*Dantzick, Sept. 12. N. S.*

**T**hey write from Poland, That the greatest part of the Muscovite Forces have pass'd the Neister, and that General Ronne continues posted at Zwanieck, with the Body of Forces under his Command. The Articles of the late Treaty are made publick; but it is said they are not to be executed till the King of Sweden is return'd into his own Dominions. The Czar of Muscovy arriv'd at Thorn on the Seventh, under a Discharge of the Cannon of that Place, whither he was attended by Prince Ragotzky, the Grand Chancellor of Muscovy, and several other Persons of Quality. His Majesty proposeth to continue there a few Days; after which, he will proceed to Elbing, where he will wait till the Return of an Express, he has sent to Wolfenbittel. Our Magistrates are appointing Deputies to wait on that Prince, and compliment him upon his Arrival at Elbing: And to Morrow will be observ'd here as a Day of publick Rejoicing, on Account of the late Peace.

*Vienna, Sept. 12. N. S.* We have this Day received Letters from Constantinople, dated the Tenth of the last Month, with a large relation of the Turkish, and Muscovite Affairs, being the same in Substance with our former Accounts. The Horse of Rumelia Commanded by Hassan Passaw, are appointed to conduct the King of Sweden into his own Dominions through Poland; and it is said the Prince of Tartary is likewise to accompany his Majesty with a Body of Forces belonging to that Nation. The Turks having ravag'd the Province of Moldavia, to be reveng'd on the Hospodar, who had declar'd for the Czar of Muscovy, are retiring towards Constantinople. The Count de Metternich, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Prussia to this Court, set out from hence Yesterday, in order to repair to Frankfort, where he is appointed to assist on the behalf of his Prussian Majesty at the Election of an Emperor. The Baron d'Urbich Plenipotentiary from the Czar of Muscovy, having been much indispos'd with the Gout, is gone to the Baths at Carlsbad, and has left his Brother here with the Character of Resident from his Czarish Majesty. The Seventh Instant was the Queen of Portugals Birth-day, whereupon the Court went out of Mourning for that Day, and the Empress Regent receiv'd the Compliments of all the Principal Officers and Foreign Ministers on that Occasion. This Court being much displeas'd at the Conduct of the Grisons, in relation to Monsieur Mafner, have given him fresh Assurances of an effectual Protection; and publish'd a new Order, prohibiting all Commerce with the Grisons.

*Hanover, Sept. 22. N. S.* The Duke of Wolfenbittel, who is at present at Aix la Chapelle, has promis'd, upon his Return from thence, to continue a few Days in this Court: And we hear the Hereditary Prince of Muscovy, and the Princess Lovisa, the Mother of his intended Bride, propose likewise to come hither, in order to meet him. It is not yet known where the Nuptials are

to be celebrated: The King of Poland is desirous it should be at Dresden; but the Duke of Wolfenbittel, the Lady's Grandfather, is more inclin'd to Brunswick; for which Reason, it is thought the Choice of the Place will be remitted to his Czarish Majesty, who proposeth to assist at the Ceremony. Our last Advices from Rostock import, That some Suedish Troops belonging to the Garrison of Stralsund had attack'd a Party of Danes as they were Foraging, and taken several Prisoners. The Armies have not yet undertaken any thing; but it is believ'd their first Attempt will be upon the Isle of Rugen, whither the Suedish Cavalry was retir'd.

*Hague, Sept. 25. N. S.* An Account of the late Peace between his Czarish Majesty and the Turks, having been transmitted directly from the Court of Muscovy to the Ambassador here, on the Twenty-third that Minister notify'd the same to the States-General. Our Letters from Hamburg advise, That the Czar arriv'd at Elbing on the Twelfth, and had taken a Resolution not to evacuate Asopt, or any of the other Places comprehended in the late Treaty, till the Furks have oblig'd the King of Sweden to depart out of their Territories: And as his Suedish Majesty insists upon being conducted into his own Dominions, by a Body of Twenty-thousand Men, the Czar of Muscovy has order'd the Troops that were marching from Poland to halt, and dispute the Passage, in case that Prince should come attended with so great a number of Forces. Some Letters from Poland advise, that his Suedish Majesty intended, before he left the Turkish Dominions, to repair to Constantinople, in order to remonstrate against the late Proceedings of the Grand Vizir, who had thrice refus'd to admit him to an Audience. Monsieur d'Urbich, Ambassador from his Czarish Majesty to the Court of Vienna, is recall'd from that Employment, at the Instance as well of the Empress Regent, as of the Kings of Denmark and Poland. Our Letters from Hamburg add, that General Scholten, had offer'd to the Allies in Pomerania, to deliver into their Hands the Town of Wisnar in Twenty-two days, and that of Stralsund in Thirteen after opening the Trenches, provided he may be supply'd with all things necessary for that Service; but it is not yet known what Resolutions have been taken in that Affair. The Country of Pomerania being not in a Condition to furnish sufficient Forage and Provision for the Subsistence of the Danish and Saxon Armies, we hear the King of Prussia has, upon the Instances of the Allies, permitted his Subjects to supply them with what they can spare, out of his Dominions. On the Twenty-second Instant, Monsieur Lintelo left this Place, being appointed to repair with his former Character to the Court at Berlin; and the Day following the Hereditary Prince of Hesse Darmstadt set out from hence in order to return home. This Evening the Lord North and Grey arriv'd here from the Army, whither the Earl of Albemarle, who was this Morning in Conference with the Grand Pensionary Heinsius, intends to return very speedily.

*From the Camp near Bouchain, Sept. 28. N. S.*  
 The Twenty-fourth the rest of the heavy Artillery employed in the Siege parted from this Camp, to follow the first Convoy, which is arriv'd safe at Douay. The Destruction of Forage made by the Enemy, in this Neighbourhood, has oblig'd us to make an Agreement with the Inhabitants of the Country about Lille and Tournay; to furnish us with such Quantities as shall be requisite during our Stay in this Camp: And for the Security of its Advancing to Marchienne, Eleven Battalions and Twelve Squadrons of the Troops encamp'd on the other side the Schelde, are order'd to Post themselves between St. Amand and Mortagne. Four Battalions, and as many Squadrons, are sent to reinforce the Garrison of Tournay, four Battalions to Lille, and as many to strengthen the Body of Troops at Marchienne, and the rest of the Army continue in their former Camp.

*Falmouth, Sept. 20.* On the Seventeenth was chased in here, by six French Privateers, the Young Buffingburgh Privateer of Flushing. This Day arrived the David and Joseph, of and for London, from Virginia, in seven Weeks, who came under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ships the Reserve and Tyger, with Sixty-five Sail of other Merchant Ships from thence; and parted from them the First Instant, by bad Weather.

*Plymouth, Sept. 21.* The 19th came in from the Westward, Sir George Bing in the Cumberland, with the Chichester, Berwick, Breda, Torbay, York, Plymouth, Dragon, and Penzance, with the Gardner for Venice, and Ruffel-Gally for Lisbon. The same Day came in the John and Mary with Salt from Guernsey for this Place. Yesterday sail'd the Hanoyer for Gibraltar, and St. John Baptist and Greyhound, both for Cork.

*Windsor-Castle, Sept. 22. 1711.* Her Majesty has been pleas'd to appoint his Grace the Duke of Kent Lord Lieutenant of the County of Bedford, in the room of the Duke of Bedford deceas'd.
