**U**PON Intelligence that some Endeavours have been made to revive the Troubles in Hungary, this Court omits nothing that may conduce to the Confirmation and Continuance of the Peace in that Country. Our Advices in Relation to the King of Sweden continue very uncertain. They write from Constantinople, that that Prince is dispos'd to accept of the Convoy provided for him by the late Treaty: but our Letters from Bender tells us, that he still persists to reject it, in which he is much encourag'd by the Cham of Tartary, who has undertaken to prevail with the Grand Signior to permit a strong Body of Tartars to attend his Suedish Majesty into his own Dominions, and continue there under his Command. From hence it is apprehended by some, that the Endeavours us'd to frustrate the Intentions of the Peace will have the desir'd Effect; especially since it is evident that the Grand Vizir's Interest begins to decline, both at Constantinople, and in the Army. We have all the Reasons we can desire to be assur'd of the King of Spain's Election to the Empire, but it is not known whether his Majesty will be Crown'd soon after the Election, or defer his Coronation to the next Spring. Publick Prayers of Forty Hours are order'd to be put up in all the Churches of this Country for his Majesty's prosperous Voyage from Spain, and on Friday next those Prayers are first to begin in the Cathedral Church belonging to this City. The State of Venice have notify'd to this Court, that it has been unanimously resolv'd in the Senate, to acknowledge his Catholick Majesty for King of Spain, and that they have appointed two Ambassadors to repair to Milan, and receive him as such upon his arrival in that City. His Majesty proposeth to make but a short stay there, being inclin'd to proceed with the greater Diligence into the Empire.

**Brussels, Oct. 10. N. S.** We have receiv'd Letters from Cambray, importing, that the Marechal de Villars pretended there, that the Forces under his Command were in a Condition to keep the Field longer than those of the Allies; in which case, he threatned to lay Siege to Bouchain so soon as the Confederate Army shou'd be broken up, having already prepar'd Fascines and other Materials requisite for that purpose. Though he is said to have declar'd himself on this Occasion with much Confidence, yet the French themselves are now sensible, that an Undertaking of that nature will be impracticable; and, that the great Wants they are under, especially of Forage, will make it impossible for them to put any such Design in execution. Their Army continues in the same Situation as before; only a Part of the second Line has made a

Movement, and is at present Canton'd at Marquion. The Duke de Guiche was to set out for Paris from Cambray this Day or to Morrow, and will speedily be follow'd by the Troops of the Household. The First Instant being his Catholick Majesty's Birthday, the same was observ'd here, and in the rest of the Towns of this Province, with several Discharges of all the Artillery, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy. Monsieur vanden Berg, the Deputy of the States-General, has receiv'd the Compliments of all the Persons of Distinction here, on his Return into this Province. The Allies have thrown several Bridges over the Schelde near St. Ammand; and a strong Body of Forces is posted there under the Command of the Generals Dopf and Cadogan, for the better Security of our Convoys. By this means the Army is plentifully supply'd with Forage; and it is believ'd the Confederates will keep the Field 'till towards the End of this Month.

**Whitehaven, Octob. 7.** Two light Colliers are return'd from Dublin.

**Plymouth, Octob. 9.** Yesterday Morning pass'd by this Harbour to the Eastward, the homeward bound Turkey and Lisbon Fleets. At the same time came in Her Majesty's Ship the Suffolk from Lisbon. Yesterday came in the Thousand Fears with Butter from Ireland. This Day came in the Squirrel of this Place, with Pilchards from Falmouth, and the Leghorne-Gally from Cruising.

**Dartmouth, Octob. 9.** Yesterday came into this Road, the Blessing of Limington, Capt. Tayler Commander in three Weeks from Lisbon, in Company of Sir John Norris and the whole Fleet, from whom he separated the Evening before, and halling in for the Land, made the Bolt Yesterday Morning, a little to the Westward of this Place, and then saw the Fleet a great way without him, standing up the Channel. This Vessel is bound for Falmouth with Salt, and hath over-shot her Port and is gone to Torbay to proceed for Falmouth, under Convoy of a Dutch Man of War, which is bound thither.

**Comes, Octob. 10.** The Ships mention'd in my last, were part of those under Convoy of Sir John Norris, last from Lisbon, with whom its said were join'd some from the West-Indies. From the former is come in  
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
