Dublin, July 18.

 He people appointed to purfue the Tories in the North, have lately killed four of the principal of them, viz. Mac Crah, Mac Grorte, Mac Lahannah, and Mac Guire, whose heads were struck off and fet up as a terror to the rest, and have taken another notorious Tory, called Mac Quade, who is committed to fafe cuitody, and may be fuddenly proceeded against according to justice.

To morrow his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant

goes towards the Curragh of Kildare to take a view

of the Army.

Madrid, July 9. Monsegnior Borromeo the Popes Nuncio is some time since departed hence and ere this well advanced on his return for Rome, to take the possession of his employment as Secretary of State to the present Pope: Monsegnior Mareschutti, lately Nuncio in Poland is recalled, and may be suddenly expected here to supply the room of Monieg-nior Borromeo, with the same Character; in the mean time the place is supplyed by an Internuncio, Don Antonio Benavides, Commissary Genenal of the Crusada, who has so much gained up-on the Queens favour, that she has been pleased as a particular mark of her esteem, to bestow on him a Cross of Diamonds to the value of Nine thousand

The Count de Miranda lately Ambassador in this Court from the Prince of Portugal, being returned home to Lisbonne, and having left the affairs of that Crown to the management of Don Gio. de Roxas, Secretary to the Ambassy; their Catholick Majesties have thought sit also to recall their Ambassador the Baron de Batteville, who is suddenly expected home, and have made choice of Don Louis de Villareal to be sent thither with the Character only as Resident.

Don Juan of Austria has not thought fit to accept of the Government of the Neatherlands, unless he might be furnisht with full power to place and displace at his pleasure, and to dispose of all charges and places both in the Civil and Military Govern-

ment at his pleasure.

Don Fernand Baldez Collonel of the Regiment of Lombardi is lately made Great Master of the Artillery in the Government of Millan, and Messire Charles Antoine de Calonne for his many services both here and in the Neatherlands, is lately declated Count de Colonne and Governour of Cartage-na, and tis believed that the Charge of President of the Council of Flaunders and Burgundy, will be conferred on the Marquis de Castel Rodrigo.

Monsteur de Gouruille Envoy from the Prince of Conde continues still in this Court, solliciting for the payment of a considerable sum of moneys, which he pretends to be due to the faid Prince his Mafter from this Crown, and hopes to have a good Issue of his Negotiation, and to procure assignnents upon the moneys which have been brought inso the Exchequer, upon the late return of the Gallions.

Vienna, July 13. The Jews have offered great fums of Money to the Emperor to dispence with his Order for their banishment, or at least to give leave that a confiderable number of them may be permitted to continue here, but have effected nothing, and are consequently preparing to be gone within the time prescribed, having already taken care to remove their Synagogue.

The Imperial Army has passed the River Tibifca,

whereupon the Turkish Bassas seem to concern themfelves, ordering the reinforcement of their Garrifons, and putting themselves into a posture to make opposition if any attempts should be made upon their Quarters, pretending that this over-neer approach of the Emperors Army is inconsistent with the Treaty of peace which was last made between the two Emperors, for which tis supposed, the prefsing necessity by reason of these late unexpected di-sturbances will be a sufficient Apology.

The Letters which the Duke Abaff, Prince of Transylvania sent lately by a Courier to his Imperial Majesty, are filled principally with Compliments affuring the Emperor of his Fidelity and Inclina-tions to do him fervice, but conclude with his defires, that he would please to give his general pardon not only to fuch persons as are retired into the Fort of Gizer, but to all the rest of the people of Hungary who have been drawn into this late rebellion; with which his defire the Emperor has readily complied, and has dispatcht a Courier into Hungary with a general Annisty and Act of Oblivion, which tis hoped will have the wished effect, in reducing them all to

In the mean time they write from Upper Hungary, that the Prince of Holftein, and General Spankau, drawing up close to the said Fort of Gizet, wherein were above an hundred Gentlemen and about 1200 soldiers, the Garrison gave them a warm entertainment with their Canon, killing many of their men, and dismounted the two before-named Officers; but afterwards making a fignal for a Treaty the faid Generals fent in their Commissioners, with whom an agreement was presently made for the surrender of that place to the Emperors forces, as foon as they could be satisfy'd of the Princess Ragotskys pleafure; farther capitulating, that no hostilities might pass in the mean while from either part.

They farther tell us, that the Regiment of Horle under the Command of Colonel Dixxwald, was fent away from the Army to Convoy the Provisions and Ammunition defigned to them, and to secure their passage against the Hungarian Robbers, who (it seems) are very numerous. It has been thought fit to divide the Army and to send one part thereof to Quarter upon the frontiers of Poland. The Regiment of Foot under the Command of Count Partia, is ordered to march out of Styria, to muster at Edemberg, and to be fent thence to Trenfelin.

Here is lately arrived the Bishop of Strigonium, who is by the Emperors Order to affift in the Council for the better settlement of the affairs of Hun-

From Constantinople we are advised, that the troubles of that place being not yet composed, the Grand Segnior confidering the interest of the Sultaness, had not thought fit to adventure his person 1 thither, but refolves to divert himself for a longer time at Adrianople.

Ratifbonne, July 22. Several persons are deputed by this Assembly to be sent to his Imperial Majesty, to represent to him in the name of all the States of the Empire, the necessity of coming to an agreement with them for the Regulation and Uniformity of

Yesterday Four persons unknown here, sell upon and hurt the Sieur Meminger the chief Magistrate of this place on his return from the Town-house, and afterwards fled for refuge into the Convent of the Dominicans, whither 200 foldiers were fent, who intended to seife them by force, but the Prince and Bishop of Aichstadt interposed, the Fathers of the faid Convent promising to turn them out, they are fince supposed to be an Officer and three soldiers fent from Ingoldstadt, a Garrison of the Elector of

Hague, August 1. The States of Holland have in their affembly fallen again upon the Debate of fixing an Impost upon the Merchandises and Manufactures imported from France, the Deputies from Roterdam have upon this poynt suspended their Judgements, and are gone home to found the Resolution of their City in that point, and may suddenly return with full instructions.

It has been also proposed that a Squadron of 20 Ships be fitted up and fent away for the fecurity of our Trade in the Mediterranean, but as yet it re-

mains unresolved.

The Heer de Groot designed Ambassadour to the French Court intends to dispatch some affairs in Zealand on his way, before he enters upon that Employment:

The Heer de Beverningh seems not averse to the Employment, as Ambassador to the Spanish Court

at Madrid.

The Prince of Tarrante has obtained the favor from the States to return into France, and to con-

tinue there for the space of three months.

The Count de Monterey the new Governour of the Spanish Neatherlands, has since his entry upon the faid Government, written to the States General two Letters of several dates, the first to give them notice of the Queen Regents pleasure in nominating him to succeed in that important Charge; and the other to inform them, that he has taken care to press the payment of the second Subsidies due to Sweden within the time appointed, of which he doubts not the performance, promifing to do his endeavors to preserve a good Correspondency with the States.

The Fleet of Merchant thips expected from Cadiz is fafely arrived at the Texel under the Convoy of Captain Tol, having on board them a confiderable quantity of Silver, which was laden upon the Spanish Gallions. Three of the four ships expected from the East Indies are also fasely arrived, and the 4th daily expected, having lost the Company of the rest about the Cape of good hope; but h d passed before them at the Isle of St Helena.

From Sallee we are told that the Corsairs of that place, have lately brought in as prize one Vessel of Hauvre de Grace called the Hope, which had been bound with a considerable lading for Cadiz, and one Portugais from Narignan bound for Lisbonne.

Bruffels, August 1, This day a Spanish soldier ha-ving without the Gates of this City killed a Countrey-man who refused to part with his R ors which he was bringing hither to market, a considerable number of the Countrey people came together with Arms, and marched up to the Spanish Corps de Gard to revenge his death, whereupon the Spaniards retired into the Town, leaving Count Marcin with feveral other Officers to interpole, who after some difficulty perswaded the people to return home, giving them leave to kill the first Spaniard that should for the future off r to rob any of their Gardens.

His Excellency the Count de Monterey has Ordered that a General Review of the Foot, and horse shall be made the 10th instant, and tis said his Excellency intends to put in Execution the project formerly considered of, that the Provinces shall pay off the forces, which are to be proportionably charged on them, and may amount to about 24000. foot and good, horse, he intends also to proceed effectually to the Reformation of the Army both horse and foot, and to give pensions to Resormed Officers proportionably to their services.

Paris, Aug. 2. Complaint having been made of some affront given to the Turkish Envoy now at Valence by a rude fellow of the Countrey adjacent, who over-infolently pressed in to see him; his Majefly has been pleased to take particular notice thereof and to order his Letter to be fent to the Governor of the place to present the Offender to the said Envoye, and to submit him to what sentence he should think fit to pronounce against him, of which the said Envoye being informed, immediately went to the prison and with much generosity pardoned and discharged him.

The common people about Mests have been of late in a tumult upon a new Impost layd upon Wines, but were suddenly reduced to a more qu'et ten per : Five of the principal Authors being hanged and feveral others whipt by the common Executioner.

Some little skirmish hath lately past between

some parties of his Majesties forces, and the Rebels of Vivaretz, wherein Eight of the Kings Mulqueteers were killed, and Thirty of the Rebels.

The Count de Roure his Majesties Lieutenant General in Languedoc, and Commander of his forces also in Vivarais, was the 20th past at the Town of St Andeol in Languedoc, and had paned through the greatest part of the upper Vivaretz, endeavouring to confirm the people in their Obedience to his Majesty, and to assure them that sudden and effectual Care would be taken for the reducing their diforderly Neighbors to their duty.

By the way of Rochel we have news from Martinego, that that Plantation is in a thriving posture, and had got leave from the King of Ardres upon the Coast of Guiny to transport several Negroes for

the service of that Island.

The 30th past His Majesty with the Duke d' Enguyen and several other Lords went to the Camp at St Sebastien, where the forces were drawn cut into two distinct battallions, between whom was maintained a skirmish for three hours, with execellent
