Turin, October 3. N. S.

ON the Twenty-third of the last Month his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy arriv'd here with all the Foreign Ministers residing at this Court, as did likewise Marechal Thaurin soon after. Immediately upon that General's Arrival, a Courier was dispatch'd to Susa, with Orders for General Zunjungen to repair hither; which he did the same Day, and return'd the next, having first given his Royal Highness and the Marechal an Account of Affairs on that side. Upon Advice, that a Body of the Enemies Forces had taken Post near Exilles, in order to lay Siege to that Place, some Troops were instantly order'd that way, and march'd with so much Expedition, that they came up time enough to save the Town, and oblig'd the Enemy to retire with great Precipitation to Oulx, where they are now Encamp'd to the Number, as we are inform'd, of Thirty-five, or Forty Battalions. They had made two unsuccessful Attempts on the Retrenchments near Exilles, before the Arrival of our Forces, but were repuls'd in both with great Vigour, and left near Five hundred Men Dead behind them. The Duke of Savoy has appointed the Governour of this Place to be his Ambassador Extraordinary, and compliment the King of Spain upon his Arrival at Milan; and his Royal Highness proposeth to go in Person, and wait on his Majesty in his way thither, so soon as he shall hear that he is landed. Marechal Thaurin set out for Milan, on the first Instant, and the Spanish Envoy went from hence at the same time, in order to attend on his Master at Genoa.

Genoa, Oct. 8. N. S. The Confederate Fleet appointed to Condu&t the King of Spain into Italy, sail'd from Barcelona on the Twenty-seventh of the last Month, with his Catholick Majesty on Board. Yesterday in the Evening two Genoese Ships came hither from Vado, where they left the said Fleet; and we just now receiv'd an Account that the King is happily landed at that Place. Our Advices from Catalonia import, That Marechal Staremberg had taken an advanc'd Post from the Enemy, and had thereby not only prevented the Designs of the Duke of Vendosme, who threatned to march with his Army into the Heart of Catalonia, but had likewise reduc'd him to the last Extremity through the want of Water, with which it is impossible for him to supply his Forces, without exposing those that fetch it, to the Fire of the Confederates, who have an advanc'd Guard, compos'd of all the Granadiers of the Army, sustain'd by four Battalions, at the Mouth of the River which is at the Head of their Camp. It is generally thought, that this Situation will either oblige the Enemy to attempt to drive the Allies from that Post, which they cannot do without a very considerable Disadvantage on their side, or that they will be forced to abandon Cervera, and decamp before the Confederates. In the meantime frequent Encounters happen between Parties belonging to the two Armies, which are in sight of each other.

Venice, Oct. 9. N. S. On Sunday last, the Pope's Nuncio made his publick Entry; and the Day following had an Audience of the Senate, to which he was conducted by Signior Morosini, and sixty Senators. The Ambassadors appointed by this Republick to wait on the King of Spain upon his Arrival at Milan, will not set out from hence till they shall be assur'd his Majesty will give Audiences on the Road to Foreign Ministers. They write from Rome, That the Prince de Trivulzio was pass'd through that Place in his way to Milan, whither he is sent by his Uncle the Viceroy of Naples, with Compliments to his Catholick Majesty on his behalf. Several other Neapolitans of Quality are likewise repairing to Milan, in order to wait on the King, and receive his Majesty's Commands. The Duke of Anjou having been lately offended at some Proceedings of the Pope, has appropriated to himself the Incomes of all vacant Benefices in Spain, and made several other Regulations in Ecclesiastical Affairs, which is put in practice by other Princes, will exceedingly lessen the Interest and Authority of the See of Rome. The Pope has again held some secret Congregations; and Prayers have been order'd to be put up in all the Churches, for a Blessing on the Resolutions that have been taken in them, though those Resolutions are not yet made publick. Cardinal Gabrieli dy'd lately at Caprarola, by whose Death there are now become seventeen Vacancies in the College of Cardinals. Our Magistrates of Health have publish'd an Order prohibiting the Killing and Selling of Cattle near Verona and Vicenza, upon an information, that many have dy'd lately there of inward Corruptions.

Hanover, Oct. 9. N. S. The Duke of Wolfenbuttel, who design'd to have been at Herenhausen to Morrow, and to have proceeded from thence hither, having been inform'd that our Elector had thereupon order'd his Journey to Geure, where the Court proposeth to reside for some time during this Hunting Season, has signify'd to his Electoral Highness, that his Intentions are to go directly to Wolfenbuttel. The Czar of Muscovy has been earnestly invited, by the Duke to that Place, in order to assist at the Marriage of the Hereditary Prince his Son, and the young Princess of Wolfenbuttel, whose Nuptials he had propos'd to solemnize there with an extraordinary Magnificence; having for that purpose made an Invitation to the King and Queen of Prussia, their Majesty's of Poland, and the Elector of Hanover; and it is believ'd that the King of Denmark, who is at this time in the Neighbourhood, would have been likewise desir'd to be present at the Solemnity: But this Honour, and the very extraordinary Expences that must unavoidably have attend'd it, have been refus'd him by his Czarish Majesty, who it is believ'd will have the young Princes Married without much Ceremony at Dresden, or Carlsbad. They write from Carlsbad, that the Czar continues at that Place, where he is attended by several of the principal Officers of his own Court, and many foreign Ministers. Our Letters from thence add, that the Hereditary Prince of Muscovy was expected there in a few Days, and

that Mr. Whitworth, the Queen of Great Britain's Ambassador Extraordinary, and Plenipotentiary, arriv'd there from Vienna the first Instant in the Evening. Our Letters from Romania advise, that the Allies continu'd their Preparations for the intended Descent into the Isle of Rugen, but had not yet receiv'd their Artillery. They write from Poland, that the Proposals made by the Turkish Ambassadors were not very acceptable; for which Reason they have been rejected by the Senators, from whom they receiv'd their Audience. A Deputation has been likewise sent to the Grand Visir, to regulate with him the King of Sweden's Passage, in case his Majesty shall think fit to return through Poland. In the mean time, General Czeremet has desir'd the Senate to be on their Guard, and to give Orders for the Marching of the Auxiliary Troops on the Frontiers. Our last Letters from Warlaw advise, that the King of Poland had countermanded the Polish Army, and directed it to march out of the Lower Poland towards the Vistula, in order to join the Troops of Podolia, and observe the Motions of the Enemy, and prevent their Incurfions.
