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Genoa, October 15. N. S.

HIS Catholick Majesty King Charles III. arriv'd in our Road on the Eleventh Instant in the Evening, with the Confederate Fleet consisting of Thirty Men of War, and Ten Frigates. Early the next Morning his Majesty landed at St. Pierre d'Areno, and proceeded immediately from thence to Milan. The Duke d'Uzeda having made his Submission to his Majesty, who gave him a very favourable Reception, is gone after the King to Milan. The Confederate Fleet have receiv'd the usual Presents of Refreshments from this State, and sail'd from hence on the Thirteenth for Leghorn.

Venice, Octob. 17. N. S. The Princess de Sano to Buono, who is lately made first Lady of Honour to the Dutchess of Anjou, is at present in this City. The Governour of Comachio has sent an Officer to Ferrara, where he is to desire, that some Commissioners may be appointed on the behalf of the Pope, to treat with the said Governour about the Limits of that Government, and the Papal Territories in those Parts. They write from Naples, that a new Gally has lately been launch'd there, call'd the Elizabeth, which is to join the other Gallies, that are in a readiness to sail in order to cruise on those Coasts. Our Senate have receiv'd some Letters from Signior Emo, the Venetian Ambassador in France, by which it appears, that there is no great likelihood of his succeeding in his Negotiations at that Court.

Vienna, Octob. 21. N. S. On the Seventeenth Instant, the Count de Schlick set out from hence for Hungary, whither he is sent to settle the Winter Quarters for the Troops in that Country. On Sunday last *Te Deum* was sung in the Cathedral Church of this City, on Account of his Catholick Majesty's being Elected to the Empire; the Emperors Regent, and the whole Court, assisting at the Solemnity. Yesterday an Expreis came hither from Italy, with the Advice of that Prince's Arrival at Milan; which agreeable News has been receiv'd with an universal Joy at this Place. The Emperors Regent has appointed the Count de Wels to go and Congratulate his Majesty in her Name, upon his Promotion to the Empire; and the young Count de Staremberg is order'd to repair, on the same Occasion, to the Court at Barcelona. His Imperial Majesty is speedily expected at Inspruck, where he will reside till every thing is made ready for his Coronation. We have receiv'd Letters of the Twenty-fourth of September from Constantinople, advising, That the Sultan has declar'd himself well pleas'd with the Conduct of the Grand Vizir, having lately sent that Minister a rich Present, as an Instance of his good Affection towards him. On the other hand, he oblig'd Monsieur Funck, the Suedish Minister, to leave Constantinople at a very short Warning, tho' he declar'd himself much in-

dispos'd, and earnestly desir'd a Respite of three Days, which was refus'd him.

Frankfort, Octob. 28. N. S. The Imperial Army continues encamp'd near Spire; but it is believ'd, the Incommodities of the Season will soon oblige the Troops to decamp. We hear the Infantry is to come on this side the Rhine, and that the Horse will remain in the Towns about Spire. Since the Election of the King of Spain to the Imperial Dignity, several Persons of Distinction are set out from hence in order to wait on his Majesty at Milan.

Hamburg, Oct. 30. N. S. Our last Letters from Pomerania advise, That the Allies had taken a strong Post situate between Stralsund and Stetin, by which means the Communication between those two Towns is cut off: they oblig'd the Garrison to surrender Prisoners of War, and found in the Place nine Pieces of Cannon, and some Stores of Ammunition. The Danish Artillery, which has been so long expected, arriv'd on the Twentieth Instant at a Place near Grypswalde, where they are now landing it, and as they are daily in expectation of being join'd by the heavy Artillery from Saxony, the Allies threaten to open the Trenches before Stralsund very speedily, and raise two Attacks against it. In the mean time the Suedes are preparing for a very vigorous Defence, and hope the Enemy will meet with such Hardships from the Season, which is already far advanced, as to be forc'd to desist before they shall be able to carry the Place. The Danish Fleet is riding off the Isle of Rugen, and as they have a great number of flat Boats with them, it is believ'd they are order'd to favour the intended Descent into that island, and intercept such Supplies as shall be sent from Sueden. They write from Poland, that his Polish Majesty's late Minister at Constantinople, who had been confin'd there by the Grand Signior's Order, having been releas'd from his imprisonment, was arriv'd in the Army of the Crown; where he reports, that it was resolv'd at Constantinople to acknowledge his Majesty for King of Poland, and faithfully observe the Treaty of Carlowitz. According to these Advices, the Army of the Turks is separated, and the Grand Vizir is preparing to return to Constantinople. That Minister has notify'd to the King of Sueden, that it is expected of his Majesty, that he will remove from Bender before the Winter approaches, the Convoy appointed for that purpose being ready to attend him into his own Dominions. These Letters add, that the Palatin of Kiovia seem'd dispos'd to submit himself to the King of Poland, provided he may be assur'd of his Majesty's Favour, and receive such Securities, as may be thought proper for the Safety of his Person and Estate.
