Hamburg, Sept. 28. N. S.

WE have Letters from Warfaw, of the Nineteenth Instant advising, that a General Diet of the Palatinate of Maffovia was held there on the Fourteenth, in order to make choice of their Deputies for the Tribunal of the Crown, but being not able to agree in that Point, they separated without coming to any Resolution. The Sickness continues still to appear in the Town of Lublin, but there is no sign of any Infection in the Neighbourhood of that Place. The Suedes give out that the Danish and Saxon Forces in Pomerania, go on slowly with their Operations there, and that it will be very difficult for them to Quarter in those Parts this Winter, unless they can make themselves Masters of some Places of Strength; which the Suedes do not only pretend themselves to be in a Condition to prevent, but likewise, that they will oblige them to retire out of that Province. The Suedes have hitherto preserv'd their Communication open with the Sea, by which means they are supply'd with all Necessaries. In the mean time, General Welling has order'd every thing to be destroy'd in the open Country, whereby the Allies are depriv'd of all means of Subsistence. A Diet is appointed to be held in the Dutchy of Holstein, on the Fourteenth of the next Month, and Commissioners have been accordingly nominated on the behalf of his Danish Majesty and the Ducal Family. The Nobility seem much concern'd, for that no Commissioners are named out of their Body; and it is observable that 'till now, no Diet has been summon'd in that Dutchy, these Thirty-six Years.

Brussels, Octob. 10. N. S. They write from the Frontiers, That the Count d'Erbach, and some other Officers of the Allies, who were lately taken Prisoners by the French, and have been quarter'd at Landrecy, having obtain'd Leave for three Months from the Marechal de Villars, are return'd to the Army; and it is hop'd that some Means will shortly be found out for their Exchange. The French seem much offended at the Directions that have been given in relation to the Garrison of Eouchain, which are to be Quarter'd in Holland; for which Reason, they threaten to remove all our Prisoners farther up into Picardy. The Marquis de Coigny has been detach'd from the French Army, with twelve Squadrons of Horse, and as many of Dragoons, in order to prevent our Forces from Foraging in the Neighbourhood of Landrecy. The French Court are under some Apprehensions that the Troops of the Allies, which are to be Garrison'd this Winter in the Frontier Towns, will give them frequent Alarms by their Incursions; to restrain which, Orders have been sent to Quarter the greatest part of the Cavalry in the Province of Artois. Our Letters from Paris advise, that the Duke of Noailles, at his Return into Spain, will have the Command of a separate Army in the Lampourdan, where he is promis'd to be join'd by some Forces out of Dauphine, notwithstanding a Remonstrance sent to the French King by the Duke of Berwick, wherein that General represents the great Inconveniencies that will necessarily attend such Detach-

ments. We are told, the Duke of Anjou has confer'd the Vice-Royalty of Peru on the Prince of Santo-Buono, his late Ambassador to the Republick of Venice, in Consideration of the Losses he has sustain'd through his Adherence to His Interests, particularly in the Kingdom of Naples, where a considerable Estate, of which he was posselt, has been confiscated. These Letters add, that the Marquis de Bay was arriv'd at Merida, and that Orders were given for the speedy assembling of the Army in Estremadura.

Whitehaven, Octob. 3. On Monday the first Instant four laden Colliers, Sail'd hence for Dublin.

Yarmouth, Octob. 5. On the third Her Majesty's Ships the Swift and Shoram's Prize, went off to Sea with the Fishers. Yesterday Sail'd hence several Ships with red Herrings for Holland without Convoy; and this Day Sail'd hence another Ship and several Doggers bound thither. Her Majesty's Ship the Folkstone and Advice's Prize continue in our Road.

Plymouth, Octob. 5. The third instant came in the Leopard from Canada: At the same time Sail'd two Danes for Dram from Bristol. Yesterday came in the James for Ostend, and Abundance for Rotterdam, both with Butter for Dublin.

Falmouth, Octob. 4. Yesterday arriv'd the Union Pacquet, in seventeen Days from Lisbon, Captain Hailes Commander, who took in his Passage a French Brigantine of four Guns and twenty-five Men. The Lisbon Fleet Sail'd two Days before the Pacquet for England.

Dartmouth, Octob. 5. On the third Instant Sail'd hence Her Majesty's Ships Sea-horse and Delight to the Eastward: And the Transport (that lately landed Prisoners here from St. Mallo) Captain Smith Commander for Southampton.

Deal, Octob. 7. On the fifth Her Majesty's Ships the Devonshire and Dunwich Sail'd towards the River. The same Day in the Afternoon came down the Mermaid Gally, Captain Jefferyes for the Streights. The same time came in hither Her Majesty's Ships the Berwick, Breda, and Dragon; and the next Morning came in hither Her Majesty's Ships the Tilbury, Oxford and Swallow, and under their Convoy the Fleet Frigate, Frederick, Concord, Susanna, and Europe, from the East-Indies.

Windsor, Octob. 5. This Day Colonel Clayton arriv'd here from North America, having left the Fleet under the Command of Sir Hovenden Walker, on the Twelfth of September in the Spanish River in the Island of Cape Britton. He brings an Account that the Fleet after having been detain'd at Boston above a Month, Sail'd from thence on the Thirtieth of July towards Quebeck. That being got about Forty Leagues up the River of St. Lawrence, with a very fair Wind, on the Twenty-third of August the Weather grew Stormy and Foggy, for which Reason, the Admiral thought it proper about eight at Night to make the Signal for lying by. That about eleven they found themselves driven by the Currents too much Northerly, and embay'd among the Rocks, where eight of the Transports, with twenty-six Companies of Land Forces, and two Ships laden with Provisions, was cast away. The

Men of War had the good Fortune to escape. On the Twenty-fifth, a Council of War, of Sea-Officers, being Summon'd, they were unanimously of Opinion, That in Consideration of the Loss which they had sustain'd, of the several Disappointments which they had met with, and were likely to meet with from the Northern Colonies, of the Season's being very far advanc'd, and of the Ignorance of the Pilots, which the Governour of New England had furnish'd them with, and answer'd for, the Design against Quebeck should be laid aside. On the 4th of Septemb. the Fleet arriv'd in Spanish River. On the 5th another Council of War, compos'd of all the Captains of Ships, and Colonels of Regiments, in the Fleet, was held, and the Attack of Placentia, in pursuance of Her Majesty's Instructions was propos'd; but the Council came unanimously to the Resolution of proceeding immediately to Great Britain, because there remain'd but nine Weeks Provision at short Allowance, which was barely sufficient to bring them home; and because the Men of War, which were left to Convey the Store, promis'd by the several Colonies, return'd at that time without any. For which Reasons they consider'd, that though they should have succeeded in the Attack of Placentia, they might yet have been unable to subsist during the Winter.
