Pembrooke, April 20.

E have just now received intelligence of a French Prize of about thirty Tuns, brought into this Harbor lagen with Salt, and taken by the Milford Fregas.

Isle of Wight, April 23. The Paradox lately brought into Comes-Road, two Prizes, the one of a hundred and ferty Tuns, called the Abraham, the other alled the Hope, of about ninety Tun; both pretend thenfelves Hamburgers, and came from Lisbon, laden with Sagus, Tobacco, Brafile-wood, Salt, Pickled Lemmons. Cienamon, and Sweet-meats in Cask: we have much cause whipect them to belong to Amsterdam.

On Thursday night Sir feremy smith came to the Spir-best, but weighed again by five the next morning, and stood for the Downs; leaving three of his Prizes at the Spit-head, which are intended hither to the Prize Office.

Faimouth, April 26. Here is brought into this Harbor by the Garland Fregat, a ship of two hundred and fifty Tun, eighteen Guns, and fifty Men, which came directly from the Canary Illands, and has brought with her four hundred pipes of rich Wines, they pretend to belong to a Spanish Merchant, and to be bound for Oftend. We are told that two or three Pickaroens, that have for some time plyed about St. Ives, and have done some hurt about those parts, are taken by one

of his Majesties Fregats.

Rome, /pril 17. The Cardinal Litta arriving here from Milan, entred on Sunday last this City, accompanied with fixty five Coaches, with fix horses a piece, which the Cardinalls, Ambassadors, and other great persons of the Court sentout to meet him: and on Thursday following had the solemnity of a formal Entry, and Cavalcade, by the Porto del Popolo, to his Helinesses Palace, who gave him the Cardinals Cap in the Confitbory, with all the utual Ceremonies and Formalities. The guns from the Castle, that morning Proclaming his future honors, which that night were concluded with Bonefires, Cardinal Chift having likewife that day treated him, and the rest of the Cardinals of that promotion, with the Popes Kindred at a very magnificent dinner; ofter which the new Cardinal Litta returned his thanks to the Pope, giving also a visit to Cardinal Barbarini, as Dean of the Sacred Collecge in the absence of Cardinal de Medicis, who for the most part resides at Florence, viliting likewite Queen Christina of Sweden, intending the like civility to all the other Cardinalls, and to the leveral Ambassadors. The Cardinals Sforzs, Lantgrave, and The Cardinals Sforza, Lantgrave, and Riggi; with a great number of Pie ates and Nibles of the Spanish fection, are gone to Civita Vecchia, to salute the Cardinal d' Arragon in his passies, with whom they are to confer about the affaires of this Court.

The Sieur Cara Ja, a Neapolitan Prelate, eye l about two daies since, by whose death, the charge of Vice-gerent, or substitute to the Popes Grand Vicar is become vacant.

Yesterday in the Evening, the Auditor of the Seur de Boorlemons the French Agent, received three stabs with aknife, which wounds its thought, he cannot out-live, great fearch hath been made after the author of the fact, but hitherto in vain. We have little news as yet f.om Candia: the Knights of Malea, in complyance with the Popes inclination, are resolved to assist that Republick against the Turks, with seven flow Galleys, with whom are to be joyned three more out of his Holineffes squairon.

Letters from Daventer, April 28, tell us, that they are in those parts not clinic busic and employed, in ungarritoning the feveral Towns and Foits; to which purpole, Deputies

and Commissioners have been sent from Over Tsel for Twente and Veuebrugge, to fee in what posture affairs fland in these parts: The Governors of Amelo and Olmarsen Hill exacting vigorously their contribution, declaring not to dis-lodge without some satisfaction given. We are very zealous after lo good beginnings to bring all our differences to a close; the States having fent (25 we are told) yesternight, an Express to Monsieur de Beuningen a: Paris, which we think and hope here, is to try, if he can finde out any expedient to bring an accommodation with England.

Legorn, April 19. Our ships now lie securely within the Mole, where they are protected by the Great Duke: The Genouescare to far from furnishing the French with Seamen, that the State has fet forth an order to prevent them, commanding, that none of their Subjects, under very heavy penalties, fliall enter into the service of any foreign Prince.

A Bark bound for Civita Vecchia, informs us, that the French Fleet were put out to Sea, where they ride onely to keep their Seamen together, but cannot be ready for service before the next moneth.

They write from Milan, that the Governor there, has given Orders for the reparation and beautifying of the Dukes Palace, against the arrival of her Imperial Majesty: That he has likewite commanded a Pageant or Triumphal Arch to be erected by the City at Porta Ticense, very large, with rooms both within and without it; repairing also the Great Bridge of St. Lorenzo, and the raising two other Timphal Arches, the one at Carubbio, the other, a very stately one at the entry into the Piazza del Duomo. But by Letters lately received from Spain, they expect not the Empress till the end of vay, whose pullage is attended by all the Maritime force of that Kingdom.

The Marquels Caffel Rodrigo, Governor of the Catholick, Low Countreys, has fent to the Governor of Milan, to take order for the speedy marching of a third part of the Infantry, raised at Naples, to Milan; which with the forces in the Dutchy, are to march to the confines of Germany, where they are to meet with further Orders to pass them into Flan-

The Great Duke, and Dutchels, and Prince, with the Princels of Tustrany, are yesterday parted from Pisa, in order to their seturn to Florence.

Vienna, April 10. Monsieur de Libioveron, who was here formerly as Resident from Denmark, is now again the ployed here in the same Character, whole greatest business is (as 'tis thought) to have an eye upon the Swedish Negotia-

We have information from Comorrha of the Death of the Bulla Visier of Buda, which is no pleasing news to this Court, he having been a person very much inclined to Peace, and willing, upon all occasions, to compose all arising and growing quarrels; facilitating the many and intricate disputes upon the confines, and preferving all things as far as he was able

We are likewise told that the Palatine of Hungary understanding that his Imperial Majesty had without his privity, granted out a partion to Count Balasse, who in the times of his running to Arms, had wasted some of the Territories and Lanus belonging to the Palatinate, refolved to have his revenge, and getting together some of the Imperial forces, he fell upon a Castle belonging to the Count, which he took, cutting in pieces many foldiers, carrying away belides the spoyl of the places, a great number of Prifoners, and many Officets.

Letters from Transylvania advise us, that Abassi has di-

verted a very great milchief from felling upon the Roman

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Catholicks in that Country. The Turks having gotten together a very confiderable body, presending to fend them into Dalmatia, but deligning them to fall into Uckraine: but by the Mediation of Absff, that therm was blown over.

By Letters from Warfaw we are informed, that two Deputies have been fent from the confederate Army, with Plenipotentiary power from Lubomirski and his friends, to declare to them his readiness to lay his life at the feet of his Prince, to whom he would submit all his pretentions what-soever; That he desired nothing more then an accommodation with the Royal house, desiring the whole business might be remitted to the Reserendary of that Crownsto whom he would open all his soul, and by him receive his Majesties grace and clemency; but what this will produce, a little time must show.

Hague, May 4. In ten days or less, the States of Holland intend to meet again, and then it is expected they will resume further thoughts of the Prince of Orange, and particularly that of taking him into the Council of State, and granting him a Pension. Six of the Provinces have already declared their consent to it, and sour have gone surther, and agreed to make

him Captain General at the age of eighteen.

In order to the stricter Alliance aimed at with Branden-burgh, Lunenburg, and our other Neighbor Allies, De Witte and Beverning have met about the Project to be proposed: The intent of it will be for a greater security to all parties against any attempts or disturbance from abroad, by resson of this or any sormer Alliances. And we are the more sorward in it, from a late Memorial the Spanish Ambassador hath given in here, for entring into a League on that side, for the security of the Body of the Low-Countreys.

This day a Copy of the Project was brought in, and Copies ordered to be given of it to the Ministers of such of the Allies as are at present residing here, and that the Sieur Heinbergh being now on his return to Wolfenbuttel, shall carry one a-

long with him.

They of Holland have brought in their Ratification of the Bishops Treaty, and the other Provinces are about theirs with all the expedition they can. In the mean time it is said, a Secretary is arrived here from Munster with the Ratification on the Bishops part. And hitherto we have not observed, but that he proceeds clearly in the execution of it; the Evacuation of our places being in a fair way, and that of Deute-kum already performed.

Again they of Holland have been obliged to press the other Provinces to bring in their Quotaes to the Treaties of Brandenburgh, Lunenburg, and Denmark, which are yet all

upon our liands.

The Sieur Busman Envoyé from the Elector of Cokn, hath demanded a Conference about the business of Rhineberk, which is a point we shall be hardly brought to satisfie his Master in.

The Ministers of Brandenburgh have given in a Complaint of the great excesses the French Troops continue to commit in Rees and Emerick, where having eaten up all their Hay this Winter, they now waste and spoil their Meadows, to the great loss and vexation of the Inhabitants, which is referred to the Council of State to consider of.

Amsterdam, May 4. We are in pain till we see the Bi shops Forces well disposed of. Its certainly writ hither, that the Marquels Castel Rodrigo hath returned Forty rhousand Crowns to engage 3000 of his best Horse, which are to pass forthwith into Flanders, for the better security of that Country.

All care and arts possible, are used to get out our Fleet to Se2, but we want that of making men, without doing which, we see not how to compleat our numbers. The first instant we had in the Texel 36 Men of War, and two Fire-ships. Upon the Ulieter were 19, and at Medenblick sour, which want the greater part of their men. At the same time an account was taken of their readiness, and it was sound, that some Captains had their whole numbers, but Tromp, and the greatest part of the rest were very wanting. However in all appearance, they will take the Se2 assoon as possibly they can, with an intention, as some think, to go and gather up the Danish Squadron. And to this end, they hope in a week or ten days, to have about 59 or 60 ships out, besides the six

that are crufing upon the Dogger-Sands. Those of Zealand muit follow after with four, yet remaining unready in the Meuse. In the mean time, we are incontinual alarms, for fear of an invasion from England; to prevent which, Ticops are daily ordered to pass towards Scheveling, and the neighbor Coast, to have an eye to what may be at empted by the English Fleet, which we hear hath much prevented us in their readiness.

Dublin, April 14. The Parliament have agreed upon these following Bills, which they have defined of the Lord Lieutenant and Councel may be transmitted.

That all priviledges of Parliament may be waved, and taken away in all Suites and Actions at Law, in any of the Kings Courts: provided that the Individual persons of Parliament men be free from restraint.

This Act to continue for two years, if the Parliament continue so long; previded that this Act, or any thing therein may not abrogate the Priviledges of Parliament, after the said two years. And have moreover ordered a Committee, who are, out of an Act for establishing an additional Revenue upon his Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, for the better support of the Crown and dignity, and out of two Bills lately read in the House, relating to that affair, and the debates since happing, to prepare heads of a Bill for the further settlement of the Revenue, in such fort and manner, as may best suit with his Majesties service: which Committee is to perfect it with all expedition, and having agreed upon a draught to present the same to his Grace the Lord Lieuenant, with the request of the House, that it may be transmitted.

Edinburgh, April 26. This day three of Captain Hamiltons prizes were fold off 3 the Vessels, without the lading, yielding him 26000 Marks, having still one more to sell, and

a lading of French Wines.

Barnstable, April 27. The Sman of this Port arriving here from Cork in Ireland, informes us that the Saphire, Dartmouth, and Little Guist Fregats, brought lately into Kingsale three Dutch Prizes, one of thirty Guns, another of twenty, and a third of eightnen, all three light Merchantmen, outward bound for Galicia and Rechel: The Saphire first met with them, and with the loss of fourteen Men, had taken two of them before the Dartmouth and Guist came up, at whose approach, the third likewise rendred her self. Here arrived also a small Vessel who had been chaced twenty Leagues off the Lands-end, by a Dutch Man of War of twenty four guns, telling us also of seven or eight Rowers, small French men of War, with more then twenty Oares each, who had taken two Lovers, and two small Plymouth men, and that they keep their station between Svilly and the Lizzard.

Dover, April 29. This morning at seven sayled by into the Downs Si: Foremy Smith, with twelve men of War, and three Canary men, four of his Squadron being left to be fitted at Portsmouth. We have news by a Newsort sloop, that the Dover Pacquet boat was again taken going to Nowsort, by a Dunkirk Privateer, and carried into Punkirk.

Whitchal, April 30. This day the Lord Morley and Monteagle was solemnly arraigned in Westminster-Hall, for the Death and killing of Mr. Henry Hastings, according to a Commission formerly directed to the Lord High Chancellor, to that purpose, who sate as Lord High Steward of England for that Tryal. Where after a full examination of the several Evidences against him, he was by his Peers sound guilty of Man-slaughter. Whereupon, having demanded the Priviledge of his Clergy, it was according to the Law in that Case provided, allowed him; and his Grace the Lord High Steward did in consequence, declare him discharged, upon paying his Fees. A particular Narrative of the whole solemnity will in sew days be elswhere made publick.
