## Edinburg, July 24.

Aft night his Grace the Earl of Lauderdail, His Majesties High Commissioner for the Parliament of Scotland arrived at Yester, having been met at Bawtry, and at many other places on the Road in England, by fe-veral of the Scottish Nobility and Gentry. At Dur-ham the Lord St Folm and the Sheriffs of the County, well accompanied with the Gentry of the Countrey, waited on his Grace, and faluted him. All the way from *Nemcaftle*, he was met and attended by a great number of the Nobility and Gentry; and neer *Bermick*, was met by divers perfons of Quality with numerous Trains; particularly, the Earl of Hume, with at least 200 Gentlemen. At the Bound Road, he was met by the Lord Chancellor, and the Duke of Hamilton, accompanied with many Noblemen and Gentlemen; and on oldinghame Moor, he found the Merfe Militia Regiment and Troops in very good Order. His Grace lodg-ed that night at *Heymouth*, four miles on this fide *Bermick*; was Nobly Treated yefterday at dinner by the Earl of Roxbrugh, at Broxmouth : his Grace intends to make his Entry hither to morrow, and to fit in Council on Tuesday.

Legorn, July 22. The 15th inftant arrived here the Madonna di Ponte Santo from Smirna, Argentiera and Mefsina; at Smirna fhe left neer Six weeks fince Five Hollanders, Three French ships, and as many Barks of the fame Countrey, Two English, and Two Genouese ships, bound for several ports of Christendom. Thirty seven days fince the Grand Visier passed by Scio with Sixty three Gallies, bound for Gallipolis, where he intended to land his forces.

A Bark arriving here fiom  $C_{4}$ , *i* i *Sardinia* tells us, that Sir *Thomas Allen* with a fquadron of Eleven fail had been before that place, bar had no prattick there; he had been lately before *Tunis*, and had fo well adjoufted affairs with the Fi... Foun dron which continue to block up that Port, that no Englifh thip thall be for the future denied to enter and land their Goods.

Here is lately arrived the Mary, a fmall fhip laden with Oyls from Pugliz, bound for London.

Yesterday arrived at *Florence* the M rquis de St Geran, Envoye from his most Christian Majesty, to condole for the death of the late, and to congratulate for the fuccession of the present Grand Duke, upon which subject another Envoye is arrived with him from the Duke of Guise.

The Great Duke is upon the fame occasion employing feveral perfons to the Princes his Neighbors and Allies. viz. the Marquis Nicolini to the Emperor, the Marquis Ricardi to Rome, the Marquis Pucci to Spin; the Marquis Bartholomeo to France, and tis faid, Segnior Vieri Guadagni to England.

Genoua, Fuly 23 The 19th inftant arrived here the Zealand and Rotterdam Convoy, confifting of four men of war and two Merchant thips only in 22 days from Cadis, having on board 300 thoufand pieges of 8, 70 Chefts of Indigo, 20 of Cuccinelo, and a confiderable quantity of Wooll for this place and for *Legorn*, whither they intend to be going within a day or two, two of the men of war are bound for *Venice*, the other intend to return for *Spain*.

The Fainc is not yet departed from Eviqqa.

Two of this States Gallies are on departure for Mefsina, intending to lade home with Silks; one of the Galeassee belonging to Segnior Giacome Spiz nola, took lately a Turkish Bark with 17 Turks upon the coast of Spain,

Two Barks arriving in 14 days from *Tabarsa* tell us, that the French fhips continue ftill before *Tunis*, but without action : the Bafla there has declared himfelf averfe from making a peace with the French, fending them word, that if they fhoot any more on fhoar, they would fend them their Conful on board from the month of a Canon.

The French are fortifying a place about 30 miles diftant from *Tabarca* on the Territories of *Argier*; for which they oblige themfelves to pay yearly to the Turks the fum of 30 thousand pieces of 8.

During the continuance of the faid Two Barks at *Tabarca*, two Gallies of *Argier* arrived there to collect their Tribute of 2000 pieces of 8 yearly, but at their return took away with them a fmall vefiel belonging to the Governour, which tis believed they will be perfwaded to reflore, rather then faffer thofe of *Tunis* to make Reprifals.

By a veffel arrived here from Smirna, we are told, that the Vifter was feen under fail about Scio with a Fleet of Sixty three Gallies, and intended to come to an Anchor at Gallipolis; that the reports of the difcontents of the people in and about Conftantinople, had made it appear neceffary for him to arm himfelf with a very confiderable ftrength, the people having fo much owned the Sultaneffes affection to the Grand Segniors Brother, that they had openly declared to oppose the Vifier, ard even the Grand Segnior himfelf is the Vifier has thought fit therefore to arm himfelf fo ftrongly as to be able to preferve himfelf from affronts, and at the fame time to profes his many Obligations and great Freindfhip to the Sultanefs, that fo he may the better arrive at the end he proposes in composing the diforders, and fatisfying his Masters defire, without tumult and expence of blood.

By a Caich Express from *Dalmatia*, we have Letters from Cavalier *Molino* which came by Land to *Cattaro*, they are addressed to the Senate, to inform them of his departure from *Candia*, and his arrival at *Scio*, whither he had followed the Prime Visier, from whom he had received many marks of his great civility, and daily Presents of all forts of refreshments.

The fame Caich informs us of a great Trade that is growing at *Spalato*, all forts of Merchandifes beingf entthicher from divers parts of the Turkifh Dominions, which by reafor of the prefent want of convinient Lazarets, were deposited in *St Stephens* Convent. General *Barbaro* omits not to encourage the Trade of that place, by fupplying it with all conveniencies, and has befides the Order taken for the building of *Lazarets*, expended a confiderable fiderable fum of Moncys in raifirg a Bridge up on Pillars at the fea fide, upon which, ail Meichandifes may with eafe be conveyed from the ships to the Lararets,

The Iniks lately arrived at Spalato, tell us of great numbers of Mules and Horfes laden with Coods in feveral parts of Bofsina intending for that place, and that the Grand Segnior as a particular kindnefs to the Venetians, will prohibit the importation f all Cloth into his Ddminions, but fuch a fhall be of the manufacture of Venice.

Proveditor General Bernardo is with Ten Gallies and feveral other veffels lately arrived at Lefina.

The Receiver of *Maltha* has Orders to raife Moneys in all places to which his employment relates him, to be expended upon their Fortifications, those especially of *St Marguerite*; which according to the defigne of their Engineer, will amount to a vaft fum, and to finish those of *Floriana* on which they employ daily above 2000 perfons.

Their Commander Ricafoli has given 20 thoufand Crowns towards the fortification at the mouth of the Haven; and the Council there hath in confideration thereof, ordered that the Fort fo built, fhall be called by the name of its benefactor, The Fort of Ricafoli, whole Arms are to be fet upon it, with an Infeription to his honour.

Hambourg, Aug. 1. Letters from Wirfaw inform us that the Archbishop of Gnefne has written feveral Letters to the petty Diets, indeavouring to infpire them with principles against the prefent Government, but the King has by his Letters to feveral of, the Bishops, prevented his defign, and much gained upon the affections of the people, fo that tis believed a good choice will be made of Nuncio's to be fent to the G ral Dict. The princ'pal Propofals in the lefter Diets are for the revictualing and reinforcing the Garrifons upon the front'ers, the Coronaton of the Queen at Warfaw, and the eftallishment of a peace with the Costacks.

Hag ie, August 5. The States have been lately pleaf d to cause a Letter to be written to his Excellency the Count de Monterey, the new Governour of the S anish Neatherlands, imp rting that they have understood, that the Queen Regent of Spain had accepted of the Mediation and Arbitration of the Kings of Great Brittain, a d Swedland, for the Composure of the Differ nees b tween the two Crowns of France and Spiin, and that Her faid Majesty had likewife desired their admission into the faid Arbitration, for which they profes themselves much Obliged, but that tis not their Ambition, who defire nothing more then that no farther time may be lost in an affair of this great importance, which if timely fin sht may take away all pretences of a future Rupture.

On Saturday last the States of Holland adjourned, having first concluded upon the raising of the new Impost upon Manufactures and Salt, imported from France, and a Prohibition that no Aquavita be brough from thence, but this is not to be put into Exection, till a new Experiment be made by the Heer de Groot' Ambassiador to the French Cowrt, whether His most Christian Majessy will be prevayled with, to abate the Impost charged there upon the Manufactures of th se Countrys.

We have ev n now advice of 17 ships lately arrived at the Texel from Muscovy, where is also come in h Gideon with Leather from Cape de Vert.

The ibips expected from *Cadis* are fafely arrived at the *Texpl*; of the four fhips expected from *Cey*on one of the mout into *Zealand*, two others ino *Texel*, where is also arrived the 4th, which loft company of the rest about the Cape of Good hope.

Bruff 1s, Aug. 6. The late tumult of the people upon the death of a Cot ntrey man,killed by a Spanish foldier, might have proved very Tragical to the Spanish Garison here, had not his Excellency got on horfeback, with the Count de Marcin, and used his interest with the Citizens to perfwade them to a milder course of justice. On Friday and Saturday much diligence was used, and firict Commands given to find out the Spaniard whose rashness had occasioned the tumult, but he not difcovered, the Serjeant of the Guard who had suffered his efficape, was on Saturday, led to the Gallows in the Market place, where expecting his execution, he was happily freed by the accidental discovery of the foldier, who was within an hour executed, to the fati faction of the City.

The Duke d' Aerfil ot is lately reftored to his Command of a Regiment of Horfe, and is made chief Commiffary for the Election of Magistrates in the feveral Cities in the place of Count Salazar, and is the 10th inftant expected at the Election at Ghent.

All the Officers of the Army are ordered to repair to their feveral Commands, there to expect the Reformation of the Army, which is this week to be put in execution.

On Sunday ended the great folemnity in Commemoration of the miraculous Hoft, with an extraordinary Proceffion, in which his Excellency followed the Sacrament with a Taper in his hand, having on his right hand the Count *de Marcin*, and on his left hand the Duke *d'Aerfchot*.

Paris, August 6. On Sunday a desperate young fellow a zealous Sectary, and none of the Reformed Church, came into the Church of Nostre Dame, where he heard Mass, but at the Elevation of the Host, he fuddenly drew his sword and run the Priest through, being apprehended at the Church door, he acknowledged his Crime, which was drawn on by no particular malice to the person of the Priest, but only by his zeal against Idolatry.

Yefterday in the morning he was fentenced to be burnt, which was Executed on him in the afternoon, his armes being before cut off in the Prison, and dyed with a show of great Resolution.

The Church being defiled with Blood, is to be new Confecrated by a general Convocation of the Clergy.

From Languedoc we have Letters, mentioning the defeat of the Rebels of Vivaret2, who threw away their Arms and run away upon the first appearance of his Majesties forces, who fell in upon them and killed about 100 taking about 200 prisoners, the rest of them are fled to fecure themselves in the Mountains, of this action we may shortly expect the particulars.

Falmouth, July 25. The 21 inftant arrived here The Pearl Fregat of Briftol from the Barbadoes laden with Sugars, intended for Holland, in her company came Three Virginia fhips which paft before this Harbor bound to the Eaftwards.

The 24th put in here the Content of London bound for *famaica*, and the Afsiftance and Speedwel, both of London, intending for the Barbadoes.

London's fuly 30. His Highnefs the Landgrave of Heffen Caffel, having taken leave of their Majefties and Royal Highnefles, departed yesterday from hence in His Maiesties Barge for Gravesend, accompanied by Sir Charles Cotterel, Mafter of the Ceremonies, and went thence to Dover where he was to embark upon one of His Majesties Yachts, which was ordered to transport him to Calice.

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
