prince of Savoy went from hence, in order to put himself at the Head of the Army of the Empire, which is at present encamp'd at Mulhbourgh, and has been join'd by the Forces detach'd from Flanders under the command of the Count de Vehlen. On the 24th instant Twelve Squadrons of the Enemies Forces were attack'd in the Neighbourhood of Landau, by a Party from that Garrison, who oblig'd them to retire with great Loss. They write from Vienna, That two Regiments of Horse have been order'd to march out of Hungary, and join the Troops, appointed to preserve the Neutrality of the Empire, that are assembling in Silesia. Our Letters from Francfort on the Oder, advise, That the Marquis de Langallerie, who some time since quitted the French Service, and entred into that of the King of Poland, made a publick Abjuration of the Romish Religion on the 10th Instant, in the Presence of a numerous Assembly in that City.

Hague, August 4. N. S. The States of Holland having resolv'd in their last Assembly, to prohibit all Commerce with France, are adjourn'd till Friday next, at which time they are to regulate several Matters, relating to the said Prohibition, and prepare their Resolution to be presented to the States General for their Approbation. The Conditions of the late Agreement with the King of Prussia are not yet generally known, but it is said they are such as have given his Majesty entire Satisfaction, and are to subsist till the end of six Months after the Princess Dowager of Nassau shall be deliver'd; before the expiration of which Term, it is expected that the Matters in dispute will be brought to a final Accomodation. Our Letters from Paris advise, that the Duke of Noailles was speedily expected at Corella, from whence they write, that the Dutcheis of Anjou was recover'd of her late Indisposition. The Duke of Vendome is set out from Lerida for the Army, which seems not in a Condition to undertake any thing of Moment this Campaign. These Letters add, that eight Squadrons of the French Troops have been detach'd from Roussillon, and are marching into Dauphine. The French are fitting out some Men of War, and several Frigats at Rochfort and Dunkirk, but it is thought those Ships will not be in a Condition to put to Sea in some time for want of Men. The Train of heavy Artillery, belonging to the Danish Forces, arriv'd near Kiel, in the Dutchy of Holstein

Holstein, on the 27th of the last Month, and it is said the Army was to pass in Review before the King of Denmark on the 30th. The Swedes are preparing a Squadron of Men of War at Carelleroon, in order to cover the Transports design'd for Pomerania. In the mean time the Danish Forces in Norway begin to be in Motion, and put the Swedes under some Uneasiness. They write from Dresden, that Monsieur Seiffenditze being appointed to attend on the Ambassy from thence, as their Marschal at the approaching Election of an Emperor, set out on Tuesday the 23th past for Frankfort, where he is to provide for the Reception of the Baron de Frize, and Monsieur Hage, the two Plenipotentiaries, who departed likewise from Dresden on the Thursday following.
